FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

SCHOOL FUNDING IN OHIO

With the recent release of Governor Kasich's new school funding model, the debate over how we fund Ohio schools reemerged to the forefront of news media coverage. When coupling the new formula with recent headlines referencing the \$37.9 million that state schools will share with new Casino revenues, residents of school districts around the state and here in the Firelands community may believe there is reason to rejoice!

However, I caution this optimism and I am compelled to address several facts that paint a somewhat different picture about our financial future. In the 2009-2010 school year, the state of Ohio funded a portion of the school foundation payment with federal stimulus dollars, which in short, "replaced" the use of state dollars with federal dollars to fund our schools.

The use of stimulus dollars continued in the 2010-2011 school year with a higher percentage of state dollars replaced by federal stimulus dollars. In addition, school districts received direct stimulus funding to fund certain instructional positions. Mind you, this was a one-time federal payment aimed to help our nation's ailing economy.

Fast-forward to the 2011-2012 school year. Stimulus funding did not return to school districts and the state of Ohio chose not to return the funding that it replaced with federal stimulus dollars to our schools. The net effect of this action to the Firelands Schools was a reduction of funding in excess of \$800,000 per year. In light of this loss of revenue, it is difficult for me to see the "windfall" of revenue in a casino payment of \$37,455.75.

As Western Reserve School District treasurer Brett Robson points out in a recent article, I am neither critical nor unappreciative of the new casino revenue stream. However, I am compelled to paint a complete picture for our community regarding school funding in the state of Ohio and I too suspect that the casino payment may follow the path of the "windfall" of revenue that the Ohio Lottery was supposed to bring to schools.

As I alluded to in my opening paragraph, an additional piece of the funding puzzle is Governor Kasich's new school funding formula. The new formula is complex and focuses on several key concepts that have appeared in previous funding formulas. In short, schools will receive "Core Opportunity Aid" (base aid) and Tier 2 Aid. The base aid portion of the

formula is supposed to ensure that every school district receives a base amount of revenue per pupil under the assumption of a base tax rate of 20 mills applied to a per pupil valuation of \$250,000. This funding model is known as an "equal yield formula" and it is the same construct that Ohio utilized in the late 1970s.

On February 6, the Governor released preliminary funding amounts based on the new formula. Much to my surprise and chagrin, Firelands was "flat funded." In other words, we expect to receive the same amount of funding that we currently receive for the next two fiscal years. Further adding to our dismay is the concept of a "guarantee" of \$2,288,326 that is considered part of our state funding. In short, a "guarantee" is an amount of money provided by the state that ensures we receive the same amount of funding that we received in the previous year. However, there is a catch...the Governor was clear in his message to state superintendent's that the "guarantee" must go away because it is unfair to growing districts.

To complicate matters further, if the "guarantee" is eliminated we will need to find a way to trim \$2 million plus from the budget in each of the next two years. Mind you, this assumption asks us to trim \$2.2 million per year from a district that in fiscal year 2012, continued to act to reduce costs with the elimination of classified, certified, and administrative positions. In fiscal year 2012, 16 positions were eliminated through attrition and reductions-in-force. The technology department was outsourced for cost savings and performance improvement. Federal education jobs funds not spent in fiscal year 2011 were used to preserve cash flow in fiscal year 2012. Another five positions were reduced for fiscal year 2013 to offset the total loss of all federal stimulus funds and reductions in federal Title funding. All of the aforementioned items were done in an effort to operate efficiently and to serve the needs of our students.

In addition to the \$2.2 million in cuts, the Governor plans to reduce revenues to our county educational services centers by 25% in each of the next two fiscal years. A reduction in funding to our ESC's equates to additional dollars that we must allocate as a district to purchase the services provide by the ESC. This serves as an interesting paradigm for a funding plan that aims to eliminate "unfunded mandates" and reliance on property tax.

I find it a difficult pill to swallow that based on the just released calculations, we are widening the gap between the

"haves" and the "have-nots." Governor Kasich was clear in his assertion that you can argue with neither the formula, nor the results. However, the impact of the formula as released could be devastating to the future of many schools in the state. The formula essentially forces districts to go back to the local taxpayers to continue to provide high levels of education

An examination of the funding data shows that of the lowest 43 wealth districts based on per pupil valuation, twenty-five or 58% are receiving no increase in funding. There are thirty-one counties represented by these forty-three Districts. In addition, the following summary of districts projected to be on a guarantee in fiscal year 2014 by typology is as follows:

Poor rural — 79/97 (81.4%) Rural — 137/161 (85.1%) Rural small town — 71/81 (87.7%) Urban — 27/102 (26.5%) Major urban — 4/15 (26.7%) Suburban — 53/107 (49.5%) Wealthy suburban — 22/46 (47.8%)

Call me a cynic, but I fail to see how the Governor has removed politics from school funding based on the aforementioned data. How can so many districts with high per pupil property wealth and high levels of income receive large increases in state funding, while smaller rural districts with average land wealth and income are "frozen" for the next two fiscal years at their current level and are now on the "guarantee?"

I must warn our public that we are once again in a political battle with the Governor regarding our fiscal ability to educate our students. If the funding proposal goes through as currently written, I believe we are falling back to the unsustainable funding formula of the 1970's. Further, local districts will continue to rely on the unconstitutional property tax base to fund our schools. As voters in the state of Ohio, I urge you to contact your state senators and representatives to pose the following question: "How is the Governor's funding proposal any different than past proposals and how does the new formula move away from a reliance on the property tax and the creation of the 'haves' and the 'have-nots'?"

WINTER SAFETY TIPS

Now that winter has finally arrived, here are some tips to keep everyone safe all year long. Remember with bad road conditions the Bus may be late. Please do not call the Bus Garage as it can create a lot of radio conversation that can be distracting to all the drivers when the roadways are bad. <u>PLEASE BE PATIENT.</u>

Have the students at the Bus Stop and ready to board before the Bus arrives, (five minutes suggested), Board Policy. Please do not wait in your house or your car until the bus stops. The students need to be lined up and ready to board the bus when the bus arrives at the stop.

Have the students wait back from the edge of the road approximately ten feet and wait until the Bus has stopped and the door has opened or signaled by the driver to cross the road or approach the bus.

When crossing the road use the proper procedures, wait for driver to signal, stop at the center of the road and check traffic on their own before crossing to their home side, proceeding to their place of safety, again about ten feet from the edge of the road, and wait until the bus leaves before proceeding home.

Clear a path to the bus stop, sidewalk or yard.

Have the students dressed for the weather; boots, coats, gloves.

Fifth grader Brooklyn Ollis won Third Place OVERALL out of over 140 competitors!


