New Career Technical Education: Coming to FLSD!

Laser cutters are expensive. A 3D state of the art laser cutter was out of the reach for FLSD Computer Science teacher Mr. Chuck Latto. He knew that students would benefit from learning about this type of technology, so he searched for grant funding. Through his research, he found that funding was a possibility through Ohio's Career Technical Education Equipment Grant. This grant addresses hands-on learning for some of the most in demand jobs in Ohio.

Large grants were also available, so Mr. Latto teamed up with Mrs. Lori Roemer, Director of Educational Services at FLSD, to create a grant proposal that would initially benefit all 420 students at Firelands Middle School. The two focused on providing access to specialized training, preparing students for the workforce, career exploration, promoting college readiness, and personalized learning. The course will also expand to freshmen through the Industry 4.0 Fundamentals program. High school students will have opportunities to earn The Industry-Recognized Credential Seal and SACA certification. The total ask for their proposed grant was \$487,829.44.

Their grant proposal, combined with support from the community and local employers, would provide advanced skills and possible SACA certification options for students upon graduation. The skills would support graduates entering the workforce or higher education by preparing them for some of the highest projected growth industries in Ohio.

Firelands is one of 56 schools selected from a pool of 174 for this ground breaking initiative! The grant funding, announced by Governor Mike DeWine, "will give young people the abilities and tools to meet the needs of incoming Ohio businesses. Students across the state of Ohio will be better equipped to secure well paying jobs, possibly even before they leave high school." During the announcement, it was shared that the FLSD CTE Grant Proposal was fully funded in the amount of \$487,829.44!

Mr. Latto, FLSD 6-12 Computer Science Teacher stated, "Bringing Industry 4.0 and Advanced Manufacturing training to Firelands School District is a thrilling opportunity to help prepare our students for the future. Manufacturing technology is evolving at an exponential pace, and it is important to provide our students with experiences that will prepare them for high-demand careers that involve key areas such as Cyber-Physical Systems, Internet of Things, Cloud Computing, and AI. It is exciting to be able to introduce these topics in middle school,

while providing additional opportunities for high school students to earn industry recognized micro-credentials through SACA."

Firelands will be supported by Amatrol and Buckeye Educational Systems. Amatrol is the global leader in CTE courses with their training solutions being used in all 50 states and over 50 countries. Their workbased curriculum (a combination of classroom, online and hands-on learning) will provide technical depth to learn and understand the industry needs and requirements. Over \$450,000 worth of machinery, software, classroom supplies, curriculum and instructional materials will soon arrive at the FLSD campus to support learning in the areas of construction technology, health and biomedical, Information technology, manufacturing, logistics and supply chain, transportation technology and agriculture. In addition, all curriculum, materials and licensing is

included with the grant funding. Buckeye Educational Systems will support the curriculum and work in partnership with Amatrol and Firelands Local Schools in order to maximize the potential of growth within our students.

Lori Roemer said, "expanding courses for our students in the field of industry and advanced manufacturing will empower them. This new course is not just an opportunity, but a promise of their limitless potential. With this grant we pave the way for their academic journey for many possibilities while igniting passions that will shape their future."

This turnkey grant supports the required professional development for Mr. Latto. It also funds the work-based curriculum (a combination of classroom, online and hands-on learning) to provide technical depth to learn and understand the industry needs and requirements. The new machinery, software, classroom supplies, and materials will soon arrive to support Industry 4.0 and Advanced Manufacturing training for Firelands students! The 3D laser cutter is on order!





Additional Grant News

Mrs. Dempsey, FES Gifted Specialist, was the recipient of two grants that will impact all students at Firelands Elementary School. First, the Firelands Endowment Trustees awarded \$4,320.00. The second grant is from the Martha Holden-Jennings Foundation and is also for \$4,320.00.

Working with the Cleveland Center for Arts-Inspired Learning, students in kindergarten through 5th grade will have the opportunity to enjoy targeted programming that highlights the arts into specific grade level standards and/or required social emotional learning.

Mrs. Hoban, FHS
Intervention Specialist, was
the recipient of a Firelands
Endowment Grant (\$1,691.00)
and the People Fund Grant
through Lorain-Medina Rural
Electric (\$5,000). These grants
will impact 50 students at FHS!
Mrs. Hoban runs the Transitions
Class, which supports students as
they learn about life and job skills.
The money will support Firelands
Outfitters which is a hands-on
student business.

Mrs. Hoban stated, "Due to grant funding, students will be able to continue creating spirit items and a percentage of the sales permits the students to engage in meaningful field trips. Our students will have the opportunity to engage with students from outside of the district that have created similar businesses.

Together, they will learn from each other and further develop their business skills."

The Firelands Local School
District was notified that grant
funding for specific, extremely
important safety projects, were
recently approved! Funding
has been received from the
Ohio Bureau of Workers'
Compensation, the Ohio Facilities
Construction Commission and the
Ohio Attorney General.

With this grant funding, window security will be improved. Lockdown devices will be installed to help barricade doors to classrooms and meeting rooms. Grants will also provide enhanced security through our network security devices, indoor/outdoor cameras, and AlPhone replacement projects (including phone buzzer audio video systems.) In addition to the \$38,000 received for the Centegix wearable security devices, FLSD received \$162,805 through this new funding. Combined, the district has sought and received over \$200,000.00 in safety grants!

Other documents may be needed including custody papers, special needs or gifted documentation, or residency affidavits.

Parents and guardians create their parent account (or log into their current account) and then add the student for 2024-2025. We have a Glow Dance coming up on March 22nd. Family Bingo night will be held in May.


8th grade information night was held during conferences, and the feedback was positive. Students in the 8th grade began scheduling for high school.



Food Service Updates and Announcements

Instructional School Fees:
If your children qualify for free meals, instructional school fees are not automatically waived. It is your responsibility to return the proper paperwork. If you notice the school fees are still owed, it is likely due to one of the following.

1) Direct Certified Students. The form that was mailed at the time of approval hasn't been signed and returned to Judy Baumann.

2) Online Portal. When applying through the online portal, the "Fee Waiver" box didn't get checked.



3) In 2021-2022 we had Universal Free Meals. A meal application was still needed to determine if school fees should have been waived. This was publicized numerous times to make everyone aware. Because all students were free, the Meal Application and Direct Certification was needed to determine who qualified for fee waivers.

Senior Meal Accounts: With the year end fast approaching, read this valuable information. During the last week of school if a senior has \$5.00 or less remaining on their account, the cashier can refund the money ONLY if the cashier has money in their drawer.

Look for a Google survey around May, for student account

transfer, refund, or donation request. This form will allow you to choose to transfer to a sibling or another student, request a refund or you can choose to add it to a donation account to be used to help other students in need. Once seniors are gone, if I don't receive a request I automatically check to see if there is a sibling and transfer to their account. IF NOT, I add the money to the donation account.

FMS/FHS Cafeteria: The staff have been hard at work providing some new options for students. Our Pizzeria is still featuring our signature homemade pizza on Wednesdays and Thursdays. Through March we have Warm



Up Wednesday and provide homemade baked potato cheddar soup on our Deli line. Our Garden Fresh line is changing up some specialty salads and will feature a Big Mac salad on Tuesdays. Our Grille line is popular with our students, allowing them to get a variety of burgers each Tuesday. The Main line features many bowl concepts, walking tacos, homemade macaroni and cheese and delicious cherry blossom chicken.

ALL students are welcome at any line regardless of their meal status. A reimbursable meal can be bundled at each station. If you find your child spending a lot of money, it may be due to them not getting the required serving of fruit or vegetables therefore they must pay ala cart prices.



We will have a scenario staged shortly after arrival and students will be able to witness the event with a follow up presentation in the competition gym.

Juniors and seniors leave for Washington, DC at the end of the month. We have 79 students, 8 staff members, and a few additional parent chaperones scheduled to go. Stops include the Capitol Building, Ford Theatre, the National Mall, the Smithsonian, a moonlight dinner cruise, Arlington Cemetery and the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, the Women's Memorial, and the Kennedy gravesites.

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
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


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
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
