Food Service News: Meals Still Available

Firelands nutrition staff is providing meals during the extended closure. For those that qualify for free or reduced meals, you can receive free meals during this closure.

You must fill out the Google survey so we can plan accordingly. You only need to fill out 1 survey per family which will allow you to receive free meals for the remainder of the closure. Go to the food service tab to complete the survey.

School food service depends on meal reimbursements to stay solvent. The food service department is self-sustaining and does not use from the general fund. For each meal sold the food service department gets

a federal reimbursement per meal sold, even during the closure. We encourage you to fill out the survey and take advantage of the meals offered.

Meals are being dispersed on Tuesday's from 11-1 and 5:30-6:30. Pick up is at Firelands Elementary School. Enter the drive by the main doors of Firelands High School and pull around to the bus garage, then to the Elementary School. Please stay in your vehicle and we will come to you. You must provide your child's name to pick up the meals. We will provide 5 breakfast / 5 lunches each Tuesday.

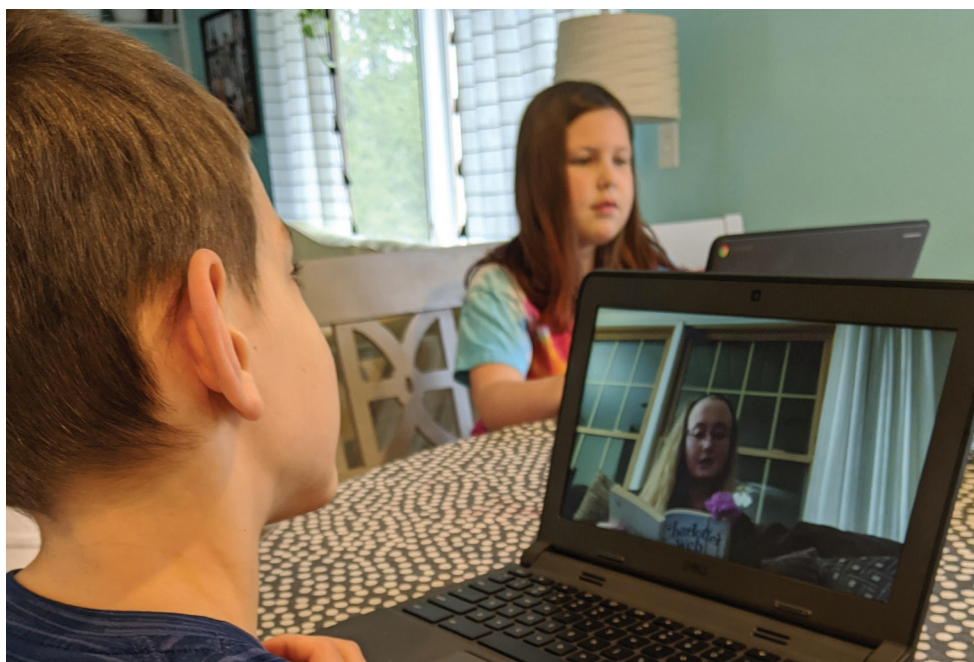

Each year, approximately two to three thousand submissions from students in 6th to 12th grade attending schools in 12 counties in Northeast Ohio are received. The essays are scored according to a matrix by hundreds of volunteer readers to determine the twenty-five top finalists. Students and schools are annually awarded \$100,000 in scholarships and prizes. The contest, now in its 12th year, has engaged over 30,000 students and provided over 1 million dollars in awards, made possible through the generosity of a donor and the support of sponsors.

FFA State Evaluation Results

Firelands FFA members submitted application and officer books for evaluation in January. Applications were evaluated at pre-evaluation, regional, and state evaluation. National level applications will move on to national evaluation in June. Firelands submitted all three officer books, three American Degrees, six State Degrees, and 11 Proficiency Awards.

Agricultural Proficiency Awards honor FFA members who, through Supervised Agricultural Experience, have developed specialized skills that they can apply toward their future careers. Nationally, students can compete for awards in nearly 50 areas ranging from agricultural communications to wildlife management. Proficiency awards are also recognized at local and state levels and provide recognition to members that are exploring and becoming established in agricultural career pathways.

Zachary Born applied in the areas of Agricultural Mechanics Repair Placement (2nd in district), Beef Production Placement (1st in district), Diversified Crop Production Placement (2nd in district), and Forage Placement (1st in district). Zach is top-four-in-state finalist for Diversified Agricultural Production Placement, Oil Crop Placement, and Grain Placement. He will interview for final placing at Ohio

FFA Convention.

Kaleb Carver applied for proficiency in Outdoor Recreation Placement and earned 2nd in district. Steven Jessel was 3rd in district for Outdoor Recreation Placement.

Keith Cornwell was first in the district for Landscape Management.

Katelyn Konicek earned 1st in district and is a top-four-in-state finalist for Equine Science Placement. She will also interview for final placing at state convention.

Zach Born, Sean Miller, and Morgan Nance all submitted American Degree Applications and all applications are being forwarded to national evaluation. As the highest degree achievable in the National FFA Organization, the American FFA Degree shows an FFA member's dedication to his or her chapter and state FFA association. It demonstrates the effort FFA members apply toward their supervised agricultural experience and the outstanding leadership abilities and community involvement they exhibited through their FFA career. Only about 0.5% of FFA members will achieve this award.

Kaleb Carver, Chance Coultrip, Donald Crawford, Kelsey Hardwick, Steven Jessel, and Katelyn Konicek will all earn their State FFA Degrees.

Only about 2.5% of FFA members will earn a state degree. They will get the award at Ohio FFA Convention.

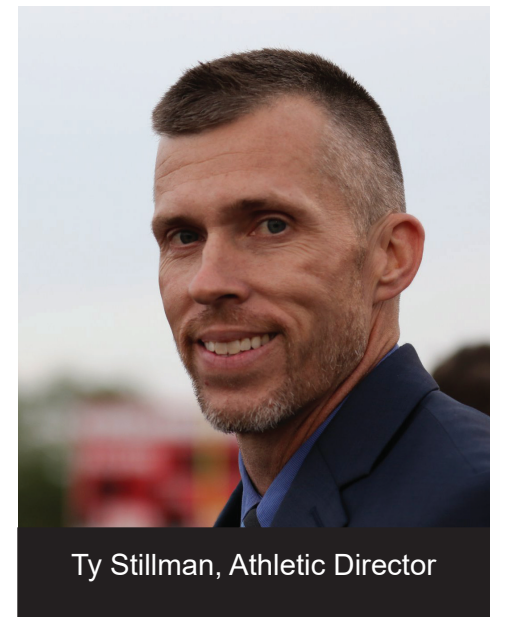
Athletic Director Reaches Out: A Letter From Ty Stillman

Firelands Sixth Grader Earns Ohio 4-H Horse All Star Award

On January 25, at the Ohio 4-H Center, 22 youth from Ohio were awarded the Ohio 4-H Horse All Star Award. This award is presented to 4-H members age 9-18 that have completed all eight state horse 4-H events. Callie Finnegan, a sixth grader at South Amherst Middle School, was the youngest State All Star this year and one of the youngest, perhaps the youngest, to ever win the award according to staff at in the Ohio 4-H Horse Program.

Callie competed in the state Horse Bowl last April. In June she competed in Ohio 4-H Hippology and Horse Judging where her team earned 3rd overall in judging and 9th in Hippology. Callie individually was 7th in judging for the contest, 10th in oral reasons, and 7th in performance judge.

In the State Horse Communications project, Callie earned 5th overall for junior competitors. She showed her

horse Cinnamon at state fair and earned 5th for in-hand trail, 9th in 9-18 showmanship, and 10th in reinsmanship.

At the Ohio State Fair Horse Skillathon, Callie earned 3rd for 10 year olds.

Callie competed at the State Groom and Clean contest and her team earned 9th overall in the senior division.

She finished her eighth activity when she rode her horse, Sunny, at the State Competitive Trail Ride.

At the award ceremony Callie earned a softshell jacket, certificate, and a trophy donated by Quarter Horse Congress.

Callie is one of three recipients from Lorain County. Callie is a member of the Four Leaf Clovers 4-H Club where her horse advisors are Ruth Davis and Heather Croushore.

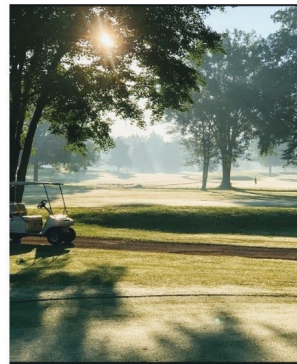

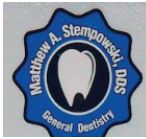
