## **Kindergarten Registration**

Parents living in the Firelands school district with children who will be five years old by August 1, 2020 should plan on registering for kindergarten during one of the following registration days.

- March 3, 2020 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.
- March 4, 2020 3:30 p.m. to 7:00 p.m.

On both days, the Board of Education office will be open for registration assistance. The office is located at 112 North Lake Street in South Amherst.

Parents living out of the district should apply for open enrollment starting February 3. This step must happen prior to kindergarten registration. More information about open enrollment is on page 2.

Final acceptance for kindergarteners via open enrollment will be confirmed by email from the Firelands Board of Education.

Kindergarten screening is a separate event that is scheduled for Thursday, May 21. Children will be signed up for a kindergarten screening timeslot during the registration process.

If you are planning to attend one of these registration events, please plan to bring your child's birth certificate, 2 proofs of residency, parent/guardian photo id, shot records, and custody papers (if they apply). If you have any questions about the registration process, please contact the elementary school office at (440) 965-5381.

## **Dan Pycraft**

A tireless advocate for Firelands, Dan Pycraft has 18 years of service as a board member. His Endowment Fund Committee involvement takes him back to 1991. But if you want to know when Dan first became a Falcon, it was when he moved to the district in 4<sup>th</sup> grade. As a student, he lived in Camden, but has also lived in the Birmingham area, South Amherst and Henrietta as an adult.

Dan and his wife, Bev, both graduated from Firelands and have been married for 46 years. The Falcon pride has been passed down to their daughter, Heather, and son, Brent. Both are Firelands graduates from the classes of 2001 and 2003 respectively. Both of their grandchildren are beginning their own Firelands stories – one is in kindergarten, and one is at the Henrietta preschool.

## **Open Enrollment Starts Feb. 3**

Starting Monday, February 3<sup>rd</sup>, the Firelands Local School District will be accepting open new K-12 enrollment applications for the 2020-2021 school year. Parents from any school district in Ohio are welcome to apply, but space is limited and will be awarded on a first come, first served basis. Enrollment is tuition free, but parents must pay for all school fees.

If a grade level closes, we will still encourage parents to complete the open enrollment application and will maintain waiting lists until July 1<sup>st</sup>. On July 1<sup>st</sup>, open enrollment will end for the 2020-2021 school year.

This year we are using an online application that is easily accessible and will allow you fill it out and submit it without having to come in person. All forms are submitted electronically and time-stamped, so we will know when it was sent.

This online application does provide space for you to upload documents in PDF format, such as IEP, WEP or 504 plans. Parents of high school students also need to submit their last report card.

The application will be posted at <a href="www.firelandsschools.org">www.firelandsschools.org</a> under the "student registration" section. There will be a news article on the front page of the website as well, linking you to the application location.

Official notification of your status will come from the Superintendent's Office by email throughout the process. Please contact Sue Schaefer in the Superintendent's Office at 440-965-5821 if you have questions or are having any problems with the electronic form. We will provide a Google Chromebook at the board office if you wish to come in person and apply here.

RETURNING Open Enrollment Parents: If your child was open-enrolled last year, you must confirm that they are continuing by filling out the quick online form. It will be found in the same location, on the "student registration" page of the website. You will receive confirmation of their continued open-enrollment by email from the Superintendent's Office. You will also be sent an email about this process through PowerSchool.

# FHS Artists show at Cleveland Clinic expressions Exhibition

The FHS Art Department continues its legacy with inclusion in the esteemed Cleveland Clinic eXpressions competition. Sophomore Amanda Mitchell and junior Jillian Fitz have works selected for the show. Amanda earned a Red Ribbon award (2nd place) with her painted composite illustrating the effects of childhood and adolescent stress on adulthood heart disease. Jillian sculpted a work dramatically demonstrating the effect of one drop of blood to damage a heart using a needle suspended over a balloon

for a Blue Ribbon 1st place award. They join a legacy of 19 Firelands artists who have been honored in this exhibition since 2008. Of the nearly 1,400 works entered from 59 schools, only 74 were accepted for exhibition.

The Cleveland Clinic Office of Civic Education hosts the annual eXpressions: An Intersection of Art and Science. Art students from high schools from around the country interpreted research conducted by Cleveland Clinic high school summer interns. The process includes research and writing to gain an understanding of the topic. All Art 3, Art 4,

Advanced and AP Studio Art students selected their own studies to illustrate from a tight list of 15 summer projects. The art students read for understanding, orally presented, conceptually illustrated and composed brief artist statements for their entries.

A panel of art educators, medical researchers, medical illustrators, photographers, media and public health professionals evaluate each submission on interpretation, creativity, presentation, and initiative. The judges awarded four levels of recognition. Blue Ribbon winners receive \$100. Red Ribbon winners receive \$75: White Ribbon winners, \$50; and Honorable Mention winners, \$25.

# 1969-70 **Basketball** Team Honored

The 1969-1970 Boys Basketball team took to the court one more time on January 10th when they reunited for the 50th anniversary of their winning, record setting season.

Those present were: Janet Normando Leonard, cheerleader; Ken Davis, Manager; Bob Campbell, forward; Dick Kinsley, guard; Duane Miller, forward; Chuck Morgan, guard and forward; Dan Walker, forward and center; Jerry Draga, guard; Ed Kothe, guard; Kevin Bates, center; Joe Campbell, forward; and Tim Schrader, forward.

Their accomplishments were many that season. They were the first Firelands basketball team to score more than 100 points in a game, 118-92, vs South Amherst. They were also the first Firelands basketball team to go undefeated in the regular season (18-0) and became both conference and sectional champions. Then they became the first Firelands basketball team to win a District tournament championship, followed by winning a regional tournament semifinal game and advancing to the regional finals.

The celebration on January 10th also remembered and honored Coach Jim Knox, who recently passed away. Coach Knox was named Inland Coach of the Year and also the North-East district Co-Coach of the year in 1970.

After the game, team members continued the celebration in the FHS cafeteria. Thanks to everyone who worked hard to make this event a wonderful success!

## **Feeding Firelands Students in Need**

#### **How Food Service Donations and Emergency Funds Work**

The Firelands Food Service department has a donation and emergency account that allows us to serve students who cannot pay for their meal. This was started by donations from a church and anonymous donors.

When a student simply forgets their lunch and uses the emergency account, we rely on them to reimburse the account. Because the funds are limited, we welcome donors to replenish it as well.

The Food Service department is self-supporting, meaning we rely on meal payments to cover operating expenses. Negative meal accounts create a strain on the department.

The Donation/Emergency
Account must be replenished
so funds are always available to
help students. Activity from this
account is NOT connected to
PaySchools. A separate account
keeps track of emergency fund
usage and reports are available
upon request.

The Food Service department works hard to make sure that eligible families receive the free meals they qualify for through Direct Certifications. For example, the direct certification report must be run at least three times each year, but Judy Baumann runs it six times per year to catch any newly eligible students.

Meal applications can be filled out anytime at <a href="www.payschoolscentral.com">www.payschoolscentral.com</a>, which is also the online payment system. Paper applications are available in each school office.

All meal accounts should have a positive balance. If parents are having a difficult time, they should contact Judy at (440) 965-5821 x. 1011.

There is a charge policy in place at <a href="www.firelandsschools.">www.firelandsschools.</a>
<a href="org/FoodService.aspx">org/FoodService.aspx</a>. While this is the official policy, Firelands provides a higher level of service to our students.

Some highlights of the Charge Policy are as follows:

Meal Charging: We must comply with state guidelines by maintaining a system to account for charged meals (both reduced and full pay). No ala carte items (including milk) may be charged - only a full breakfast or a full lunch. If charges are outstanding, students cannot purchase ala cart items for cash. The cash will be collected and credited to the account.

Students in K-8 are permitted to charge up to 3 meals. On the fourth day, the student will receive an alternate meal of peanut butter graham bar, fruit, vegetable and milk, which will be charged to the account.

High school students are not permitted to charge.

Daily Low Balance Calls:
Parents and guardians will be called daily when a student's account is in the negative.
When the charge limit has been reached, parents are expected to provide the child with a packed lunch from home.

## **FES Students Participate in Mock Trial**

Students in Mrs. Dempsey's 5th grade gifted ELA class participated in a Mock Trial experience on Thursday, December 5th, which was hosted by the Educational Service Center of Lorain County Gifted Department. The event was held at the Lorain County Justice Center in Elyria, where gifted classes in grades 5 - 8 from several school districts met to try their cases in real courtrooms. with real judges who donated their time to this valuable learning opportunity.

Students worked hard to learn courtroom terminology, the parts of a trial, how to question

a witness through both direct and cross examination, and discovering and supporting facts and evidence. Magistrate Adam Bryda of the Lorain County Court System worked closely with the students and offered advice about the trial process.

On the day of the field trip, the class stepped into the courtroom as 6 young defense attorneys, prepared with opening and closing statements, as well as questions for direct and cross exam of 6 witnesses, and with 3 defense witnesses who knew their affidavits inside and out. The defense attorneys confidently played

their parts, which demanded listening closely for details, and demonstrated their ability to think on their feet. The bailiff showed his leadership skills as he took charge of the process and also swore in each witness. Other students served as jurors on a criminal case tried by two other participating schools.

What a rewarding way to learn about our judicial system and future career possibilities!

# School Immunization Requirements for 2019-2020

If your child will be entering 12<sup>th</sup> grade, 7<sup>th</sup> grade or any grade for the first time -- it is now time to update immunizations. If entering school for the first time, or after attending school elsewhere, please be sure to check that your child is in compliance with State of Ohio immunization requirements.

- Kindergarten once your child has reached age 4, s/he can complete all required immunizations for diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus (DPT), polio (IPV), hepatitis B (HBV), measles mumps, rubella (MMR), and varicella (chickenpox). If going to be entering kindergarten next year, if possible, have them done and bring a copy of the record to Kindergarten screening in May.
- **Grades 1-6** same requirements as for Kindergarten
- Grades 7-10 grades K-6 requirements plus Tdap (DPT booster) and MCV (meningococcal vaccine)
- **Grade 11** grades K-6 requirements plus Tdap (received in 7th grade or later)
- Grade 12 grade 11 requirements plus MCV (must be received at age 16 or older)

Remember to bring your child's immunization records with you when you go to your healthcare provider or clinic. Please send a copy of the immunization record to the school nurse in your child's building, being sure your child's name is on it. Don't forget to keep a copy for yourself!

We have a few more activities in the works for 2020 that we will share at a later date. Once again your support is greatly appreciated.



#### **Immunization Requirements, continued**

**Lorain County Public Health**, 9880 S. Murray Ridge Rd., Elyria, OH 44035 is now offering immunizations (also known as vaccines) Monday through Friday, 8:30 am – 3:30 pm, with evening hours throughout the month. A full vaccine clinic schedule is available at **www.LorainCountyHealth.com**.

Appointments are encouraged, although walk-ins are accepted. Call **440-284-3206** for information or to make an appointment for both children and adults. Bring all immunization records, insurance cards, and cash or check; although some children may be eligible for discounts under the Vaccines for Children (VFC) program. All children under age 18 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.







**Note:** Ask your provider about additional vaccines that are recommended for children ages 11-19 such as 2<sup>nd</sup> dose of varicella (chickenpox), hepatitis A and human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccines.
