The best explanation that I can provide occurred in remarks delivered to the 1980 AIA National Convention in Cincinnati, Ohio on June 3, 1980, by J. Irwin Miller, chairman, executive, and finance committee member of Cummins Engine Company, Inc.

"I watch young men entering business. I will be happy, they say, if only I am elected vice president. A little later happiness lies in becoming president, or receiving an honorary degree. Toward the end, I will be happy if only I do not have to stop being boss at age 65.

I watch the young couple. Happiness for them lies in a pay raise, a larger house, a "better" neighborhood, a boat, a van, a club membership.

I watch the young musician. Happiness lies in winning a prize contest, a rave review, academic standing

review, academic standing.

But each goal, when achieved, melts in the hand, and once again happiness lies in the next "external" sign. These are the narcotics of "success," and like real narcotics, they lead only to a habit, which can never be satisfied. To be confident and at peace with themselves such persons think they must have the proof of an ever new "external" badge of worth, and so they are never either confident

or at peace.
All their lives they find the world a painful, unfair, miserable place. They have lost their aim. They never gain a solid feeling that at any point they have truly done the best of which they were capable. They have settled for success over

I will always encourage my sons to do the best of which they are capable. I believe that each parent in the Firelands community wishes the same for their son or daughter. I ask each parent to always believe in your child and provide them with the ability to succeed and achieve.

- 1982 Class AA state championship cross country team. He led Firelands boys to the only state team title in school history. He finished third overall in the team race with a time of 15:42.
- Five-time All-Ohio runner, three times for cross country and twice for track
- 1983-84, second place at the 1983 state meet by less than a second to Sandusky St. Mary's Tom Schnurr, 15:38.1 to 15:39. He was also second at the 1984 state meet in 15:48 to record-setting Scott Fry of Sandusky Perkins (14:50.2)—a record the still stands.
- 1984, third place at the Kinney Midwest Regional and 11th at the Kinney Nationals in San Diego to earn third team high school All-American honors
- 1984 85, two-time state placer for the 3,200 meters, finishing sixth (9:31.71) and third (9:25.30), respectively



# GUIDANCE

#### Senior Class Information

Senior exams will be Tuesday, May 28th, and Wednesday, May 29th. Senior make-up exams will be Friday, May 31st.

Senior Awards Breakfast will be held on Thursday, May 30th, at 8:00 a.m. The breakfast will be held in the FHS Gym and will be catered by Sterks. There is NO COST to the seniors, but they must turn their invitations into the Guidance office by Friday, May 18th, to reserve a seat at the breakfast. Winners of Local Scholarships, various Certificates and Awards, and the Student of the Year will be announced at the breakfast. If you do not attend the breakfast, you must show up to FHS by 10:00 a.m. for the practice.

Approximately 10:00 a.m., after the Senior Breakfast, Seniors will enter the high school stadium for graduation practice. Practice usually takes between  $1 - 1 \frac{1}{2}$  hours. You <u>must</u> be at practice to take part in the graduation ceremony. You must also have turned in your acknowledgment of commencement participation to the guidance office by Friday, May 24th, in order to participate in graduation.

Each senior must fill out a Senior Survey before they graduate. They will be available in the Guidance office and also handed out in Government classes. These surveys are needed for the Guidance office to be able to send Final Transcripts to the college they plan on attending. The students can also list the scholarships and awards they have won.

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# Attention: Parent/Guardian of Current 6th Grade Students:

Because of outbreaks of pertussis (whooping cough), the State of Ohio is now requiring students to have a diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis booster (DTP or Tdap) by the end of 6<sup>th</sup> grade. #### Spring Sport Summaries

After what seemed like an extended winter, spring appears to be here. Our spring sports season is in full swing. Here are the mid-season summaries as submitted by the coaches

#### High School Track

The Boys and Girls Track Teams have gotten off to a solid start. The weather has played a major roll on performances but the teams have persevered through the month of April. The boys are unbeaten in the conference meets defeating Clearview, Wellington, Keystone and Columbia. The girls have defeated Clearview, Wellington, Columbia and lost by only a couple points to Keystone. Both Boys and Girls Teams placed 3<sup>rd</sup> at the Nelson Howe Invitational which had 8 teams competing. The Boys were the top Division II team that ran at the Lorain County Invitational and the Girls were 3<sup>rd</sup> but only a half point out of second. I feel that both teams will compete for top honors at the PAC Conference Meet in two weeks.

#### Junior High Track

The boys middle school track team has had a successful season so far. The boys have won 1 quad meet, 3 tri-meets, and lost a close dual with Fairview to open the season. # DID YOU KNOW?

Did you know that April was Occupational Therapy month? Probably not because, who knows what Occupational Therapy is? Occupational Therapy is a field of work where the therapist helps a person regain skills they have lost with illness or injury or helps a person gain skills or function with the skills they have if delayed for some reason. They particularly work on the activities of daily life with fine motor skills which for a student are writing, typing, learning, and self care. Firelands has its own Occupational Therapist or OT, Lori Christofferson, primarily supporting special education but also providing some other interventions. She works at all the buildings with students K-12. In the fall, she instructs all the kindergartners on how to hold their pencil with a memorable and fun lesson. Exercises are sent home with all kindergarten packets to assist parents to help their child's fine motor progress. A few students at the much older level may need special training to prepare them for future employment. Students of any age may need extra help to be able to write efficiently and neatly. Occupational Therapist work in many locations like hospitals and nursing homes as well.

#### **OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY IN ACTION**

Below is a fun activity that Mrs. Mowry's class participated in as a therapy group at SAMS. Her students had studied the sea turtle in their current events newspaper called the News2 You. In their OT group, the students of varying abilities then practiced following a recipe, using utensils, folding shapes with their napkins, using fractions and working together. As a group, they used



special software with word prediction and text spoken out loud to write an informational paragraph about the sea turtle. Mrs. Mowry was very pleased with how much they remembered on their own about the lessons and how they created a paragraph together. Of course the most fun part was getting to eat their creations.
