## High School Construction Meetings Underway

I am pleased to tell you that our construction process is underway! Firelands Local Schools and the Ohio Facilities Construction Commission (OFCC) jointly selected BSHM as the architectural firm to design our new high school. BSHM will also be working with Clark and Post Architects (based in Lorain, OH) on our project. BSHM has been in practice since 1962 and has vast experience working with and designing educational structures.

We are currently in the process of selecting our construction manager at risk and commissioning agent. While there are multiple delivery options available to public entities, the construction manager at risk model was chosen by our Board of Education because once selected, the firm will be immediately involved in the design of our new high school which will help ensure our project remains within budget and on schedule. A commissioning agent is required by the OFCC and acts as a checks and balance process for the district and our taxpayers. Commissioning agents have extensive technical background and

expertise with verification techniques, functional performance testing, system equipment and operations and maintenance knowledge.

Over the next several months we will begin a process called educational visioning. Through conversations with our staff, students, parents and community, we will discuss our vision for education in Firelands and how our new high school will support that vision. As part of our campaign commitment to our community in the design of our new building, please join us on December 5th at 6:30 p.m. in the Band Room at FHS for our first community visioning meeting. A second meeting will occur on January 29th at FHS at 6:30 p.m.

During the visioning process, the district will also create surveys to gather input from those that are not able to attend the meetings. Notices of surveys will be:

## LETRS Training for Elementary Teachers

Starting this year, our first and second grade teachers from Firelands Elementary School are participating in a researched-based LETRS (Language Essentials for Teachers of Reading and Spelling) training program led by the State Support Team of Lorain County. The training is a three year commitment from the teachers and the district. The training provides teachers with a core understanding of language structure and helps them to gain in-depth instructional information to complement their teaching practices.

The content in LETRS training address each of the following components: phonemic awareness, oral language development, vocabulary, reading fluency, comprehension and writing.

During the training, the teachers build a bridge between

research and practice. They cultivate knowledge about teaching literacy and language and develop the ability to diagnose and overcome students reading challenges. They learn practical strategies that work for every type of learner and increase effectiveness of core reading instruction.

Teachers matter more to student success than any other aspect of schooling. Research shows that LETRS training prepares teachers to teach the components of reading instruction and apply the learned strategies to their daily instructional practices which supports the increase of student achievement in reading.



### Winter Activities

## Severe Weather Policy and Procedures

### Winter is early this year!

The bad weather can be difficult for parents *and* the school system. To best prepare for the season, we will again share information regarding our District's policy for closing or delaying school due to inclement weather. The Superintendent may close the school, dismiss students early or delay the opening of school in the event of hazardous weather.

When severe weather approaches, we typically begin monitoring roads and facilities at 4:00 a.m. Mr. Mike Von Gunten, Superintendent, and Mr. Milt Saylor, Transportation Director, work together to determine if a weather delay or closure is necessary. Typically delays or cancellations occur between 5:15 – 6:00 a.m. In some cases, a closure can occur the night before but most often a final decision is made in the early morning hours on the day of the closure or delay.

How does a district make the decision to delay or close? Road conditions, building and grounds conditions, air temperature and weather forecasts are all taken into consideration.

As a reminder, we must comply with minimum hours of instruction each year. The district may extend its school year if the school closes enough that it approaches the minimum instructional hours of required time. Calamity make up days have been included on the District Calendar. You can see the calendar here.

also the father of our Head Start teacher, Mrs. Jenny Ketcham.


### First Grade Says Thank You

Here is an excerpt from the blog post regarding a new bus safety initiative.

*Nationwide, the safety of students entering and exiting school buses is a very real concern. Most of us have watched clips of distracted drivers not paying attention to the flashing lights and extended stop-arm. These reckless drivers are responsible for unnecessary tragedies that are absolutely preventable.*

*In an effort to protect our children, several of our school buses are now equipped with*

*stop-arm cameras. This initiative is designed to raise awareness and affect driver's behavior. These cameras run automatically when the stop-arm is extended and will record any stop-arm violation.*

*Reducing the illegal passing of stopped school buses is a community effort. The District and law enforcement wants to remind our local drivers to be patient when traveling near school buses. Further, we ask that you review bus laws, especially with young drivers.*

## Firelands Fall Sports Round Up

It has been a fantastic fall sports season for the Falcons as the class of 2020 did a fantastic job leading the way on the fields, courts, fairways and trails. The leadership and positive energy that these young men and women brought to Firelands helped build the culture that will help the underclassmen understand what it will take to reach their goals for years to come.

The new conference has a lot of parity from top to bottom in all sports, which has made the games exciting and competitive on a night to night basis. The boys' varsity soccer team was able to capture the schools first Lorain County League Championship and defeat Elyria Catholic in the OHSAA Sectional Semi-Finals all in a weeks' time.

The Falcons were also able to qualify for the 2019 OHSAA State golf tournament as junior Jackson Talbott represented our golf team in Columbus for the first time since 2006.

Adding to the first place boys Soccer finish, the Falcon teams as a whole finished well as Girls Cross Country and Girls Soccer both finished second in the conference. While Golf finished third and Volleyball finished fourth in the LC8. Volleyball was able to capture a Sectional Championship as they defeated Clearview in the semi-finals and Rocky River in the Championship game. They would fall to last year's State Champs in Holy Name the following week, but the girls were able to secure more wins in a season than any other in the history of Firelands (as far as we have been able to find) with a 17-7 record.

Fourth and fifth grade gifted classes recently attended Food For America, an agriculture education program hosted by our own Firelands FFA in conjunction with other local FFA chapters.


Prior to this fun and informative experience, the elementary students were asked to plan to share what they learned with students in younger grades. Armed with notepads and pencils, students furiously took notes on every topic at the event. Once they were back in the classroom, additional research was done for each student's topic of interest.

Fourth and fifth grade gifted math and reading students were able to then collaborate on similar topic choices and work together to create presentations, while keeping their audience in mind, just as the high school FFA students had done for theirs.

First and second grade classrooms hosted presentations given by the fourth and fifth graders. Topics included wheat, corn, soybeans, maple syrup, draft horses, rabbits, and tractors and farm equipment, to name just a few.

This is a great example of our older students modeling leadership and expertise while inspiring younger students, as well as teachers working together to support students in authentic learning and collaboration!

## Subbing for Firelands Schools

Classified substitutes are always needed to help out in the following areas: kitchen, custodial, SAFE before and after school program, lunchroom and recess aide, classroom aides (special needs attendant, paraprofessional), bus monitors, and bus drivers.

To be eligible, you must pass a background check and complete an interview at the Board of Education. Some positions require additional credentials, such as bus drivers and aides.

All aides must have the "Educational Aide" permit through the [Ohio Department of Education](#) (ODE) for \$25. For information on bus driver training, please contact Milt Saylor at 440-965-4105.

To apply for classified substitute positions, visit the [Firelands website](#) and click on Employment. Applications are submitted by following the link to the North Coast Council

Application Consortium, where all of our positions are posted.

Teacher substitutes are hired through the [North Coast Shared Services Alliance \(NCSSA\)](#) and are paid \$95 per day, \$100 on the 11th day. Applicants must have a clean background check, bachelor's degree, and the proper license from the Ohio Department of Education.

Please visit the NCSSA website for more information on being a substitute teacher at Firelands.

All applicants for all positions must be fingerprinted. We use the [Educational Service Center of Lorain County](#) for that process. Please call ahead for an appointment at 440-324-5777. The cost is \$60 for both state and federal checks.

## School Immunization Requirements for 2019-2020

If your child will be entering 12<sup>th</sup> grade, 7<sup>th</sup> grade or any grade for the first time -- it is now time to update immunizations. If entering school for the first time, or after attending school elsewhere, please be sure to check that your child is in compliance with State of Ohio immunization requirements.

- **Kindergarten** – once your child has reached age 4, s/he can complete all required immunizations for diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus (DPT), polio (IPV), hepatitis B (HBV), measles mumps, rubella (MMR), and varicella (chickenpox). If going to be entering kindergarten next year, if possible, have them done and bring a copy of the record to Kindergarten screening in May.
- **Grades 1-6** – same requirements as for Kindergarten
- **Grades 7-10** – grades K-6 requirements plus Tdap (DPT booster) and MCV (meningococcal vaccine)
- **Grade 11** – grades K-6 requirements plus Tdap (received in 7th grade or later)
- **Grade 12** – grade 11 requirements plus MCV (must be received at age 16 or older)

Remember to bring your child's immunization records with you when you go to your healthcare provider or clinic. Please send a copy of the immunization record to the school nurse in your child's building, being sure your child's name is on it. Don't forget to keep a copy for yourself!

**Lorain County Public Health**, 9880 S. Murray Ridge Rd., Elyria, OH 44035 is now offering immunizations (also known as vaccines) Monday through Friday, 8:30 am – 3:30 pm, with evening hours throughout the month. A full vaccine clinic schedule is available at [www.LorainCountyHealth.com](http://www.LorainCountyHealth.com). Appointments are encouraged, although walk-ins are accepted. Call **440-284-3206** for information or to make an appointment for both children and adults. Bring all immunization records, insurance cards, and cash or check; although some children may be eligible for discounts under the Vaccines for Children (VFC) program. All children under age 18 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

**Note:** Ask your provider about additional vaccines that are recommended for children ages 11-19 such as 2<sup>nd</sup> dose of varicella (chickenpox), hepatitis A and human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccines.

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
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
