FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT



On November 3rd the residents of the Firelands Local School District will have the opportunity to vote on a new, joined 6-8 and 9-12 building. On behalf of the Board of Education, I would like to thank all those that participated in the Building Advisory Committee and to the greater community for taking time to learn about our opportunity. As Election Day will be quickly upon us, please consider the following items:

QUICK FACTS RELATED TO THE BOND ISSUE

- Please remember to vote. Election Day is November 3rd with polls open from 6:30 am to 7:30 pm.
- The project calls for a new joined 6-8 and 9-12 building. In addition, a field house for student and community use, along with upgrades to our waste water treatment facility are included as part of the bond issue.
- At no cost to the district, a facilities assessment was completed at each of our buildings. Based on these assessments, both South Amherst Middle School and Firelands High School were found to be beyond repair and were recommended to be replaced.
- The timeline to complete the project is expected to take three years. This includes one year for design and approximately two years for construction. With passage this November, the building will be open for the 2019-2020 school year.
- Our district, through partnership with the Ohio Facilities Construction Commission, will receive \$6,238,379 from the State of Ohio. The local share of the project is \$29,461,285.
- The bond issue is for 5.7 mills for a period of 36 years. Included in the 5.7 mill bond issue is a .5 mill permanent improvement levy (required by law) that can only be used towards the maintenance of the new facility.
- District finances are stable and we do not expect to be on the ballot for a new operating levy until after 2020.
- Please visit the county auditor's website to determine their assessed

<u>value</u> of your home. A home with an assessed value of \$100,000 will cost the homeowner \$17.00 per month.

 Waiting any longer to address our facility needs will cost our district and our taxpayers more. Over the last several years our district has seen the State contribution amount continue to decrease. In addition, as our buildings continue to age, more resources will need to be diverted away from instructional programs in order to address the cost of maintaining our facilities.

In closing, as a graduate and lifelong resident, I recognize the significance of both buildings to their respective communities. As Mrs. Anne Callahan wrote in her letter to the community, "We, from our most humble one room schoolhouse beginning to our current three buildings, have a belief that education is the most precious gift we can give to children, and are willing to invest to that end." As residents of the Firelands Local School District, now is your opportunity to make an investment.



Family Connections – FHS School Counselors Diane Zimmer and Katie Goss made a presentation to the Firelands Board of Education on the implementation of Naviance for the students of Firelands High School. Family Connections is a Web-based resource that supports course, career, and college planning. It will be specific to FHS and linked with Naviance Succeed, a service that we use in the counseling office. Here is just a small sample of what this resource can do for our students; share plans, complete surveys, compare colleges, link to selected third-party resources, track deadlines, produce research graphs, and show a schedule of college visits coming to FHS. The counselors have done an outstanding job with this initiative, which will further assist our students in finding the right fit when it comes to col-

lege and career. Career Day '15—The School Counseling Department is once again sponsoring Career Day 2015. It will be held on Wednesday, October 14th at Firelands High School. The day will consist of a round robin of speakers for the freshman and PSAT or Practice ACT tests for the juniors and sophomores. All of the cost is covered by a grant from High Schools that Work, as these tests will help our students become more prepared for the ACT or SAT college entrance tests. The PSAT is also a qualifier for sophomores to become National Merit Scholarship Qualifiers. Seniors will be able to take a college visit, shadow a career, or take the ASVAB

aptitude test, which is for seniors who are seriously considering the military for a career. The afternoon will be filled with activities that help raise money for various charities which our student groups donate to. In all, it is an excellent day for our students to become more college and career ready, while also helping others in need.

CURRICULUM

UPDATES

Autumn is definitely in the air which means that we must be at least one month into the school year and I cannot believe how fast the year is already going! I am proud to see every teacher working every day to support our students at high levels.

To provide ongoing support to our staff, on Friday, September 25 (Waiver Day), teachers worked with several content area experts to learn more about content level expectations. Staff learned about math techniques that can be used to address mathematical thinking within the classroom, science technology tools, primary and secondary source techniques for the social studies classroom, and formative assessment technology tools to get at in depth understanding of texts in the language arts classroom. Teachers and support staff also met in teams to collaboratively determine various applications of the trainings within their respective classrooms. Elementary teachers were trained in Responsive Classroom and our guidance counselors worked to continue to implement the Naviance system that the district purchased last year to help improve college and career planning for our students. In the next few months, teachers will be working to adjust curriculum and instruction for students given the state-mandated changes to curriculum that stem from H.B. 64. Our teachers will continue to ensure that our students are prepared for 21st century learning while meeting state standards.

Please continue to monitor the Educational Services Website for information related to testing, curriculum, and instruction. The testing calendar has been updated as I have learned more about the testing windows and we reduced Acuity administration from three times to two. More information regarding updates to graduation requirements and curriculum expectations have also been posted. As more information becomes available, the page will be updated to reflect our districts' understanding of state mandates and expectations.

National School Bus Safety Week:

October 19th to October 23, 2015

This year's theme for School Bus Safety Week is "Bully Free Zone". This year at Firelands Elementary we are emphasizing that students are to: BE SAFE, BE RESPONSIBLE, and to BE RE-SPECTFUL while they are riding on the School bus. We will continue to emphasize staying out of the danger zone while waiting for the bus. Remember to stay back from the edge of the road at least 10 feet or 10 giant steps. Wait in a location visible by the bus driver. When getting off of the bus, make sure that you wait in your designated place of safety 10 giant steps away from the road until the bus leaves. During the week the driver's will be performing emer-gency evacuation drills as required by State Law with all grades, so expect some delays after school that week.


There will also be focus on other safety rules regarding bus safety and emergency exits. It is also important for you as parents to discuss bus stop safety, stranger danger and to have an emergency plan if no one is going to be home for them.

WARNING LIGHTS

- Alternating flashing amber (yellow) lights are to be used to warn motorist that the bus is stopping to take on or to discharge passengers.
- Alternating flashing red lights are to be used to inform motorist that the bus is stopped on the roadway to take on or discharge passengers.
- Stop arm shall be operated simultaneously with flashing red signal lights.

A white flashing strobe light, individually switched, may be used, when unfavorable atmospheric conditions or time of day limit visibility (i.e., fog, rain, snow, darkness).

- Four-way hazard lights shall be activated at railroad crossings and turn-arounds unless prohibited by local ordinance.
- Headlights should be actuated during operation of the school bus.

WARNING LIGHTS



CAUTION

Sometimes a school bus driver must do a turn-around.

- The bus will have its four-way hazard lights and backup lights on as it prepares to back into a side street to turn around.
- Motorists must use caution when they approach a bus in the process of completing a turn-around.




WHERE IS THE

The <u>danger zone</u> for a school bus is the area 10 feet around the bus.

The two most dangerous places are:

- Front of the bus
- ♦ Right rear tire area



WARNING:

Please take the time to check your children's clothing and book bags to make sure they are safe.

Drawstrings and key chains may catch on objects on the bus and increase danger!

Please talk to your child about the following safety rules:

- Avoid the danger zone around the bus.
- Don't try to pick up something dropped near the bus - the bus driver might not see you.
- Remember that some motorists don't always stop for a stopped school bus.
- Be careful whenever getting on or off the bus

WHY IT TAKES SO LONG AT BUS STOPS



SAFETY PROCEDURES ARE REQUIRED BY STATE LAW

THE SAFETY OF CHILDREN, AS THEY ARE TRANSPORTED TO AND FROM SCHOOL AND SCHOOL-RELATED EVENTS, IS OUR HIGHEST PRIORITY.

At bus stops state law requires drivers to follow these procedures:

- Check mirrors for traffic conditions and apply brakes well in advance to warn traffic from the rear.
- Actuate warning lights 300 feet prior to stop.
- Stop bus at designated stop.
- Set parking brake.
- Place the gear shift lever into neutral gear for both manual and automatic transmissions to prevent the bus from lunging forward.
- Open service door to actuate the warning lights and place hand over horn to warn students of potential hazards.
- Give students directions to go to their Designated Place of Safety and stay there until the bus leaves or signal students to board the bus from their Designated Place of Safety.
- Shift the gear lever into the starting gear, only after counting and confirming the students are in their Designated Place of Safety or safely in their seat.
- Look to identify students and potential hazards in the danger zone, counting and checking the
 mirrors, before closing the door and canceling the warning lights.
- Close the door when all areas are clear. Door must be closed before the bus moves.
- Release the parking brake after closing the door.
- Recheck traffic in the right and left side mirrors prior to pulling away.

Modification of these procedures may be necessary for preschool, kindergarten, and special needs students.





Motorists around school buses need to know the signals and the laws that concern school buses to help keep children safe:

- ♦ Do not pass a school bus that has red alternating flashing lights on. This is the signal that the bus is stopped to load or unload children. Traffic should not move until the bus resumes motion or the driver signals traffic to proceed.
- When a bus has alternating flashing amber (yellow) lights on, it is preparing to stop to load or unload children. Be ready to stop and watch for children in the roadway.

Parents ... are very important in helping keep children safe on the school bus. Here are some ways in which parents can help:

- Review the safety rules with children. Help them to understand why each rule is important.
- Dress children in light colored clothing or jackets on dark mornings.
- Help children to be ready at the stop before their bus arrives.
- Take turns supervising bus stops for smaller

Bus drivers...help to keep children safe in a number of ways:

- Drivers watch surrounding traffic closely to keep school children safe.
- Drivers will signal to children that need to cross the street only when traffic has stopped.
- In case an emergency vehicle approaches while loading or unloading, the driver will get the children to a place of safety until the emergency vehicle passes.

Cell phone use, texting and other hand held electronic devices: (3301-83-20)

(M) Except in cases of extreme emergency, cellular telephones, including hands-free and wireless devices, or other portable communication devices shall not be used by the driver while the school bus is in motion or while the driver is supervising the loading or unloading of students.

Students should also be advised by parents, teachers and bus drivers not to use cell phones or electronic devices when loading or unloading or when they may become a distraction to their own or others' safety.

Students need to remain free of distractions when crossing the street or waiting for the bus to arrive where traffic could be a hazard.

Ohio Law: 3301-83-13 School bus stops

(B) School bus stop location

- Pupils in grades kindergarten through eight may be required to walk up to one-half mile to a designated bus stop.
- School bus stops shall be established on the residence side of all four-lane highways and on the residence side of other roadways posing potential hazards to students as determined by school bus owners.
- (5) Each pupil shall be assigned and required to use a specific school bus stop except in unusual circumstances as approved by the school bus owner or designee.
- Each pupil shall be assigned a residence side designated place of safety. Driver must account for each pupil at designated place of safety before leaving. Pupils are not to proceed to their residence until the school bus has departed.

Pupil Transportation Operation and Safety Rules - September 2008

WHAT SHOULD YOU DO WHEN APPROACHING ANY SCHOOL BUS THAT IS STOPPED FOR THE PURPOSE OF RECEIVING OR DISCHARGING SCHOOL CHILDREN?

- If a bus is stopped on a street or road that has fewer than four lanes, all traffic proceeding in either direction must stop.
- If a bus is stopped on a street or road that has four or more lanes, only traffic proceeding in the same direction as the bus must stop.
- You must not proceed until the school bus resumes motion, or until signaled by the school bus driver to proceed.

If you fail to stop for a school bus, your error will not go unnoticed. Bus drivers will report the license plate number of any vehicle that fails to comply with the law to a law enforcement agency, and an investigation will be conducted to identify the driver for enforcement purposes.



Responsive Classroom at Firelands Elementary

In 2015-2016, a school-wide initiative is taking place at Firelands Elementary! Teachers and staff members attended a Responsive Classroom workshop on Waiver Day. Two representatives from the Center for Responsive Schools, Inc. visited our school to provide the staff with some introductory practices, routines and key skills. Teachers hold Morning meetings or Afternoon Wrap-Up sessions with their students each day to build a stronger sense of classroom community.

Teachers create a calm, orderly environment that promotes autonomy and allows students to focus on learning.

♦ Developmental Awareness

Teachers use knowledge of child development, along with observations of students, to create a developmentally- appropriate learning environment.




