Falcon Achievements at State, National Levels







There is much Falcon pride going around as we celebrate the many accomplishments of our musicians, artists, athletes and FFA members. Here are just some of the highlights of students who competed or will compete at a state or national level. Many of these students are pictured in the middle photo.

The Firelands Band (pictured bottom left) performed at the OMEA (Ohio Music Education Association) large group adjudicated event on March 11th. The band received an overall rating of superior from the panel of 4 judges. This qualifies the band to perform at the Band State Adjudicated Event that will be held at North Royalton High School on April 28th or 29th. The Firelands Choir is also headed to the OMEA state competition in April after having received a perfect score and superior rating. The Firelands Honors Choir also received a superior rating at OMEA Solo and Ensemble.

Mandy DeWitt, junior, made school history as the first female bowler to qualify for state. At the tournament, she placed in the top quarter. Caley Bomback was also the first gymnastics state qualifier in school history! She earned a 9.0 on her floor exercise at State and then placed 27th overall.

In early March, the Firelands Competitive Cheer Team (pictured at top) placed 6th at state in the Division 4 Non-Building category. See page 2 for more about their success and an event they hosted at FHS.

Aiden Bokulich and Ariannah Floyd qualified for the indoor track state meet. Aiden finished 15th in the 60m hurdles and Ariannah finished 18th in the 60m hurdles and 20th in the long jump.

Kyleigh Klingshirn went to the FFA State Public Speaking Contest on March 4th and placed 6th in the semifinals. She had placed 2nd continued on page 2

Registration began March 1st for district residents. The process can be done completely online through our Final Forms portal. This is an online portal where all

registration forms are completed and documents are uploaded.

First, get documents ready including: parent or guardian identification cards; birth certificate of student; up-to-date immunization list for student; and two (2) proof of residency documents, such as utility bills. Other documents that may be needed include any custody papers, special needs documentation, or residency affidavits for renters.

Second, go to www.firelands-oh/finalforms.com and create or log into your parent account. Next, create a new student account for your kindergartner.

Upload documents when prompted and complete each form by typing your name at the bottom and clicking on the submit button. We administered the SAT on March 1st for all juniors. The Ohio Department of Education provides the SAT to all juniors, free of charge. We tested 144 students in grade 11, including the Firelands students that attend the JVS full time. This is an excellent opportunity for our students to take this college entrance test for free!

We will again be hosting our annual College and Career Fair on Tuesday, March 28th during school from 8:00 am to noon. Students will have a chance to meet representatives from colleges and universities, the military, and various organizations. Students can participate in mock interviews

as well as network and make contacts for future employment opportunities. Competition Cheer Team Hosts Event



The Firelands Board of Education followed up with the "I Made a Difference Award" their February meeting as a way to recognize his many achievements and dedication to the students of Firelands school district.

Bokulich Breaks Drought in Governor's Exhibition

The Ohio Governor's Youth Art Exhibition, now in its 53rd year, is dedicated to the educational and artistic advancement of our talented young people in the state of Ohio. The exhibition is open to all of Ohio's 1,112 high schools, both public, private that are chartered by the State of Ohio Department of Education. The process of selecting artworks for the state exhibition begins on a regional level. Only 241 works were selected from among the 1461 entered from our region to advance to state judging. FHS sophomore Aiden Bokulich entered the maximum of 5 per student and had three sculptures advance to state competition.

From around 9,000 entries across the 15 regions, only 1,300 advanced to state judging. Two of Aiden's sculptures have



been selected for the final state exhibition. These sculptures are made of "Sculpey" polymer clay; "Your Pal, Smooshy" is a charming giant purple slug (pictured above) and "Veiled Malice" is a haunting bust of a shrouded woman gasping for air (pictured at right). The exhibition opens on Sun. April

23 at the Rhodes Office Tower in downtown Columbus following an awards program at the Riffe Center Capitol Theatre where Aiden will be honored on-stage. The exhibition runs through May 18. Learn more about the competition here. https://www.govart.org/index.htm

The Governor's show is the toughest competition art students face. The only 2 other high schools in Lorain County with works that made the state exhibition are Avon and Avon Lake. Firelands has steadily attempted exhibition over the years. Last year Aiden had 2 works pass regional jurying but did not make the state selection. Firelands has waited a long time to return to the Capital. Congratulations Aiden! We have momentum building and look forward to next year.

Each grade level had the opportunity to choose the program that was the best fit for their students, goals, and standards.

Kindergartners used their bodies and minds in creative movement during the program "Meditation and Movement." "Sign Stage: Gesture





Communication," an artist and program combination that has been a tradition for first graders at FES, is a program in which students will use body language and facial expressions, with improvisation techniques, to communicate thoughts and feelings.

Second graders will also experience a Sign Stage program, "Signing Dr. Seuss," using American Sign Language to communicate stories. In third grade, math standards will be supported through a program called "Folding Fractions: The Origami Sailboat."

In fourth grade, social studies learning standards will be supported through "Runaway Slaves: Escape to Canada." Fifth grade students will deepen their understanding of figurative language through poetry with a visiting artist from Lake Erie Ink. We are grateful for the funding we received to provide this programming and these unique experiences for our students!

LCJVS: Vayda Wiles Gets Jump Start in Career

Most sophomore students attending Lorain County JVS shadow different career tech labs each quarter to be able to make an informed decision when applying for one of the two-year career-technical programs.

Vayda Wiles took a different path. She applied to take part in the LCJVS sophomore Pilot Program which allowed her to enter a junior-level program as a sophomore.

"Vayda is one of those students you count yourself lucky to have in class," said Mason Bremke, Lorain County JVS Industrial Equipment Mechanics instructor and FFA advisor. "Already as a sophomore, she is proving to be a leader in the classroom and out."

When thinking about her sophomore year, Wiles knew she wanted to be an agricultural teacher and also wanted to be part of an FFA Chapter. "I want to teach and be a part of FFA when I grow up, so that was my driving force to apply to be in the Industrial Equipment Mechanics



program. I also thought that having a job as a mechanic would be suited for me, so I knew this program would be a good fit."

Wiles will complete the Industrial Equipment Mechanics program next year as a junior, and she is excited about what opportunities she will have in her senior year. "I've talked with Mr. Bremke and I might

do a capstone project for my senior year. I've also thought about taking the LCJVS Teacher Education Exploration program since I want to be a teacher. I like having the choice to do what I think will be best for my future."

But being a part of the LCJVS FFA Chapter means the most to Wiles right now. "I was just voted in as the FFA Vice President for next school year, and so I will get a lot more experience and I just really like being helpful and helping out our chapter."

The experience of being in a group and the leadership that she is learning from being a part of FFA is leaving a mark on Wiles. "Since I want to be an FFA teacher (advisor), I want as much FFA experience as I can get, and I'm getting that here at LCJVS."

FFA Hosts National Conference, Competes in CDEs

National Conference

The Firelands FFA was contacted by the National FFA to gauge interest in hosting a conference that would normally be held in Columbus. It was decided that Firelands would host a 1-day leadership conference at the new high school on February 27th for 13 different schools! Mrs. Finnegan, FHS Agricultural Educator/FFA Advisor said, "By allowing Firelands FFA to host this conference we are able to extend a National Conference to northern Ohio FFA Chapters across the state, an opportunity that has been limited to Columbus for years. Our students have been working alongside the National FFA staff to plan logistics, program formatting, and advertisement for the conferences."

National FFA staff members arrived at Firelands from California, Washington, Wisconsin and Indiana to provide two different programs, "Connect Conference" (grades 7-10) and "I Am Conference" (grades 11-12). This FFA Member Leadership Series will empower students with new knowledge and skills that they need to be confident and capable leaders – both in their chapters and beyond.

7th to 10th grade students experienced the "Connect Conference" where students



were introduced to the conference theme and evaluated their role in connecting. They analyzed the importance of connecting, discovered tools and processes to cultivate healthy connections, and categorized the connections in their life. Finally, they examined the relationship between trust and influence and reviewed the content. Students motivated to create change.

11th to 12th grade students experienced the "I Am Conference" where students were introduced to the conference theme and summarized their self-concept. They used identity-based goal setting principles to determine who they want to become and used the habit loop to provide actionable steps to accomplishing their goals. Students used their identitybased goals to prioritize their time and evaluated balance in their lives. Finally, they provided feedback and reflection on their

experience at the conference.

Mrs. McCarty, FMS Ag
Education teacher, said, "We
were very excited to host this
national conference at Firelands
High School. We have connected
with schools across Ohio, from
as far as Adams and Fairview
counties, and all these students
will now have a great opportunity
to learn and grow as leaders."

Career Development Events

Congratulations to the FFA members that competed in recent CDEs! The Ag Diagnostics team of Joel Polen & Matthew Schnell competed at the district contest at Buckeye Central and earned 3rd place, narrowly missing a chance at the state contest.

Firelands hosted 21 schools for the sub-district speaking contest on February 15th. Three Firelands FFA members qualified for the district contest which was held February 22nd. Congratulations to Jocelyn

Bednar for earning 4th place for Advanced Prepared Speaking, Amy Gerber for finishing 3rd in Extemporaneous, and Kyleigh Klingshirn for taking 2nd in Beginning Prepared. Kyleigh represented Firelands at the State Contest on March 4th and was 6th in her semi-finals room.

On February 14th, eight freshmen FFA members took the State Greenhand Test. The team dominated the state, earning 3rd out of 174 schools. The team was 1st in the district. Jeanette Crawford was 6th individually out of 3643 students that tested. Jordyn Simpson earned 3rd in district and Trevor Wiley was 4th.

Also on February 14th, 15
FFA members competed in
the Ohio Farm & Agribusiness
Management Career
Development State Contest.
This is the first time Firelands
has ever competed in this CDE.
The team earned 6th in Ohio out
of 105 schools and narrowly
missed earning a state banner.
The team earned 1st in the
district. Garrett Schlechter was
1st individually in the district and
Grace Tansey was 2nd.

Advanced Robotics Class & Castle Crasher Competition

The Advanced Automation & Robotics class at Firelands High school recently completed the Castle Crasher competition. This project-based learning activity involved using VEX robotics equipment to build and program an autonomous robot to clear up to 10 buckyballs from an elevated 4' by 4' field in the least amount of time. Distance sensors that send out pulses of laser light were used to identify where the objects were located. Optical sensors that

measure ambient light, color, and proximity were used to determine the edge of the field to keep the robot from driving off the platform. Students documented their iterations and results in their engineering notebooks. Skills from this activity were connected with careers such as robotics engineering in relation to the automotive industry and manipulating rovers on Mars.

Meal applications can be completed anytime throughout the school year. If your income has been reduced by loss of job or any unforeseen circumstance, complete a meal application. You can complete it online at www.payschoolscentral.com or you can request a paper application.

PaySchools Central can help you keep track of items your child is purchasing using their meal account. If you have not done so, register at www.payschoolscentral.com. This site also allows you to put money on your child's account. You can complete a meal application as well as view reports of account activity. If you use the auto replenish for the online payments, check the date you entered to be sure it doesn't


automatically add money at the end of the school year if the account falls below the limit you set to replenish.

If you feel your child is spending too much money, please have a conversation with them. Our cashiers may question what is being purchased but it is not their responsibility to stop a student from making purchases. Contact Judy Baumann if you would like to discuss your child's account.

The end of the year is fast approaching. If your child has money left on their account, it will roll over to the next school year. Any Senior that has money left on the account may request a refund or if they have a sibling the money will be moved to the sibling's account. If we do not hear from the parent or guardian, the money will be added to our emergency account to help other students in need.



Board of Education February Meeting Highlights

The Firelands Board of Education met on Monday February 13th. Coach and retired teacher, Mr. Bob Donelson receive the "I Made a Difference Award." Mr. Donelson has been with the district for 45 years and was recently recognized by his peers (see article on page 2.) He was thanked for his dedication and commitment, care and respect for kids, and especially for his belief in the potential of all students.

Mrs. Cara Hutchinson, FMS principal, spotlighted two PBL (project based learning) projects. Mr. Cliff Sewald and 7th grade science students shared their "create a cooler project" and Mrs. Shelby McCarty spotlighted the middle school FFA program.

During the Treasurer's report, Mrs. Keri Agney shared that Firelands will be receiving \$140,000 in grant monies; \$50,000 in connectivity monies which will go towards 200 Chromebooks and licenses, and \$90,000 in K-12 Safety Grants. During the administration portion of the meeting, the special education director, Mrs. Cristin Cicco, shared that she presented at the Kinship program and provided answers to families with questions regarding intervention.

The district leadership went to extensive training for "value-added learning" and within the next month the training will be provided to all other stakeholders. Value-added analysis helps measure the impact schools and teachers have on student academic progress. The buildings were preparing for conferences and were collecting data from the latest benchmark testing to provide to the parents.

It was shared that the Firelands staff raised \$1300

for a local family who suffered devastating loss through a house fire. In addition, our students have been involved in numerous service projects since the first of the year.

Firelands High School, through Lorain County Public Health and our student resource officer, Mr. Adam Trifiletti, were able to bring the "Think Fast" program to the students, and it was well received.

Lastly, the food service coordinator, Mrs. Judy Baumann, is working with the broadcasting class to find ways to collect data so that they can better serve the students in the cafeteria.

During the board member reports it was shared that September 21st will be our annual fundraiser for the Endowment. The board was very pleased with all the service our students are providing our community, and the administration was thanked for providing our students with so many options to keep them involved and busy.

In superintendent's reports, there was an in-depth discussion of the proposed draft of the Hall of Fame Charter and Nomination Form.

A full list of recommendations from the meeting can be located on the website, but a few highlights are that after several years the FHS students will be given the opportunity to travel to Washington DC again, the FHS course catalog was approved for 2023-2024, and we are pleased to have bus mechanic Mr. Ernie Coultrip join our staff.

The last item on the agenda was approving a 3-year contract with the teacher's association which will expire in June 2026. Negotiations will begin with the members of the OAPSE association end of February, early March.

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
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
