Firelands Local Schools is proud to announce a collaboration between local volunteers and Firelands Elementary School that has resulted in the creation of the **S.H.I.N.E. PROGRAM!** 

### Supporting Helping Inspiring Nurturing Empowering

Pastor Phipps from the Henrietta United Methodist Church and members of his congregation were looking for a way that they could support children in our district. Pastor Phipps met with Principal Mrs. Sun Choe, Assistant Principal Mrs. Laura Groboske, Director of Educational Services, Mrs. Lori Roemer, and Superintendent, Mr. Mike Von Gunten to discuss how the volunteers could support our children and staff. It was concluded that intervention support in reading was an area that these volunteers could make a positive impact.

After many months of discussion and planning the S.H.I.N.E. program is ready to begin! Volunteers will be working with 1<sup>st</sup> graders on active reading skills. They have been paired with students who will benefit from personal reading time. Once a week the volunteers will meet their student to read the child's book of choice with the child rather than just reading the book to the child. Engaging the child with open ended questions encourages children to think and talk about what they are reading. Research has shown that active reading improves a child's language skills, vocabulary, and the ability to understand what they read on their own. After the teams read their book three times, the student will be able to take the book home with them!

All of the volunteers have had in-depth background checks and parents/guardians have been informed. An initial training session was held on October 8<sup>th</sup> for volunteers to further understand the expectations of the program and for students to meet their volunteers. The reading teams had breakfast together and the students picked out their first book!

#### **PTG (Parent Teacher Group)**



## **Golfers Finish Strong, Talbott Goes to State**

The Falcons Golf Team finished the season with a number of tournaments.

On September 19 they took 3rd place in the LC8 Conference Tournament at the Medina Country Club with a team score of 365. Scoring summary was: Jackson Talbott, 78; Aaron Urban, 89; Steven Iwanek, 99; and Sonny Suglia, 99.

Jackson Talbott earned the Conference Player of the Year and 1st team honors. Steven Iwanek and Aaron Urban earned 2nd team all LC8 while Will Folley and Sonny Suglia took home 3rd team awards.

the Firelands community. The first phase of our project is for community members aged 60 and over as well families with disabilities.

### **Know! To Practice Good Sportsmanship**

The benefits of participating in sports are vast. Sports help build character, boost self-confidence, strengthen perseverance, promote discipline, enhance physical and emotional health, develop teamwork skills and promote healthy competition. Sports also provide children with additional supervision and mentors to help guide them as they grow, which is monumental.

In fact, a study by Big Brothers Big Sisters shows that youth are 52 percent less likely to skip school and 46 percent less likely to use drugs when they have a caring adult mentor in their lives. Sports also give young people a focus, and another reason to say "no" to substance use and other risky behaviors.

As parents, we should recognize the importance of athletics, and show appreciation for our team coaches and sports officials, who are most likely out there not only because they enjoy the sport, but because they care about our young people.

Yet, according to the

Ohio High School Athletic Association (OHSAA), sports leaders are not feeling the love. When over 2,000 high school athletic directors were asked in a national survey what they liked least about their job, 62 percent said it was "dealing with aggressive parents and adult fans." Sports officials agreed, with nearly 80 percent having quit their job after the first two years - due primarily to unruly parents.

Because of this, there is a growing shortage of high school officials. No officials would mean no more games, which would be tragic for so many youth. For this reason, the OHSAA issued a stern warning to parents and fans in a recent press release. Though it is geared toward high school athletics, it can be a lesson applied to parents of various age groups.

If you are a parent attending a high school athletic event this year, you can help by following these six guidelines:

Act Your Age. You are, after all, an adult. Act in a way that makes your family and school proud.

**Don't Live Your Life Vicariously Through Your** Children. High school sports are for them, not you. Your family's

reputation is not determined by how well your children perform on the field of play.

Let Your Children Talk to the Coach Instead of You Doing It for Them. High school athletes learn how to become more confident, independent and capable—but only when their parents don't jump in and solve their problems for them.

Stay in Your Own Lane. No coaching or officiating from the sidelines. Your role is to be a responsible, supportive parentnot a coach or official.

**Remember, Participating** in a High School Sport Is Not About Getting a College Scholarship. According to the NCAA, only about 2 percent of all high school athletes are awarded a sports scholarship, and the total value of the scholarship is only about \$18,000.

Make Sure Your Children Know You Love Watching Them Play. Do not critique your child's performance on the car ride home. Participating in high school sports is about character development, learning and having fun-not winning and losing.

In closing, the OHSAA reminds parents and other fans that purchasing a ticket to an athletic event does not give them

the right to be rude, disrespectful or verbally abusive. Instead, all fans are encouraged to cheer loud and proud, while being responsible and respectful, and to keep in mind that the future of sports - and the well-being of many of our children - depend on it.

## School Immunization Requirements for 2019-2020

If your child will be entering 12<sup>th</sup> grade, 7<sup>th</sup> grade or any grade for the first time -- it is now time to update immunizations. If entering school for the first time, or after attending school elsewhere, please be sure to check that your child is in compliance with State of Ohio immunization requirements.

- Kindergarten once your child has reached age 4, s/he can complete all required immunizations for diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus (DPT), polio (IPV), hepatitis B (HBV), measles mumps, rubella (MMR), and varicella (chickenpox). If going to be entering kindergarten next year, if possible, have them done and bring a copy of the record to Kindergarten screening in May.
- **Grades 1-6** same requirements as for Kindergarten
- Grades 7-10 grades K-6 requirements plus Tdap (DPT booster) and MCV (meningococcal vaccine)
- **Grade 11** grades K-6 requirements plus Tdap (received in 7th grade or later)
- Grade 12 grade 11 requirements plus MCV (must be received at age 16 or older)

Remember to bring your child's immunization records with you when you go to your healthcare provider or clinic. Please send a copy of the immunization record to the school nurse in your child's building, being sure your child's name is on it. Don't forget to keep a copy for yourself!

**Lorain County Public Health**, 9880 S. Murray Ridge Rd., Elyria, OH 44035 is now offering immunizations (also known as vaccines) Monday through Friday, 8:30 am – 3:30 pm, with evening hours throughout the month. A full vaccine clinic schedule is available at **www.LorainCountyHealth.com**. Appointments are encouraged, although walk-ins are accepted. Call **440-284-3206** for information or to make an appointment for both children and adults. Bring all immunization records, insurance cards, and cash or check; although some children may be eligible for discounts under the Vaccines for Children (VFC) program. All children under age 18 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

**Note:** Ask your provider about additional vaccines that are recommended for children ages 11-19 such as 2<sup>nd</sup> dose of varicella (chickenpox), hepatitis A and human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccines.
