As we end the 2012-2013 school year, I feel compelled to highlight the many services that our schools and students engage in to help the community and to serve others. Throughout the year, various school organizations sponsor service-learning projects to support identified needs across the region and our nation. This year's activities include:

Firelands High School

Our Teen Leadership Corp, led by FHS counselor Diane Zimmer, engaged in the following service projects:

- ♦ Buckle Up Campaign, which we won for the first time in Lorain County.

Our FFA chapter, led by Shanna Finnegan, engaged in the following service projects :

♦ Students in the FFA participated in the Invest to Fight Hunger National FFA Grant program. Only 30 schools in the USA piloted the program. Firelands FFA gave presentations to leaders at FHS, FFA officers from neighboring schools, the Ashland FFA Leadership Night, and to FHS teachers. Students donated 28 hours to the Second Harvest Food Bank.

FFA members organized the Harvest for America Food Drive and collected canned goods at the high school. Over 2000 pounds of food were donated to the First United Methodist Church in South Amherst. This is the only food pantry that directly serves our school district.

♦ Firelands FFA members collected over \$1000 in pocket change to buy gifts for four Firelands families for our annual Christmas Family Community Service.

♦ FFA members donated over 1400 hours of community service in individual community service activities. Chrissy Balint logged the most hours at nearly 200 hours!

♦ FFA members, with members from Wellington and the LCJVS, planned and conducted the annual County Wide Food for America agricultural literacy event for inner city fourth graders at the Lorain County Fairgrounds.

South Amherst Middle School

♦ SAMS students provided 500 books during the book fair week that were donated to FES teachers for creating classroom libraries. Sponsorship of the project was through the PTG at SAMS and FES

- Donated clothing to the needy
- ♦ Thanksgiving meals for the needy (6th Grade Service Project)

SAMS Projects:

♦ The eighth grade students stopped at Shanksville, PA and dropped off funds that they have collected for victims and for memorial up-keep from the tragedy of September 11, 2001. The class also collaborated with the Village of South Amherst to work on beautifying the cemetery grounds. In addition, students filled milk jugs with toiletry and various other personal hygiene items that were given to a local homeless shelter.

♦ The sixth grade students added service time into their daily schedule while attending the sixth grade outdoor adventure. The students performed various tasks to help clean-up and prepare the campgrounds for the 2013 season. The students cleaned debris from the beach, cleared brush from walking paths, cleaned up trash that blew into the woods during the winter, cleaned up the wetland trails, and many other tasks asked of them by the camp administration. ♦ A large group of FES families and staff members also purchased toys and clothing to help some of our own Firelands families.

Through their efforts, our students, staff, and community have truly made a difference in the lives of many people. Thank you for your willingness to reach out and lend a hand to those in need. This is an important lesson that I hope our students will carry with them for their entire lives.

Firelands FFA Members Make School History at State FFA Convention Columbus, OH - On May 2nd and 3rd, four Firelands FFA members that were previously selected at state evaluation as the top four Proficiency Award finalists in the state, interviewed to determine final placings. The Agricultural Proficiency Awards honor FFA members who, through their Supervised Agricultural Experience Project (SAE), have developed specialized skills that they can apply toward their future careers. An SAE program is the actual, hands-on application of concepts and principles learned in the agricultural education classroom. Students are supervised by agricultural education teachers in cooperation with parents, employers and other adults who assist them in the development and achievement of their educational and career goals.

Students can compete for awards in 47 areas covering everything from Agricultural Communications to Wildlife Management. Each award area has two categories, placement and entrepreneurship. Placement proficiency awards are given to those whose SAEs are related to employment, apprenticeships, or internships at an agribusiness or agriculture-related organization.

Entrepreneurship proficiency awards are given to those whose SAEs are related to ownership of an agribusiness or agriculture-related organization.

Proficiency awards are given out at the local, state and national levels.

Ten Firelands FFA members applied for eleven district awards categories in January. All ten applications placed either first or second in the district, all of the applications were ranked at the state level with five applications being selected as top four in state. The top four in state participants had to create displays for the Hall of Champions at the Ohio Expo Center in Columbus that were viewed by about 7,000 FFA members and guests of the State FFA Convention. They interviewed with judges and were placed. They crossed the stage and placings were announced.

Emma, the daughter of Scott and Joy Northeim will move on to the national proficiency contest because she earned first in state! Jessica Zurcher also applied for a Poultry Production Proficiency hecause she raises fancy chickens, meat chickens, turkeys,

ART 3 STUDENTS EXPERIENCE RAKU

The Art 3 class continued the tradition of raku firing under the stadium on May 30. Raku is a traditional Japanese method of lowfiring wares used in a typical tea ceremony. The



project began with a Young Audiences residency in 2007 when artist George Woideck brought all the equipment and materials for a raku firing. Along with teaching those students, he instructed art teacher Laura Tawil how to continue the project for years to come. The students prepared wheel-thrown bowls, applied custom-made raku glazes and participated in safe the transferring of work in and out of the kiln and chambers. They took advantage of the heat to make a little lunch, too.




