Student Success and Wellness: A Shared Community Responsibility

Firelands Local School District is committed to taking a proactive, holistic approach towards student wellness, achievement and growth. Through the work of our teachers, school counselors, social worker, and support staff, our students receive developmentally appropriate classroom lessons regarding positive decision making, alcohol and drug prevention, and mental and physical health awareness. In addition, our district partners with the following agencies in Lorain County who provide further assistance and support to our staff and students:

Our youth face numerous challenges today, and many are struggling with social, emotional and behavioral issues that can negatively impact their ability to learn and achieve academic success. According to the 2018 PRIDE Student Survey conducted through Communities That Care, there is a sharp upward trend in the number of Lorain County youth who reported using e-cigarettes or "vaping", with 13.2% of 8th graders reporting they smoked some form of electronic cigarette in the past 30 days. This rose to 37% among 12th graders. In Firelands, our data is even more alarming with 26% of 8th graders reporting they smoked some form of electronic cigarette in the past 30 days and 53% for those in 12th grade. In response to this data, we are implementing a new curriculum, Catch My Breath, at both the middle school and high school. While the specific risks and impact of "vaping" are still being studied, most e-cigarettes contain nicotine, which is highly addictive and can harm adolescent brain development.

Lorain County students also reported struggling with depression, anxiety, stress and suicide at a much younger age, and show an upward trend. Coupled with this, both 6th and 8th

graders reported an increase in use of alcohol, marijuana, and tobacco/e-cigarettes. Like some adults, when teenagers experience emotional problems they may turn to alcohol or drug use to help them manage difficult or painful feelings.

Some additional findings:

Meal Assistance Information

An updated meal assistance application must be filled out every school year if you wish to receive or continue with benefits. We have an online portal which is the preferred method. You can complete an application at www.payschoolscentral. com. Direct Certification letters must be signed and returned to waive instructional school fees, do not fill out an application. A paper application can be printed from the Food Service tab on the school website or each school office has paper applications available. If your child received meal assistance last year that status will roll over until September 30th if a new application has not been received. On September 30th the meal status will automatically change to denied if an updated application is not received.

Breakfast

Breakfast is served at all of our schools. It is available as soon as the students get off the bus. They can go directly to the kitchen to pick up their meal. Elementary students take their meal to the classroom. The cost of breakfast is \$1.50, reduced cost is .30 and the free meal status qualifies for a free breakfast as well as a lunch.

Online payments and account payments

Online payments can be made at www.payschoolscentral.com. This site can also be used for the reporting system to view what your child has purchased as well. The reports can be seen at no cost to you. On behalf of the staff, I am excited to welcome you to the 2019-2020 school year. Our students are busy meeting grade level standards, and everyone seems to be off to a great start!

On August 13th, 14th and 15th, the staff had the opportunity to engage in professional learning events for three days. All staff received safety training in QPR: question, persuade, refer and learned how to respond and assist students. This suicide awareness training saves thousands of lives each year. The staff learned to recognize warning signs of a suicide crisis and how to question, persuade and refer someone to get help. The sooner warning signs are detected, the better the outcome of a suicidal crisis will be. They also had the opportunity to analyze data with their grade level/department to support student mastery of grade level standards, updated curriculum maps and were introduced to several new strategies to implement in their classrooms. The three days were packed with professional growth opportunities for everyone.

system: OneView. As we continue to work with the system, we will work out all the issues to make it even better for next year.




performance. With its focus on student mastery of content material, standards-based grading is intended to provide a more meaningful indicator of student growth.

advance to Finalist standing, and about half of the Finalists will win a national Merit Scholarship, earning the title of Merit Scholar. Sam is only one of 14 Seniors in Lorain County, and the only Senior in the Lorain County League, to earn this distinction.

We held our first roller skating night on September 5. The students had a lot of fun and so did Mrs. Novak, Mrs. Monyak, Mrs. Urbansky, Mr. Yakunauvich, Ms. Gomez and Mr. Carlock.

Our students have been busy taking their first AIMSWEB plus benchmark exam. This will allow us to determine how best to help them and who could benefit from some additional services.

We have our homecoming pep rally coming up on the 27h of September to honor our fall athletes and to learn about the concept of Homecoming.

Our PBIS (Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports) teams will be working in the next month on determining how to proceed with Tier 1 interventions as well as go to a professional development class on Restorative Justice at the Educational Service Center of Lorain County.


