As the first quarter of the school year is quickly coming to an end, our students and staff have had a busy start to the new year. Some highlights from this year include:

FFA Attends the National Convention in Indianapolis

After earning the title of National Champions-Models of Innovation in 2015, the Firelands FFA Chapter was asked to host the Ohio Booth at National Convention in the Hall of States. Students planned a booth focused on Urban Agriculture to share the story of city farming in Ohio. The 23 students that attended, manned the booth, spoke to convention attendees, and passed out pens.

Macey Butchko, performed on various stages in and around the convention center for the talent competition. The sophomore submitted an application along with a recorded audition and was chosen as one of the top acts from around the country to compete in three difficult competition rounds. Butchko previously placed second in the State of Ohio for voice talent and placed in the top 40 for the nation at the National Convention.

Brandon Palmer, was a Top Four-in-the-Nation finalist for Agricultural Processing. After an extensive application and interview process, Brandon won an all expense educational tour to Ireland in June, one of only 50 FFA members from across the country to do so. Brandon is part owner of Red Barn Maple Syrup and owner of Palmer Confections (where he makes maple cream, maple candy and maple sugar). A 2016 graduate of Firelands High School, Palmer is currently studying at The Ohio State University with a major in Agricultural Systems Management

Congratulations to fellow alumni Katie Fath & Cole Lewis who received their American Degrees. The American Degree is awarded to members who have demonstrated the highest level of commitment to FFA, of which only 0.5 % of FFA members will earn! 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FHS NEWS

Science Program Additions – As FHS looks forward already to 2017-18, the Science Department will be adding AP Physics to our course catalog for next year. Not only is this an excellent way to earn an honors diploma and possible college credit, it is a great class for students who are interested in STEM programs. Mr. Tom Moyer, FHS Science Teacher, will bring the AP Physics Program to FHS in 2017-18, which will increase our college hour offerings to over 55 hours at FHS next school year.

PSAT Testing—All students in the Honors program at FHS in the 10th grade, along with 11th graders who took the PSAT in 10th grade and scored in the 70th percentile or better will again have the opportunity to take the PSAT at FHS on Wednesday, October 19th. A grant from High Schools that Work allows FHS to offer the test, free of charge, to students who could qualify for the National Merit Scholarship Program, sponsored by the College Board and SAT. Falcons are Fourth – The Cleveland Plain Dealer reported on September 19th that Firelands High School ranked fourth in Lorain County for graduates who earn a college degree within 6 years. 38.3% of the FHS Class of 2009 had earned a college degree within 6 years, placing FHS just below Avon Lake, Avon, and Marion L. Steele High Schools. FHS continues to strive to place students in the best possible environment to be college and career ready, as 68% of the Class of 2016 has entered a 4-year, 2-year, or Technical School to continue their education.

<u>Parent-Teacher Conferences</u> – FHS hosted Parent-Teacher Conferences on Thursday, October 6th from 3 - 7 pm, and then again on October 13th. We always encourage parents to engage with our teachers to discuss their children, so that our teachers, parents, and students can be on the same page on how they can best succeed in school.

<u>Tailgate Great Success</u>—Homecoming 2016 kicked off the evening of September 22nd with the annual Tailgate. Beginning at 5 pm, the

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students ate and enjoyed each other's company as parents and supporters fed the students. At 6 pm, the Mighty Falcon Marching Band kicked off the Homecoming Parade and they were followed floats. The evening culminated in the annual jersey auction, which is always a great fundraiser for The Falcon Football Program.

Game Night and Dance—The Falcons hosted Oberlin for the annual Homecoming Game, with the Falcons defeating the Phoenix. The Homecoming Queen was Sarah Slack and the King was Sam Dempsey. Over 300 students enjoyed the dance on Saturday evening.

Pizza with the Principal—FHS held its first Pizza with the Principal last Friday, celebrating the accomplishments of many of our students. Students are nominated by teachers for showing leadership and accomplishment both in the classroom and in the FHS community. Over 50 students and teachers were recognized at the Pizza luncheon in late September. Congratulations!

Parade of Bands – The Mighty Falcon Marching Band put on an impressive performance to close out the 2016 Parade of Bands in Falcon Stadium, as they hosted five other marching bands last Saturday night. 
Boys Golf - PAC Tournament Champs

FHS Counseling Corner

Seniors: We kicked off the college application process on September 13th during English classes at FHS. For Seniors who do not have an English course on the FHS campus, you need to schedule a meeting with Mrs. Zimmer (email: dzimmer@firelandsschools.org). We will be utilizing Naviance to send your transcript, school profile, and teacher letters of recommendation to the college in which you are applying. The site provides a wealth of information regarding the college application process including a list of college representatives that will be coming on campus, scholarship search information, and the Financial Aid Process. Parents, have your student show you their portal by going to the www.firelandsschools.org >FHS> Counseling Office>open the Naviance/Family connection tab.

College Visit Forms: Seniors are allowed 3 college visits to view colleges of their choice and ask questions of the college admission staff. A form is available in the guidance office. This form must be given to the main office before the student can visit the college. It counts as a day of attendance, but missed school work must be made up. Juniors are allowed 2 college visits.

College Now Representative, Dave Newman, will be at Firelands High School every other Tuesday starting on September 27th for the 2016-2017 school year. He will working with college bound students and families on the financial aid process. Contact shoz-

release in December, February, and April. This tool can help students figure out what areas or types questions that they need to review and prepare before taking the test again. It is highly encouraged for students to take it at least twice. We will be giving the ACT to all the juniors in March 2017.

NEWS FROM FES

SCHOOL-WIDE BEHAVIOR PLAN

FES has implemented a clip chart system in every classroom that helps to communicate ready to learn behavior expectations for all of our boys and girls. In addition to the clip



chart system, students have an opportunity to earn and spend Falcon Bucks. Many of the classroom teachers are using the classroom store in addition to our newly named *Falcon Pride Store*. Children purchased items to take home as well as coupons to bring a stuffed animal to school, sit in teacher's chair, and read to a class. FIRE TIME

FIRE stands for Falcon Intervention Reinforcement Enrichment. It is time set aside each day to provide reading skills instruction to grow all students to the next level. In response to children's skills deficits and strengths, we have grouped the students for targeted reading instruction to close the learning gap and to grow students to the next level. Students who need to "catch up" are in small groups to provide the necessary time and instruction to close the learning gap while students that can be "stretched" in their learning are grouped together for purposeful instruction to extend their learning at higher level thinking skills.

We held our first Parent Teacher conferences on Thursday, October 6 and October 13. We saw many families engaged in conversations with the teachers – we are a team working together to be sure we meet our children's needs.

Dear Firelands Family -

This is my "love letter" to all of you who have kindly and generously reached out to me and my family, in one way or another, this past year. I was diagnosed with breast cancer at the end of April and had surgery in May. I would like to share with you some of the amazing things that transpired during that time and over the summer....

On the day before my surgery, I came to school and was greeted by a sea of students, dressed in both pink and blue, showing their support for both me and one of our 5th grade students (at the time), Joel Polen, who received a cancer diagnosis of his own, ironically the very same day that I did. Co-workers all sported special Tshirts. What I didn't realize that morning, was that students and staff all over the district were wearing these shirts. My inbox was a steady stream of photos sent from SAMS, FHS and the bus garage, showing my beautiful former students and colleagues, sporting these supportive shirts. Coworkers swooped in and "took care of business," handling whatever needed handling. I received emails from moms who were cancer survivors themselves. I cannot tell you what all of this meant to me. I went into that surgery on May 11th absolutely confident that everything would turn out well.

During the time I was absent, FES stu-


dents created an astounding array of cards for me. One said, "Mrs. P! Get good!" Another one said, "Get well! You can go to the combine derby!" Others encouraged me to pray and promised that I would be the subject of their own prayers. I alternately laughed and cried when I read their beautiful words. These cards are so meaningful to me, so full of feeling. I kept *all* of them. And that box? It lives in my closet, where it radiates love.

Over the summer, families and colleagues from the district held a benefit for Joel and me. It was lovely. I was touched and I was humbled. The amount of care and hard work that went into that night.... I thank all of the many people who were involved in organizing and running that benefit. And for those that bought tickets: I don't know who all of you are, but my thanks are endless.

Cancer's no kind of "gift" but it does teach you some things. One of the main lessons? **Love is all around you** – and you don't even know it. All of your many emails, hugs, cards and personal "checkins" have been part of my healing process. I am doing extremely well and guess what? You all had a hand in it. I always say, "I've got the best job in the world." Now add to that, "... in the best district ever." Thank you, Firelands Family.

WARNING LIGHTS

- Alternating flashing amber (yellow) lights are to be used to warn motorist that the bus is stopping to take on or to discharge passengers.
- Alternating flashing red lights are to be used to inform motorist that the bus is stopped on the roadway to take on or discharge passengers.
- Stop arm shall be operated simultaneously with flashing red signal lights.

A white flashing strobe light, individually switched, may be used, when unfavorable atmospheric conditions or time of day limit visibility (i.e., fog, rain, snow, darkness).

- Four-way hazard lights shall be activated at railroad crossings and turn-arounds unless prohibited by local ordinance.
- Headlights should be actuated during operation of the school bus.

WARNING LIGHTS



CAUTION

Sometimes a school bus driver must do a turn-around.

- The bus will have its four-way hazard lights and backup lights on as it prepares to back into a side street to turn around.
- Motorists must use caution when they approach a bus in the process of completing a turn-around.

USE CAUTION!




WHERE IS THE DANGER ZONE?

The <u>danger zone</u> for a school bus is the area 10 feet around the bus.

The two most dangerous places are:

- Front of the bus
- Right rear tire area



WARNING:

Please take the time to check your children's clothing and book bags to make sure they are safe.

Drawstrings and key chains may catch on objects on the bus and increase danger!

Please talk to your child about the following safety rules:

- Avoid the danger zone around the bus.
- Don't try to pick up something dropped near the bus - the bus driver might not see you.
- Remember that some motorists don't always stop for a stopped school bus.
- Be careful whenever getting on or off the bus.

WHY IT TAKES SO LONG AT BUS STOPS



SAFETY PROCEDURES ARE REQUIRED BY STATE LAW

THE SAFETY OF CHILDREN, AS THEY ARE TRANSPORTED TO AND FROM SCHOOL AND SCHOOL-RELATED EVENTS, IS OUR HIGHEST PRIORITY.

At bus stops state law requires drivers to follow these procedures:

- Check mirrors for traffic conditions and apply brakes well in advance to warn traffic from the rear.
- Actuate warning lights 300 feet prior to stop.
- Stop bus at designated stop.
- Set parking brake.
- Place the gear shift lever into neutral gear for both manual and automatic transmissions to prevent the bus from lunging forward.
- Open service door to actuate the warning lights and place hand over horn to warn students of potential hazards.
- Give students directions to go to their Designated Place of Safety and stay there until the bus leaves or signal students to board the bus from their Designated Place of Safety.
- Shift the gear lever into the starting gear, only after counting and confirming the students are in their Designated Place of Safety or safely in their seat.
- Look to identify students and potential hazards in the danger zone, counting and checking the mirrors, before closing the door and canceling the warning lights.
- Close the door when all areas are clear. Door must be closed before the bus moves.
- Release the parking brake after closing the door.
- Recheck traffic in the right and left side mirrors prior to pulling away.

Modification of these procedures may be necessary for preschool, kindergarten, and special needs students.





Motorists around school buses need to know the signals and the laws that concern school buses to help keep children safe:

- Do not pass a school bus that has red alternating flashing lights on. This is the signal that the bus is stopped to load or unload children. Traffic should not move until the bus resumes motion or the driver signals traffic to proceed.
- When a bus has alternating flashing amber (yellow) lights on, it is preparing to stop to load or unload children. Be ready to stop and watch for children in the roadway.

Parents ... are very important in helping keep children safe on the school bus. Here are some ways in which parents can help:

- Review the safety rules with children. Help them to understand why each rule is important.
- Dress children in light colored clothing or jackets on dark mornings.
- Help children to be ready at the stop before their bus arrives.
- Take turns supervising bus stops for smaller children.

Bus drivers...help to keep children safe in a number of ways:

- Drivers watch surrounding traffic closely to keep school children safe.
- Drivers will signal to children that need to cross the street only when traffic has stopped.
- In case an emergency vehicle approaches while loading or unloading, the driver will get the children to a place of safety until the emergency vehicle passes.

Ohio Law: 3301-83-13 School bus stops

(B) School bus stop location

- Pupils in grades kindergarten through eight may be required to walk up to one-half mile to a designated bus stop.
- (2) School bus stop locations shall provide for the maximum safety of pupils giving consideration to distance from residence, traffic volume, physical characteristics, visibility and weather conditions.
- (3) School bus stops shall be established on the residence side of all four-lane highways and on the residence side of other roadways posing potential hazards to students as determined by school bus owners.
- (4) School bus stops shall be located at a distance from the crest of a hill or curve to allow motorists traveling at the posted speed to stop within the sight distance. If the line of sight is less than five hundred feet in either direction, an approved "school bus stop ahead" sign shall be installed at least five hundred feet in advance of the school bus stop.
- (5) Each pupil shall be assigned and required to use a specific school bus stop except in unusual circumstances as approved by the school bus owner or designee.
- (6) Each pupil shall be assigned a residence side designated place of safety. Driver must account for each pupil at designated place of safety before leaving. Pupils are not to proceed to their residence until the school bus has departed.

WHAT SHOULD YOU DO WHEN APPROACHING ANY SCHOOL BUS THAT IS STOPPED FOR THE PURPOSE OF RECEIVING OR DISCHARGING SCHOOL CHILDREN?

- If a bus is stopped on a street or road that has fewer than four lanes, all traffic proceeding in either direction must stop.
- If a bus is stopped on a street or road that has four or more lanes, only traffic proceeding in the same direction as the bus must stop.
- You must not proceed until the school bus resumes motion, or until signaled by the school bus driver to proceed.

If you fail to stop for a school bus, your error will not go unnoticed. Bus drivers will report the license plate number of any vehicle that fails to comply with the law to a law enforcement agency, and an investigation will be conducted to identify the driver for enforcement purposes.

PENALTIES FOR NOT OBEYING THESE RULES COULD COST YOU UP TO \$500 AND A MAXIMUM 1-YEAR SUSPENSION OF YOUR DRIVER'S LICENSE.

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Literacy Tips on Becoming Successful Readers

Parents often call asking for ways to work with their child/ren at home. Here are some strategies to try and get your child engaged at home and keep their love of reading on track.

- * Read with your child every day or have them read independently explaining their favorite part/s of the story.
- * Encourage your child to describe his/her day at school.
- * Pick a "word of the day" each day starting with a different letter. Write the word and look for other things beginning with the same letter or rhyming with the word.
- * Encourage your child to find a picture from a newspaper or magazine, cut it out, paste it on paper and write a story about that picture.
- * Start a family vocabulary box/jar. Have everyone write down new words they discover, add them to the box/jar and use the words in conversation.

- * Go to a play or musical with your child. Discuss the way actors bring the words to life.
- * Listen with your child to a television reporter, politician, or other speaker. Ask your child to tell you the speaker's main points. Was the speaker trying to convince the audience of something? How?
- * Encourage your child to visit the library.
- Make time in everyone's busy schedule for family time. Share stories, have discussions about issues happening in the world, play a game or just have some family reading time.

STEM Activity: Cigar Box Guitar Build

The STEM program at SAMS was excited to receive a \$475 grant from the Nordson Corporation Foundation to continue its 4-string cigar box guitar building project. During this project students learn how to design, build, and play 4-string cigar box guitars. Last year the project was tested with a small group of students with great success. The design and building portion of the project teaches students the placement and function of all guitar parts, the science behind how the sound is produced, and how to play them. The guitars are built from scratch and require students to measure, cut, drill, glue and bolt all pieces together. A professional guitar instructor will be invited into class to provide additional instruction for playing the guitars. Students will be evaluated on the accuracy and precision of the guitar construction and their ability to play the instrument. They will also have the opportunity to use their guitars to teach their science classes about sound waves. Students will be able to take the guitars home a the completion of the project. Flight Simulators at SAMS

Students at SAMS recently had the special opportunity to learn from leaders of the local Civil Air Patrol (CAP) squadron located at the Lorain County Airport during their STEM class. Capt. Judy Ingersoll and Maj. Chuck Ingersoll taught the students about the science of flight including topics such as the motions of flight and the forces that affect a plane. Cadet Senan was also on hand and helped model the use of flight simulators,

which the students had a week to use for practicing flight maneuvers. The CAP is an auxiliary of the United States Air Force consisting of volunteers that provide help with services such as search and rescue missions and disaster relief. 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
