Whenever I encounter problems in life, I identify the causes as clearly as possible, determine the desired outcomes, involve all parties concerned to develop a plan, and work collaboratively with those parties to create a desirable solution. Easy to do? Not really. Necessary? Absolutely!

In this time of direct, "in your face" political campaigning, coupled with the fear of change and uncertainty, we are presented with many messages each day ranging from the economy to education. Reflecting on each of these messages reinforces my belief that our countries greatest resource is our children, our youth. The children represent our future and our hope for the direction of our great nation. Creating the best educational environment for each child not only helps the children individually, but it is as important to our nation's future as any search for alternative energy or world diplomacy. Without developing the capabilities of our young people, we will decline as a society. Success is not something that can be attained by parents alone or schools alone—or churches alone—or government alone. It takes all of us, working together, to provide quality education for all of our children.

American novelist, William Faulkner (1897-1962), in his Nobel Prize Speech in January of 1951 speaks of fear:

'Our tragedy today is a general and universal physical fear so long sustained by now that we can even bear it. There are no longer problems of the spirit. There is only the question: when will I be blown up? Because of this, the young man or woman writing today has forgotten the problems of the human heart in conflict with itself which alone can make good writing because only that is worth writing about, worth the agony and the sweat.

He must learn them again. He must teach himself that the basset of all things is to be afraid; and teaching himself that, forget it forever, leaving no room in his workshop for anything but the old verities and truths of the heart, the old universal truths lacking which any story is ephemeral and

doomed -- love and honor and pity and pride and compassion and sacrifice.

Until he does so he labors under a curse. He writes not of love but of lust, of defeats in which nobody loses anything of value, of victories without hope and worst of all without pity or compassion. His griefs grieve on universal bones, leaving no scars. He writes not of the heart, but of the glands.

Until he relearns these things he will write as though he stood among and watched the end of man. It is easy to say that man is immortal simply because he will endure; but when the last ding-dong of doom has clanged and faded from the last worthless rock hanging tide-less in the last red and dying evening, that even then there will still be one more sound: that of his puny inexhaustible voice, still talking. I refuse to accept this. I believe that man will not merely endure: he will prevail. He is immortal, not because he alone among creatures has an inexhaustible voice, but because he has a soul, a spirit capable of compassion and sacrifice and endurance.

The poet's, the writer's, duty is to write about these things. It is his privilege to help man endure by lifting his heart, by reminding him of the courage and honor and hope and pride and compassion and pity and sacrifice which have been the glory of his past. The poet's voice need not merely be the record of man, it can be one of the props, the pillars to help him endure and prevail."

Through the perseverance of parents, teachers, and students, we will overcome our fear of uncertainty. The future is ours to behold. In the words of American economist, educator, and Dean of MIT's Sloan School of Management, Lester C. Thurow, "A competitive world has two possibilities for you. You can lose. Or, if you want to win, you can change."



FIRELANDS LOCAL SCHOOL DISTRICT TO FOCUS ON BUS SAFETY OCT. 22-26

Next week throughout Ohio and the nation in celebrating the importance of National School Bus Safety Week.

This year's theme, "I SEE THE DRIV-ER – THE DRIVER SEES ME", reminds students to be cautious any time they must cross the street. Students need to cross where they can be seen by the bus driver and also need to watch for traffic. The greatest risk to our children is when they are outside the school bus. Student injuries and fatalities occur as a result of motorists who attempt to pass a stopped school bus with flashing red warning lights while students load or unload.

Nearly one million Ohio students ride on school buses each day, and over 15,000 bus drivers are dedicated to providing safe transportation for children in the state. National studies show school buses are the safest method for transporting young people – up to 22 times safer than passenger cars.

Ensuring the safety of students as they enter and exit the bus is crucial, We are training our bus drivers to be cautious, but we need help from parents to make sure they watch for school buses stopped to load and unload children. No issue is so urgent that motorists cannot wait for a school bus.

Ohio Revised Code 4511.75 requires motorists to stop for a school bus anytime it has stopped to load or unload. In Ohio those buses will display red flashing lights as well as a stop sign on the side of the bus. Motor-

ists may not resume motion until the school bus has resumed motion. Bus drivers in Ohio are required to file reports with law enforcement when motorists pass them. In some communities cameras are being used to facilitate this reporting.

Here are some tips to remind your child while getting off and on the bus:

- ☐ Always remain in direct eyesight of the bus driver:
- ☐ Get to the bus stop in plenty of time, and be ready to board the bus when it arrives at your stop;
- ☐ Take 10 giant steps back from the curb while waiting for the bus and 10 steps when exiting the bus;
- ☐ Never try to get anything left on the bus after exiting;
- ☐ Never reach underneath the bus;
- ☐ Always follow the driver's directions for how to cross the street;
- ☐ Be alert to traffic and look both ways;
- Always cross in front of the bus, but *only* approach the bus, when the bus driver signals it is safe to do so by dropping their hand

During this week we will practicing our emergency evacuations. So there may be a day or two this week that your child's bus will be running 5-10 minutes late as take some time to review School Bus Safety Thanks for your Cooperation Milton Sayler Firelands Schools Transportation
