From the Athletic Director: Spring Sports Wrap-Up

Softball finished the 2021 season with a big win as they defeated Columbia in the final LC8 match up of the year. The girls were also able to get a tournament win this year in the OHSAA Sectional Semi-Finals vs. Hathaway Brown. They were knocked out of the tournament in the next game by Keystone.

Overall, the girls played well, but struggled to close games throughout the year, losing more than a handful of games in the final two innings. It was not a typical 15-20 win season for the girls, but with so many great players graduating in 2020 and a year off due to COVID, getting their traction just took longer than we hoped. Their attitude and effort throughout the season was never in question. With the addition of a strong 8th grade class coming in 2022, we look forward to a great season next spring.

The Middle School track teams showcased a lot of talent

during the spring season as well as at the LC8 Championships. The 7th and 8th grade girls ran away with the team title scoring well over 100 points. The boys also scored over 100 points, but unfortunately so did Keystone and the boys left as runnerup. With none of our MS Track athletes ever running track before, I would say they came along way in a short time. We have a ton of young exciting talent in the 7th and 8th grade in both the boys and girls teams and I'm looking forward to watching them continue to grow over the next few years.

High school track finished the regular season with 2nd place finishes from both the boys and girls team at the LC8 Championships that were held here at Firelands. Both were nice accomplishments, as the girls have not had that high of a finish in over 8 years. There were a high number of elite senior runners that lead the way and we will miss them next spring, but the young talent will be ready to take the baton next year, no pun intended.

Both the boys and girls teams will competed at the OHSAA District Track meet at Orrville on May 20th and 22nd with the top four finishers in all events moving onto the OHSAA Regional meet at Austintown Fitch on May 27th and 29th. The Falcons are primed to have more than a few compete at the Regional meet in late May and look to send a few of those qualifiers to the OHSAA State Meet on June 4th and 5th.

Baseball has had a tremendous season and continued victoriously down the stretch, winning the final 11 regular season games and finishing 22-5. They beat Woodridge in the Sectional Final game at Firelands and advance to North Ridgeville and the OHSAA District Tournament. The boys were LC8 Champions with a 13-1 record in the conference and are ranked the #10 team in the State of Ohio for Division II. Let's hope they are hitting their stride at the right time and they are able to have a nice run into the post season. I'm very proud of these boys and coaches for all they have accomplished thus far in 2021.



FFA State Convention Recognizes Firelands Students

Congratulations to the Firelands FFA members who were recognized at the 93rd Ohio FFA Convention! With the help of the Firelands Technology Department, students were able to view the convention and simulate the experience as if it were live in Columbus.

Please help us congratulate our students that were honored at the convention. The State FFA Degree is the highest degree in each state. Only about 2% of all FFA members will earn this degree. FFA State Degree recipients include:

qualify for the superior chapter award and complete a required form. Chapters use the form to report goals, plans of action and results/evaluation on three activities for each division. State judges rank the chapters as gold, silver or bronze based on the rubric. Chapters receive a multi-year plaque and yearly plaque inserts, commonly known as spurs, specifying the level achieved each year.

Firelands has qualified to submit their application at the national level this summer for national ranking.



State Gold Rated FFA Officers include Kelsey Hardwick, Secretary 2020 & 2021 and Katelyn Konicek, Treasurer 2020 & 2021.

Agricultural Proficiency Awards honor FFA members who, through supervised agricultural experiences, have developed specialized skills that they can apply toward their future careers.

Katelyn Konicek earned Equine Science Placement 3rd in state in 2020 & 3rd in state 2021, and 1st in district (2019, 2020, 2021). Katelyn worked for two horse farms. Her excellent record keeping and exceptional application helped her earn top four in state. In March she interviewed with evaluators to determine final placing.

The Charitable Giving acknowledgement recognizes FFA chapters who have donated \$500 or more in charitable donations. Congratulations Firelands FFA for once again supporting our community and beyond! Through various projects, Firelands FFA donated over \$2500 in 2020 to local organizations and families in need.

The nationally recognized Firelands FFA program is under the leadership of FHS alumna and agricultural education instructor, Mrs. Shanna Finnegan. The chapter has 76 active AET students!







SAMS Project Lead the Way: Green Architecture

Note: Project Lead The Way (PLTW) is an innovative project-based learning program that incorporates science, technology, engineering, and math. PLTW empowers students to develop and apply in-demand, transportable skills by exploring real-world challenges in an exciting and engaging way.

7th graders in the PLTW course Green Architecture at SAMS are getting a unique opportunity to apply STEM skills related to the construction of the new high school. During a preliminary design meeting, it was realized that some of the software being used in the design of the school is the same software the students are using in class.

Students use a CAD (Computer Aided Design) program called Revit which is made by the software company Autodesk. This program is specifically used to create 2 dimensional and 3 dimensional floor plans of commercial and residential buildings. After students learn how to use an architectural ruler to design floor plans in various scales with paper and pencil, they take their designs and recreate them using Revit.

One of their class projects is the design of a shipping container home made from four 8' by 20' containers on a single level. Millions of shipping containers are piling up at our harbors and recycling them into homes helps solve this problem. Students use the engineering design process to come up with the best design. They start off filling out a Design Brief that identifies their client. To make the project more meaningful and realistic, students are allowed to select their own client such as a relative, famous sports figure, singer, actor, or organization such as the Red Cross. This document also clarifies the client's current problem that could be solved by the design and construction of the home. After brainstorming and researching several ideas, the next step involves sketching at least 3 different designs. The best design is selected using a Decision Matrix that has students identify the best of their designs based on specific criteria.

After their final design is selected, a final copy of their floor plan is made using architectural rulers and professional templates to draw their design with doors, windows, furniture, and dimensions in ¼" scale. Finally, using Revit, 2D and 3D floor plans are generated along with virtual walkthroughs if time permits.

Through the design process students practice criticalthinking, problem-solving, and decision-making skills that will prepare them for future careers. Engineering and technology related careers are also encouraged throughout the project. As the new school construction progresses, one goal is to acquire some of the plans to share with students helping them continue bridging what they are learning in class with real-world projects.

Meals served to online students




Money remaining on accounts



3rd Grade Studies Hamburgers vs. Tacos

If you had the choice of a free hamburger or taco, which one would you choose? This year's in-person 3rd graders had that big decision to face.

As a reprieve and celebration after finishing state testing, teachers created an entire unit focused around two of the most popular food choices in America. Students began by studying the history of hamburgers and tacos and compared/contrasted these items. 3rd graders then made their decision of which food they would focus on for the remainder of their studies. They continued their authentic learning experience by doing online research to discover popular toppings, healthy options for their food, local availability

and price. They also took orders from different menus and were learning how to make change!


Students then used this research to open up their own food truck business selling either hamburgers or tacos. Using math skills such as perimeter, area and geometry, students built a 3-D food truck as a model of their business. Next students had to create a menu for their business and decide what kind of shells/buns, meat options, toppings and condiments they would have available. (We are happy to report that there were many vegan and gluten free options available!) Additionally, the children continued their research by looking at Taco Bell and McDonald's advertisements

and went on to design their own poster advertisements complete with logos, slogans, bright colors and enticing offers. To wrap up their hard work, students then got to do some virtual ordering from each other's restaurants. Students were placed in pairs in breakout rooms on Zoom and took orders from each other's menus online. It was an adorable site to see students wearing their headphones, welcoming customers, taking their orders, figuring out totals and taking virtual payments for their orders!

To culminate our studies, these happy 3rd graders loved being able to "taste their success" with 2 free soft tacos donated by Taco Bell in Vermilion to each student that chose tacos and a discounted hamburger provided by McDonald's in Vermilion to each student that chose hamburgers. The 3rd grade team would like to thank these two businesses for working so cooperatively with us for our students! We hope our community continues to support these two generous local businesses!


Young Authors




