As we end the 2013-2014 school year, I feel compelled to highlight the many services that our schools and students engage in to help the community and to serve others.

Our FFA chapter, led by Shanna Finnegan, engaged in the following service projects:

- FFA members organized the Harvest for America Food Drive and collected canned goods at the high school during first period classes and during the school wide career day/service afternoon with a corn hole tournament. Over 2200 pounds of food were donated to the First United Methodist Church in South Amherst. This is the only food pantry that directly serves our school district.
- Firelands FFA members collected over \$1200 in pocket change to buy gifts for four Firelands families for our annual Christmas Family Community Service.
- FFA members donated over 1600 hours of community service in individual community service activities.
   Claire Vilagi logged the most hours at nearly 200 hours!
- FFA members, with members from Wellington and the LCJVS, planned and conducted the annual County Wide Food for America Agricultural Literacy event for inner city fourth graders at the Lorain County Fairgrounds.

- Through donations, needy families provided Wal-Mart

gift during the Christmas season for Firelands Families.

#### **SAMS Projects:**

- ♦ The sixth grade students added service time into their daily schedule while attending the sixth grade outdoor adventure. The students performed various tasks to help clean-up and prepare the campgrounds for the 2014 season. The students cleaned debris from the beach, cleared brush from walking paths, cleaned up trash that blew into the woods during the winter, cleaned up the wetland trails, and many other tasks asked of them by the camp administration. The Beulah Beach staff is appreciative of our students and their efforts they look forward to our continued service.
- ♦ The eighth grade students participated in two service projects May 22, 2014. All eighth grade students did cleaning and landscaping duties at SAMS and at the Evergreen Cemetery across the street. SAMS teachers coordinate this project with the cemetery board of the Village of South Amherst and with the SAMS maintenance department. In the days leading up to the projects during their FIRE period, SAMS eighth graders learn about the importance of service and about different types of service.

- Approximately 500 toys were donated by FES students and given to the Salvation Army to distribute to area families in need through the Not Forgotten Box toy collection.
- Thirty FES children were matched with other FES families, the FFA, and local churches and businesses to shop for children at Christmas.

Through their efforts, our students, staff, and community have truly made a difference in the lives of many people. Thank you for your willingness to reach out and lend a hand to those in need. This is an important lesson that I hope our students will carry with them for their entire lives.

### <u>FIRELANDS FFA CELEBRATES A VERY SUCCESSFUL YEAR</u>

Columbus, OH - Twenty three members of the Firelands FFA attended the Ohio FFA Convention on May 1st & 2nd. Jesse Jones, Tom Schuman, Patrick Stewart, Katy Tuggle, and Aaron Wickes all qualified and played for the Ohio FFA band. Congratulations to Chrissy Balint, Karlie Canfield, Demi Dovin, Jody Hanko, and Cole Lewis for earning the State FFA Degree, only about 2% of all FFA members will earn this degree. Mrs. Finnegan also was privileged to earn the Honorary State FFA Degree, the highest honor a supporter can earn in the state. Brandon Palmer received the Children's Hospital Key Donor Award on behalf of the chapter. Chrissy Balint and Emma Ranney represented the chapter as they received the Gold Rated Chapter Award; a first for Firelands. Chrissy Balint also was the first Firelands FFA member to make the state officer ballot. The following members were awarded a gold rating for their exceptional work while in office - Mikayla Haback - secretary, Cole Jones - treasurer, and Ali Butler - reporter. Five Firelands FFA members were identified as top-four-instate for their outstanding Supervised Agricultural Experience Projects prior to convention. Each of these students filled out a 20-30 page application, set up a display, and interviewed with judges to determine their final placings. Firelands tied two other Ohio schools for the most state wins! Congratulations to Alex Sabine - 4th place in Ohio for Fruit Production Placement and Demi Dovin earned 2nd place in state for Dairy Production Entrepreneurship. David Tipple won the Organic Agriculture Proficiency for his organic corn operation. Jessica Zurcher won Specialty Animal Production for her white dove release business. Amanda Spears, after placing second in state for the last two years, won the state in Diversified Horticultural Placement for her work at Hook's Greenhouse. Firelands FFA was also honored to receive second place in Ohio for fruit sales from the Florida Farm Bureau Fruit Marketing Association. \$579.50 was donated to the Ohio FFA Foundation on behalf of the Firelands FFA because of the excellent fruit sale.

The students that attended convention practiced leadership and developed relationships with students from all over the state of Ohio while listening to key note speakers, enjoying convention award sessions and doing activities between sessions like visiting a trade show, alpaca show, talent show, animal clinics, and team building activities. The attendance of convention was over 7,000 students, teachers, and supporters

## New for Next School Year - BYOD

Firelands Local Schools is proud to announce a new technology initiative for students starting next fall. Beginning the 2014 – 2015 school year, students at South Amherst Middle School and Firelands High School will be allowed to bring their electronic devices to school and use them as part of the District's BYOD program. BYOD (*Bring Your Own Device*) is centered on students using devices not owned by the district such as smartphones, tablets, eReaders, and laptops for educational use.

Firelands Local Schools worked with MCPc, Inc to upgrade the core network infrastructure and establish wall-to-wall wireless coverage in the buildings in the summer of 2013 in preparation to support the BYOD initiative. The belief is that with students bringing their own devices to school that it will promote an exciting shift in how they use them. Typically, student-owned devices are used for social or entertainment purposes, but with BYOD their use expands to also become collaboration and learning tools that can be used to engage the student with the content in hopes of promoting lifelong learning habits.

## KEY FACTS & GUIDELINES ABOUT THE FIRELANDS LOCAL SCHOOLS BYOD PROGRAM

\* Do I need to purchase a device for my student?

This initiative does not require the purchase of any device by our students or families. District devices will be available for students to meet curriculum and instructional expectations.

\* Who is responsible for damage, loss, or theft of devices that students bring to school?

Any device a student brings to school is their sole responsibility. Firelands Local Schools takes no responsibility to search for lost or stolen devices nor is there any assumption of financial responsibility by Firelands Schools for damaged, lost, or stalen personal devices.

\* How will you monitor what my student is viewing on the Internet?

Devices brought to school will <u>only</u> access the filtered, BYOD Wi-Fi network to prevent excess data fees to their personal accounts (no 3G, 4G, or mobile hotspot access will be permitted).

\* When can my student use their device at school?

Your student's teacher will determine when and how personal electronic devices may be used in his/her classroom. The student's electronic device must be turned off when not in use.

\* Will my student need to have a signed form on file to use their device?

Yes. In order for Firelands Local Schools to supervise student use of the district network and the Internet, the Acceptable Use Policy (AUP) must be read and the BYOD form must be signed by the student and guardians for all students who want to bring and use their own technology.

There were many individual performances that deserve recognition. We also had many All Conference runners. I will list our Conference Champions: 4 x 800 (Michael Adkins, Cullen Grude, Patrick Brightbill, & Derek Reynolds) 4 x 400 (Michael Adkins, Derek Reynolds, Cole Lewis, & Jordan Ruffner) 110 HH---Cole Lewis, 800 M--- Derek Reynolds. Brennan Crawford, Cullen Grude, Rob Becker, Michael Adkins, Cole Lewis, Jordan Ruffner, Patrick Brightbill, Colin Myers, 4 x 200 (Colin Smith, Jeb Larson, Colin Myers, & Noah Larson) were all All Conference. The team has high aspirations for next season and will be working towards earning a trip to Columbus.

The Girls Track Season was one of ups and downs. We had some nice individ-

ual performances but lack of numbers in the running events and some key injuries reflected on the team score. We ended up 8th in the PAC Conference this year with 38 points. Our top individual performances were turned in by the 4 x 800 with a time of 10:50 (Tori Hritsko, Nikki Crawford, Jess Beran & Erica Wasem), 400 M—Erica Wasem 64.8, 3200 M—Jess Beran 12:45, 1600 M--- Jess Beran---5:57, High Jump---Dalanay Rogala—5'1", Long Jump Dalanay Rogala—15'1", Discus---Summer Adkins---88', Shot Put--- Heather Smyth—27'1" There are very few seniors on the team and with a little luck the team should improve greatly.

 $\underline{\textbf{SOFTBALL}}$  The varsity softball team had a roller coaster season with winning streaks of 3 & 5 games, and losing streaks of 5 & 7 games, ending with a record of 11-15 (7-9 in conference). We played our best games against Wellington & Brookside, beating each team twice, and run ruling Oberlin & Avon Lake. Our most exciting win came against Trinity at the Akron Racers Spring Showcase Tournament where we were losing 11-5 in the 5th. Then our first 2 batters made outs before all 9 girls reached base safely scoring 7 runs to win 12-11, the highlight being Hailey Blankenship's home run. A great finish to a fun weekend in Akron. Other highlights were 2 players, Lexi Shick & Alex Willis, hitting home runs over our new fence. The fence, plus the new crushed brick infield gave us one of the nicest fields in the county & conference. Emma Ranney had a stellar season, leading the team in most hitting & pitching categories. Her batting average of .532 & slugging % of .706 made her a first team All-Lorain County selection. Second team selections were center fielder Cassidi Kowalski (slugging % of .647) and "play anywhere" Alex Willis (slugging % of .510), who skillfully played 6 positions. All-County Honorable Mention was Sam Hribal, who pitched and batted cleanup the last half of the season and tied for team lead in RBI's with 22, and slugged at a .529 clip. Our emotional leader was infielder Amanda Spears who, along with Brittany Reising at shortstop, both made some nice plays defensively and had slugging % near .400. Nicole "Skinny" Rainey had a very solid year behind the plate and will be missed along with the rest of the seniors. We had fun playing once the rains stopped and hope to improve on those winning streaks next year The JV Softball team had a great season going 12-3 overall and 8-2 in the PAC. The team has shown improvements the entire season. Leading the team offensively were Taylor Emery and Tori Hristko. Taylor Emery ended with a .489 with 17 RBI's. Tori Hritsko was right behind her with a .444 average Claire Vilagi led the team defensively as their pitcher with a 3.65 ERA in 13

games pitched and 0 errors.

 $\frac{\textbf{BASEBALL}}{\text{The Firelands varsity baseball team compiled a 9-16 record overall, going 6-10}}$ in the PAC. The young team, which was made up of 8 juniors and only 5 seniors, grew a lot of the course of year, with many players making big strides in their baseball abilities. After starting off the year with a pair of tough losses to Amherst and Avon Lake, the Falcons fought back, bringing their record to 2 -2, with a pair of conference wins over Brookside and Fairview. This year saw the team win tough games against Valley Forge, Bellevue, Buckeye, and Black River. The varsity compiled close to 200 hits on the season, with 31 of them going for extra bases. 9 different pitchers combine for a 3.66 ERA in conference play, striking out almost one hitter per inning. The team worked hard all year and made big strides. The players are excited to work hard in the offseason to continue to improve, and make even more strides next year. At the end of the season, many of the Falcon players received honors. Tristar Clark was names first team all Lorain County, while Joel Lawson, Kevin Rollins, and Garrett McKinney all received honorable mentions. Kevin Rollins was selected to play in the Lorain County Senior All Star Game hosted at Vermilion High School. Both, Frank Johnson and Joel Lawson were selected to play in the Greater Cleveland Baseball Coaches Association Senior All Star Game at Berea Midpark High School. Tristan Clark was also named first team all PAC, while Mitch Hildebrandt and Kevin Rollins were named second team all PAC. Garrett McKinney received honorable all PAC

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# Brownhelm Perfection & BB 4-H Club


