Open Doors Academy at Firelands Middle School

Did you know that Firelands Middle School offers more than just after school care? The Open Doors Academy (ODA) program at FMS is an after-school enrichment program that is designed to support our students through providing academic support, social-emotional learning, and college and career readiness. This free program began in 1992 as a drop-in latchkey program in Cleveland. It has developed into the independent non-profit program that provides wrap-around services to kids and families. All of our staff members have been trained in the ODA's philosophy which includes:

Shared Responsibility – Together, ODA and FMS, along with the community, and parents/guardians share the responsibility for raising each youth in a safe and supportive environment that challenges them to reach their full potential.

Life Long Learning – ODA believes that learning is not confined to childhood or the classroom alone, but takes place throughout life and in a wide range of situations.

Civility – ODA seeks to create an environment that supports and encourages care, respect, and empathy while acknowledging the culture and humanity of others.

Perseverance – ODA challenges all youth to defy the status quo in breaking through the glass ceiling to reach their dreams.

Culture of Excellence – ODA staff, students, and parents reflect the desire to function at the highest levels possible in academics, relationships, character, and citizenship.

FMS ODA director Mrs. Nakita Doane states, "the program offers our students a spot to hang out after school. During the time that students are with us, we have dedicated homework time, snacks, and general fun! The students have enjoyed having Mrs. Johnson join us for some Boom Wacker musical fun. In a few weeks we will work with the kids and a group from the MAD Factory!" Limited space is available in the program. ODA is offered on a first-come, first-served basis for students in grades 6-8. The program operates M-F when school is in session until 5:15 pm.

Once a week the volunteers will meet their student to read the child's book of choice with the child rather than just reading the book to the child. Engaging the child with open ended questions encourages children to think and talk about what they are reading. Active reading improves a child's language skills, vocabulary, and the ability to understand what they read on their own. After the book is read three times, the student will be able to take the book home with them!

All the HUMC volunteers have had in-depth background checks and parents/guardians have been informed. An initial training session was held for volunteers to further understand the expectations of the program. FES Assistant Principal Mrs. Laura Groboske led the training and stated, "Our students are lucky to be able to spend this time with willing volunteers that want to share in the growth of our Falcons".

Falcon Fall Sports Wrap Up



What a fall to be a Falcon! Starting back in June and July our high school fall sport teams began to train, while the coaches started to formulate their game plan for having a successful season in 2022. Now that all of the dust has settled on the Fall 2022 campaign, it is easy to see that hard work and dedication to their craft paid off in a big way.

The girls' soccer team won the conference championship for the first time in school history by going undefeated in the conference at a perfect 10-0. They scored 30 goals against league opponents while only giving up 4 total goals to conference foes. The girls didn't stop there as they then

won a OHSAA DII Sectional Championship defeating Pepper Pike Orange 8-1. The girls eventually lost in the DII District Semi-Finals in overtime to Padua.

Many Falcons received multiple Conference, County and District accolades, but those accolades were highlighted when senior Bella Simmons received 2nd Team All-Ohio and became only the 5th girl in Firelands history to reach All-State status. Congratulations to all the girls who made this season such a memorable one.

The boys' soccer team continued their domination in the conference as they won their 4th straight Lorain County

League title this past fall. Coach Zurcher and Coach Yakunovich have never lost the league since its inception, and we hope that trend continues in 2023.

The boys were a perfect 8-0 in the conference with 24 goals scored against the league and only 6 given up. The boys also won the OHSAA DII Sectional Championship defeating Cleveland Benedictine 4-1. They eventually lost in the District Semi-Final game to #1 ranked Revere High School. We are looking forward to watching the younger boys in the program take the next steps for the Falcons. They will have to do it without a great group of seniors that led so well and grew up so much over the past four years.

The Volleyball team is trying to do their best to follow in the footsteps of the great Sue Pete coached teams of years past. They went undefeated in the conference with a perfect 14-0 only losing 2 sets and winning 42. This is now their 2nd straight Lorain County League Championship and they look to add to that in the years to come. The girls lost in the sectional finals to a talented Tallmadge team, but with all but two girls returning to the team next year, the Falcons look for big things in 2023.

Football also had their share of success. After starting off the year with a loss to Edison they then rattled off 7 wins in a row and qualified for the play-offs

for only the fourth time in school history. Along the way Coach Ryan O'Rourke became the winningest football coach in Firelands School history with 36 total wins. The next closet coach had 32 wins.

With big wins against Rocky River,

Vermilion and Keystone, the boys achieved many of their goals. With a double overtime loss to Columbia, 29-28, they were not able to capture Coach O'Rourke's first ever Conference Championship. Weston Strader was a big part of the team's success as he broke a few school records: rushing yards in

> a game (406 vs Keystone), and rushing yards in a season (2009 total yards.) Thank you to all the athletes, coaches, parents, and community members that made the 2022 Fall Sports Season such a great time to be a Falcon. Looking forward to a

Professional Development Includes Safety Drills

While students were enjoying a long weekend, FLSD staff members participated in professional development (PD) on campus. The more professional development that teachers/staff receive; the more likely students are to succeed. PD options include workshops, meetings, training sessions, peer collaboration, and much more.

November 7th was part of the scheduled time that staff had to receive training though multiple outreaches. Prior training sessions were held in late August before students arrived on campus.

Kindergarten through 2nd grade teachers spent the morning in sessions with Heggerty/Fundations (systematic programs focusing on foundational literacy skills).

3rd-5th grade teachers, specialists, occupational therapists and speech pathologists worked on vertical alignment (what the student should be learning in their grade level and also the grades above and below) in writing with all content areas.

FMS and FHS teachers worked in their departments or individually to create or continue work on project-based learning lessons (students learn by actively engaging in realworld and meaningful projects). Content departments worked with Michael Triska, Technology and Integration Specialist, from the Lorain County Educational Service Center. In addition, teachers received informational sessions on multi-tiered systems of support (a process to help identify struggling students early and provide intervention quickly) with Dr. Amanda Price.

School Counselors, social workers and psychologists all worked on various topics

including mental health, school counselor themes, social emotional learning and finished with student career planning with the Ohio Department of Education.

During the afternoon, staff members gathered for a joint safety briefing and prepared for a campus wide active shooter drill. No students participated in this drill. School Resource Officer (SRO) Deputy Northeim led the drill with assistance from the Lorain County Sheriff's Department and SWAT team.

The realistic drills encompassed multiple scenarios that all included an armed perpetrator entering our facilities during school hours. The intruder fired simulation rounds, which sounds and smells like live ammunition, in each building. These shots rang through the hallways and allowed our staff members the opportunity to better their reaction in preparation of an actual emergency. During the drills, staff members called lockdowns, closed and barricaded their doors as the intruder made their way through the buildings. During the first drill, our SRO was first on scene and had to apprehend the intruder without initial support.

During the second drill, responding offers arrived on campus and immediately worked to apprehend the intruder, clear the building of any additional threats, and supported the SRO or commander as they would in a real situation.





While difficult to participate in active shooting drills, we are encouraged with how well our local law enforcement is prepared for such a situation. Their dedication to our community was evident in their approach to these life saving drills.

Our staff members responded extremely well! Quick acting employees assisted law enforcement when possible and created barricades that the responding departments couldn't access.

We are committed to understanding and learning how to be best prepared in the event of an emergency on our campus. While these drills are difficult in many ways, they are necessary to better our response to an unthinkable situation. We truly appreciate the partnership with our law enforcement and our staff members that all work extremely hard to create the safest environment possible at Firelands.



What Can You Do To Help?

Talk openly and honestly with your child. Ask open ended questions that require more than just a yes or no answer.























New Clubs & Other FHS News

Students can create individualized study plans through Khan Academy that are based on these results and use those plans to prepare for the SAT.

FFA Judges at AAQHC



The world's largest singlebreed horse show, the All American Quarter Horse Congress, is an annual monthlong show held in Columbus, Ohio. It is home to the best of the best, with nearly \$3.5 million dollars worth of prizes and a multitude of events for all disciplines of Quarter Horses. One of such is the Youth and Collegiate Horse Judging Competition, featuring teams from all across the nation. Only one 4-H & one FFA team can represent each state. Breed associations also can send a representative team to compete.

Madison Chenoweth, Kyleigh Klingshirn, Ava Fontaine, & Morgan DiCesare members of the Firelands FFA, were the team selected to represent Ohio FFA (pictured at left). In April, their teamwork secured them 5th in the state in FFA horse judging, earning them the once-in-alifetime opportunity to judge at Congress in October.

In the competition, the four were tasked with judging twelve different classes and presenting four sets of oral reasons about why they placed a class a certain way. Some of these classes included trail, hunter hack, western pleasure, halter classes, and many more. At the awards ceremony, the announcer explained that this youth judging contest was the toughest and most competitive of all the national invitationals. The team from Firelands, representing Ohio, earned 16th in the nation. Although they may not have come home with the win, the chance to compete at such a level and attend an event like this was an amazing experience for all four.

Manufacturing in Action Field Trip



Last month, high school students from Mrs. London's Business class and Mr. Latto's Automation and Robotics class attended the Manufacturing in Action field trip at Lorain Community College. Students engaged in hands-on experiences to learn about career pathways in areas such as electronics, computer aided machining, and automation.

During the Microelectromechanical System (MEMS) presentation, students were able to see up close how to solder and build circuit boards under a microscope while learning about the program's career opportunities. It was shared that students from this program learn valuable skills that transfer directly to employment opportunities at companies such as the new Intel plant in Columbus and Ford Motor Company in Avon Lake that recently received a large grant to begin building electric vehicles. In the electrical engineering session, Firelands students practiced using Arduino microcontrollers and breadboards to prototype electronic circuits including LED lights. In one of their final

sessions, students learned how to use a computer controlled laser engraver to create metal name tags.

At the end of the program, students had an opportunity to eat lunch with industry leaders to discuss employment opportunities and have their picture taken with the humanoid robot Pepper.

Food Service Information

What is PaySchools Central?

It is a central site that is used for many different things such as online meal assistance application, online payment system and reporting system. With the reporting system you can set low balance reminders, auto-replenish accounts, and see what has been purchased from your child's account. You set the parameters.

To get started, go to www.payschoolscentral.com. First time users must register first, then follow directions. You can use computer or mobile device.

Payments on Account

Payments can be made online or by cash or a check made out to Firelands LSD. Please write the students name in the memo line. For elementary students, please place cash or check in an envelope with the student's name on it. Money is given to the homeroom teacher.

Negative meal accounts are allowed only for complete meals, NO ALACART CHARGING. The negative accounts must be taken care of in a timely matter. This is each student and parent's responsibility.

Free and Reduced Meals may be an option for you. If you are unsure if your child/children qualify for meal assistance, please contact Judy Baumann.

We are self-supporting and use federal money to operate, so no local tax money is used. The Food Service department is reimbursed by the federal government for each breakfast and lunch that is sold.




