

The FHS Competition Cheer Team competed and won 1st place in their division at the Ohio Association of Secondary School Administrators State Cheer and Dance Championships in February. ## **Kindergarten Registration Started March 2nd**

Parents living in the Firelands school district with children who will be five years old by August 1, 2022 are eligible to register their child for 2022-2023 kindergarten started on March 2, 2022. Online registration can be completed on a smart phone, without downloading an app. Kindergarten registration involves completing all of the online forms in the Final Forms portal and providing all required documents.

Documents required for registration are as follows: child's birth certificate, parent/guardian ID, two proofs of residency, shot records and custody papers (if they apply). 

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### **Logan Urban Takes 1st Place**

### **Powering Your School Endowment - Gifts of Grain**

Many farmers regularly and generously give back to their community. In some instances, giving back can also mean benefits to the farmer. In particular, there may be better benefits to donating a raised commodity directly to the nonprofit instead of selling the grain and then donating the proceeds. Depending on the donation, some farmers recognize both income tax and self-employment tax savings.

By using grain to donate to the Community Foundation of Lorain County to support the Firelands Endowment Fund, farmers can make a lasting difference to Firelands students. When the grain is donated, the farmer can typically avoid including the sale of the grain in their farm income. This contribution would not be a charitable income tax deduction for the farmer but avoiding declaring that income may still be a significant benefit.

Why is this different from just donating cash after the sale of

> grain? The income recognized from the sale of the grain is ordinary income to the farmer, subject to self-employment tax. If the farmer does not itemize deductions, there will be no tax advantage from the cash gift. Donating the grain directly

means that the farmer will not recognize any income and will then pay no income tax or selfemployment tax on the value of the gift. Since the savings is from the lack of income tax and self-employment tax, itemizing charitable giving becomes irrelevant.


The most crucial consideration when donating a raised commodity, like grain, is that the farmer must transfer the title of the grain to the Community Foundation of Lorain County before the grain is sold. Ideally, the farmer should send a letter detailing his intent to make the gift and receive approval from Community Foundation before any transfer occurs. The IRS will deem the transaction to be a transfer of the sale proceeds, not a contribution of the commodity itself if the transfer does not happen properly. Farmers wishing to donate raised commodities, like grain, should consult with their tax advisors to ensure they follow all required steps.

These gifts can be added to an existing Firelands discuss any questions.

career services specialist,
many employers are reaching
out with job openings. "The
current job market provides
students with numerous
employment opportunities and
increasingly higher starting

rates. Manufacturing students in particular, are in very high demand in our area."

Aiden Harker and Mason Hickman are working at Bettcher Industries in Birmingham and shared that they came to Lorain County JVS to get a head start in their careers.

"I wanted a jump start," shared Mason. "Going into the workforce while in high school is good because I'm gaining more experience."

For Aiden, he finds that learning the skills in his career tech program has put him ahead of the curve. "You learn the basics in class, so when you get out there, you know what you are doing already; how to use the tools, calibers, and things like that. It makes you more valuable and puts you ahead of someone who does not have that experience."

Mason and Aiden both plan to continue working at Bettcher Industries after graduation, signing on with them full-time.



Free meals for all students:

USDA continues to offer free breakfast and free lunch to all students regardless of need. This extension helps our families/students as well as the Food Service department. Our department gets federal reimbursements for each meal that is sold, so please encourage your child/children to take advantage of this great opportunity.

**Instructional fees:** 

Instructional fees are only waived if you qualify for free meals based off the information provided on a meal application or if your child was approved through Direct Certification.

Another round of Direct Certification letters were mailed

on January 31. Be sure to sign and return the letter if you received one so that instructional fees can be waived.

Meal assistance

applications: At some point USDA may not offer the free meals to all. If you feel your child/children would qualify for meal assistance, please complete an application so it is in place for the start of the school year if need be. www.payschoolscentral.com. The approved meal status will roll over for the first month of

the start of the school year.

A <u>NEW APPLICATION</u> must be completed every school year (for fees to be waived as well). At this time USDA has not said if the free meals will be continued into the next school year. We hope to have a concrete answer by the next issue of the Express.




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
