## Mock Trial Experience

## Kindergarten Registration

Fall 2023 kindergarten registration begins March 1st for district residents and open enrollment applicants. Families can prepare for this process by having ready the following documents.

1. Parent or guardian identification cards
2. Birth certificate of kindergarten student
3. Up to date immunization list for kindergarten student
4. Two proof of residency documents, such as utility bills

Other documents that may be needed include any custody papers, special needs documentation, or residency affidavits for renters. See page 2 for more information on enrollment.

## Holiday Generosity

## Enrollment Timeline

### February 1st

- Online open enrollment application is available for K-12 students. Out of district kindergarten parents **must** complete this process before March registration. There is limited space for open enrollment.
- Online confirmation of open enrollment status for returning students begins. This annual process is required for all open enrolled students after the first year.

### March 1st

- Registration through Final Forms opens for kindergarten. Process can be completed online. This includes BOTH district residents and open enrollment applicants.
- Status notifications for open enrollment applications, Grades 1-12, are sent from Superintendent's Office.

- Registration for accepted open enrollment students, Grades 1-12, will begin through Final Forms.

### March 1st & 2nd

- The Board Office in South Amherst is open and staffed to assist kindergarten parents if needed. Times are 8:00-3:00 on March 1st, and 3:30-7:00 on March 2nd.

### April 3rd

- Status notifications for kindergarten open enrollment applications are sent from the Superintendent's Office.

### May 17th

- Kindergarten Screening at FES. (Required). Your screening time slot will be scheduled during March registration.

## Open Enrollment Starts Feb. 1

The application process for open enrollment for the 2023-2024 school year will begin on February 1, 2023 at 7:30 a.m. At that time, the online application will go live and parents and guardians can begin applying through the website for limited open enrollment slots. The application is a Google form that is linked at the bottom of the "Student Registration" page of the [www.FirelandsSchools.org](http://www.FirelandsSchools.org) website.

Open enrollment space is given on a first-come, first-served basis. The amount of slots we can offer depends on our current enrollment. Parents will be notified of acceptance or denial no later than the end

of March. Accepted students in grades 1-12 can be registered online as soon as they receive notification. We will not be able to project the amount of kindergarten open enrollment slots until after the March registration period for district kindergartners. More information about kindergarten registration will follow in the next issue of the Express.

## Veterans Honored at FES

On November 11th, the 4th grade students presented their annual Veterans Day program for honored guests. After names were read (with a brief recap of their service) each veteran received a small token of appreciation from the student that extended the invitation.




## FMS Team Leads Conference



The Falcons 8th grade girls basketball team ended its regular season with a record of 14-2. The team had a habit of starting games slowly, but really heated up in the second halves of games.

In conference play the Falcons defeated Wellington twice, Oberlin twice, and Clearview twice, Columbia twice, Brookside twice, Black River twice. The Falcons lost to Keystone twice.

In non-conference play the team defeated New London and Vermilion.

The Falcons were the 2nd seed for the LC8 tournament. The Falcons beat Black River in the first round and in the semifinals defeated Wellington. The Falcons then faced #1 seeded Keystone in the Championship game.

The Falcons came ready to play and jumped out to an early lead due to some great defense and excellent shooting. The Wildcats made a run at the end of the first half, but the Falcons took a 17-13 lead into halftime. The Falcons had a strong third quarter and took a 29-21 lead into the 4th. The Wildcats clawed their way back to within one point, but the Falcons were able to withstand the run made

by Keystone. Final score 35-34.

The final season record was 17-2. They were 16-0 when scoring 30 points or more and 1-2 when scoring less than 30.

The girls played tough all year long and never gave up, scrapping their way back in some games and persevering some runs by other teams to pull out the wins. They learned to close out games in the right fashion. I am very proud of the way they have handled themselves. They were a great group to coach and made practice fun and interesting at times. They improved tremendously as the season progressed. Working on individual skills and getting quality shots up in the off-season will make them that much better next year. This group has the ability to strengthen the program if they continue to work on all the aspects of basketball in the off-season.

Students were given a pre and post test to determine their growth in those areas. At the beginning of the year, students reported having limited prior knowledge of the reflected concepts. By the end of programming, students achieved an average of 83% mastery.

## Pre-Apprenticeship Program Debuts at FHS

As part of the new graduation requirements in the State of Ohio, students need to show they are prepared for a career pathway after graduation. The three options would be enrollment, employment, or enlistment. In order to prepare our students for gainful employment we have applied and have been approved for a Pre-Apprenticeship program in Certified Manufacturing Associate (CMfgA) Certification teaching basic technical and job-readiness skills for several apprentice occupations in Lorain County. We have teamed up with Lorain County Community College (LCCC) and Lorain County Manufacturing Sector Partnership (LCMSP) to offer our juniors and seniors in the career connection and CBI work program this life-changing opportunity.

The Certified Manufacturing Associate (CMfgA) is an industry certification focused on basic manufacturing concepts, demonstrating an individual's potential for high-demand, entry-level manufacturing roles.

Covering fundamental topics such as shop math, assembly, maintenance, machining, inspection, and more, this industry-driven certification demonstrates that the individual has basic knowledge of manufacturing and may be an ideal candidate for entry-level manufacturing employment.

The Certified Manufacturing Associate offers an initial step into a technology-rich industry filled with opportunities for continued growth and advancement into higher level positions. After earning the CMfgA, students will have the opportunity to work in industry and based on performance could be chosen to continue in an established apprenticeship programs leading to advanced technical certifications, more money, and a fulfilling career.

### Food Service Information

**Meal applications** can be completed anytime during the school year. If you have an income change or loss of job, you can complete an application.

**Direct Certification** letters: If you received a letter saying your child qualified for free meals, it is very important you return the letter for instructional fees to be waived. Fees are not automatically waived.

**Negative Meal Accounts:** We have many accounts that have gone into the negative. Please reach out if you need help. Complete a meal assistance application even if you are unsure if your children would qualify. It is very important that accounts have a positive balance.

**Menus:** Download the Falcon App for easy access to *my school menus*. You can also go to [www.myschoolmenus.com](#). Click on a menu item to see the nutritional for that item. Menus are subject to change daily due to unforeseen circumstances.

Board member Dan Pycraft shared that the Endowment committee has approved \$15,820.00 in teacher grants that will be awarded to teachers in January.

## FLSD Winter Weather Policy

Several predictions have already been made as to how our winter will play out! NOAA (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration) predicts wetter than normal conditions. While local meteorologists agree, they tend to predict a battle of below normal temperatures and a very early start to the bitter cold with average snowfall and cold rain mix.

Poor weather conditions can be difficult for parents and the school system. To best prepare for the season, we will again share information regarding our district's policy for closing or delaying school due to inclement weather. The Superintendent may close the school, dismiss students early or delay the opening of school in the event of hazardous weather.

Normal procedure for inclement weather conditions are as follows: Road and facility monitoring begins as early as 4:00 am or in some cases, the day before a front arrives. The superintendent and fleet

operations manager work together to determine if a weather delay or closure is necessary. Road conditions, building and grounds conditions, air temperature and weather forecasts are all taken into consideration. Typically delays or cancellations are announced between 5:15 – 6:15 am. In some cases, a closure can occur the night before but most often a final decision is made in the early morning hours on the day of the closure or delay.

As a reminder, we must comply with minimum hours of instruction each year. The district may extend its school year if the school closes enough that it approaches the minimum instructional hours of required time. If necessary, calamity make up days begin June 7th. You can find these dates listed on the district calendar.

In the event we alter a school day due to the weather, FLSD will post information on the district website, FirelandsSchools.org, and Twitter accounts: @FLSDSuper and @Falcon\_Update. We will also post on the Firelands Falcons Facebook page, School All-Call and/or district email, local media outlets and the Firelands Local Schools App (download app from your play store).

It is important that children are dressed appropriately for the weather conditions. If you are in need of assistance securing winter items for your child please contact our social workers, Mrs. Watts at [dwatts@firelandsschools.org](mailto:dwatts@firelandsschools.org) or Ms. Ashley Blair at [ablair@firelandsschools.org](mailto:ablair@firelandsschools.org).

Please note that it is very important to make sure that your current email address and telephone number is available through Final Forms. Our database must be current in order for parent or guardian calls/emails to be initiated. If you need to update contact information please do so through the parent portal here.

Two Hour Delay: If a two hour delay is called, school buses will start picking up students two hours later than their normal pick up. The SAFE Program at FES will not be open in the am. There will be no transportation to the Early Learning Center. All in person students will begin their school day two hours later than the normal

bell schedule. The dismissal time will remain the same. FHS and FMS students may have a schedule change. If that were to happen, the principals will share the schedule change.
