



### **Behind the Scenes at the New Firelands High School**





Looking down from the 2nd floor

The construction of the new Firelands High School is continuing right on target for a Fall 2022 opening. Behind the scenes, as many as 70 workers a day are in the building and focused on installing and fine-tuning the mechanics and infrastructure. Tim Rini, who is the project manager for Greenspace Construction Services (GCS), said that there are 23 prime contractors with additional subcontractors working for each prime.

Rini said that the biggest challenge has been securing the materials during the pandemic so that the project remains on *continued on page 2*

schedule. That being said, he feels very lucky and enjoys working with a great group of craftsmen and women on the construction of the new high school. He added that daily coordination with the project superintendent Lucio Velotta, and project administrator Alesio Asorio, makes the project run smoothly. With everyone's efforts and cooperation, the school will be ready to open in August of 2022.

#### By the Numbers

The new high school is 106,630 square feet consisting of the following:

- 74,716 concrete masonry units (cement block)
- 161,221 face bricks
- 8,569 feet of water pipes
- 4,773 gallons of paint
- 1,324 cubic yards of concrete
- 1,060 Electrical receptacles
- 213 tons of steel
- 27 classrooms
- 21 restrooms
- 17 offices
- 6 mechanical rooms
- 2 gyms
- 1 boiler room
- 1 lunchroom

Planning for the logistics of moving two buildings has been well underway and we are excited to move forward. Our new high school will be ready for occupancy by early August. The existing high school will transition to a middle school and will serve students in grades 6-8. South Amherst Middle School will no longer be used and the district is currently in negotiations to sell the building.

Plans to say goodbye to SAMS while celebrating the opening of our new high school will be shared in the coming months.

### Open Enrollment for 2022-2023 Begins on February 1st

The application process for open enrollment for the 2022-2023 school year will begin on February 1, 2022 at 7:30 a.m. At that time, the online application will go live and parents and guardians can begin applying through the website for available open enrollment slots.

The application is a Google form that is linked at the bottom of the "Student Registration" page of the www. FirelandsSchools.org website.

Open enrollment space is given on a first-come, first-

served basis. The amount of slots we can offer depends on our current enrollment. Parents will be notified of acceptance or denial no later than the end of March.

Accepted students can be registered online as soon as they receive notification. There is one exception - kindergarten applicants for open enrollment can register in March with district residents. We will not be able to project the amount of kindergarten open enrollment slots until after that registration period. We encourage district families with new kindergartners to register them in March. More information about kindergarten registration will follow in the next issue of the Express.

## **Enrollment Timeline**

#### February 1st

- Online open enrollment application is available for K-12 students. Out of district kindergarten parents **must** complete this process before March registration.
- Online confirmation of open enrollment status for returning students begins. This annual process is required for all open enrolled students after the first year.

#### March 1st

- Status notifications for open enrollment applications, Grades 1-12, are sent from Superintendent's Office.
- Registration for accepted open enrollment students, Grades 1-12, will begin through Final Forms.

#### March 2nd

 Registration through Final Forms opens for kindergarten. Process can be completed online. This includes BOTH district residents and open enrollment applicants.

#### March 2nd & 3rd

 The Board of Education Office is open and staffed to assist kindergarten parents if needed. Location is 112 N. Lake St., South Amherst.

#### April 1st

 Status notifications for kindergarten open enrollment applications are sent from the Superintendent's Office.

#### May 18th

 Kindergarten Screening at FES. (Required). Your screening time slot will be scheduled during March registration.

#### May 1-31

• Final push to have all students registered for Fall.

#### June 1st

- Open enrollment ends.
- All registration documents are due.

#### **Grants Awarded to Firelands for Over \$10,000 Chuck Latto: Introduction to Flight & UAVs** Lori Roemer: Safety Training & Cameras

Mr. Chuck Latto, teacher at South Amherst Middle School, has been notified that he received a Martha Holden Jennings Grant for his project, Introduction to Flight and UAVs in

the amount of \$2,980.00! The grant has enabled Mr. Latto to purchase a class set of drones, which further enhances understanding of drone technology, coding, project based learning and more. The drones arrived earlier this month!

This opportunity will allow students to explore the history of aviation starting with the Wright Brothers and the testing of their first practical plane at Huffman Prairie in Dayton, Ohio. Part of their research will include viewing the documentary "On Great White Wings" which Mr. Latto purchased at the Wright Brothers Memorial. Students will select a type of airplane or drone as a technological artifact to research and present to the class in the form of a Google Slide show.

One example that students may recognize is the Ingenuity drone that was recently flown on Mars and NOAA's Saildrone that collected data while navigating through hurricane Sam off the Atlantic coast. The students will then investigate the science of flight while building and testing several airplane models. The models will help them understand the movement of planes such as roll, pitch, and yaw and the forces such as drag and lift. This information will be supported by curriculum materials that have been obtained from our local Civil Air Patrol at the Lorain County Airport.

Latto has also arranged an opportunity for his students to

practice flying an airplane with flight simulators that will be on loan from a local airport!

Once students arrive at this point of the curriculum, they will then apply their understanding of



flight to autonomously program and fly the class set of drones. Students will follow an online curriculum containing lessons and assessments that they can work through at their own pace

depending on their previous experiences with coding. The culmination of the

project will involve students participating in a presentation by a local commercial pilot that will share information about the principles of flight and his career in aviation.

Latto states, "I want to inspire students to explore career pathways that will lead them to in demand jobs and successful career opportunities. Research shows that students in middle school are already making decisions about their high school scheduling and career choices. Because of this grant funding, students will have the opportunity to practice 21st century skills related to aviation. I am proud of my students-even when things get challenging, they never want to give up."

Early in October, Latto was notified that he received a grant for over \$500 in order for his STEM students to build cigar box guitars. This year alone he has utilized outside resources exceeding \$3,500 for additional opportunities for his students! Submitted by Jennifer Butchko

Firelands will utilize the grant funding to continue the training of school staff and our school resource officer to identify,

properly respond to, and report threats or behaviors of concern that may pose an issue to the safety of an individual attending or working in our schools. In

addition, Firelands will conduct professional development trainings on de-escalation and identifying and reporting behaviors of concern. Further, our district will send our school



resource officer to the most up-to-date training on safety topics and procedures. Our district is also looking to upgrade surveillance cameras throughout the elementary school. Roemer stated,

"Safety continues to be our top priority. I am pleased to be able to secure additional sources of revenue for our district."

On Tuesday, November 16, 2021 the teams competed against other Lorain County school districts in the annual Academic Challenge competition sponsored by the Educational Service Center of Lorain County. Both teams earned first place!

The process of preparing for the competition was a challenge itself! Following tryouts, the teams began practicing together twice weekly. They were required to read a designated novel, learn about current events, and study from a list of almost 30 topics in the categories of math, reading, science, social studies, and geography. Besides attending the practices, students also committed to studving independently outside of school in order to be as prepared as possible to face the difficult

questions and problem solving. The teams' advisors, Mrs. Teresa Dempsey and Mrs. Tasia Socha, are proud of the students for the time, effort, and hard work

that they each contributed in order to achieve this goal. Even more important than learning tons of new information, the students learned to work well as a team, maximizing each others' strengths in order to work together for a common goal.



To celebrate Fibonacci Day on 11/23, Mrs. Dempsey's gifted math and ELA students learned about the mathematician Fibonacci and created Fibonacci Poetry. This poetry is similar to Haiku and is a form of constrained writing. Students wrote poems that were six lines long, with each line containing the number of syllables that reflect the Fibonacci Sequence (1, 1, 2, 3, 5, 8...) The poetry was then submitted to a contest, where the class was chosen in a random drawing to win their choice of a prize! Students voted



on a class game called Genius Square, a fun and challenging STEM puzzle.

### **Food Service News**

If you received a Direct Certification letter saying your child was approved for free meals, you MUST sign and return the form in order to get fees waived. Fees will not automatically be waived.

Free meals for all students for 2021-2022- USDA has extended the free meals for all students regardless of need. All students may get a free breakfast and lunch every day.

School meals - Our number of meals have more than doubled from last year. This is great for our students to be able to have access to nutritious meals. Students must take the required components to qualify for a reimbursable free meal.

Ala cart items are not free. Items may be purchased using money that has been put on your child's account or they can bring money to school in the form of check or cash. Accounts cannot go into the negative for ala cart items. Students must have money on account or cash to purchase.

**Meal / Fee application:** The meal application is being used to determine if your child/children qualify to have instructional fees waived. If you have completed a meal / fee application and receive a letter stating your child qualified for reduced or denied meals, they can still get FREE meals this year, the instructional school fees will not be waived.

Food supply shortages: Nationwide food supply chain shortages due to issues with labor, transportation, and raw materials continue to affect breakfast and lunch menus. This continues to be a great issue each week. Many vendors have halted production on certain products hoping they can get caught up on their better selling items. These shortages have forced us to make substitutions at short notice.
