Substitute Levy - Not a Tax Increase

Firelands Schools is on the ballot with an important substitute levy, Issue 16. This substitute levy will not increase taxes, and instead consolidates and replaces our two existing emergency levies – both set to expire in 2021 – into a single levy. This unified levy is listed on the ballot as a 5.98 mil, 10-year substitute levy.

Here are important details about this levy:

- The substitute levy keeps taxes as they are for current property owners.
- It ensures our District can continue to provide the high-quality programs we offer in academics, athletics, and the arts.
- It maintains existing, necessary funding for day-to-day school operations, including classroom materials, technology, transportation, and teachers and student support staff.

After the first year, District revenue would increase only from new homes that are built in the district - which would be taxed at the same rate as current property owners.

Without the substitute levy, Issue 16, the District would lose \$2,320,000 in existing annual funding. It would force the District to make reductions, impacting our education and programs.

Construction Crew Digs In

Work on the "building pad" has been completed. This is a flat, stable base from which the actual construction of the building will occur. The contractor is currently excavating soil for the new parking lot and the detention basin. The detention basin is a large shallow dry pond that holds water on the site during heavy rainstorms to prevent flooding the school's neighboring property.

Progress on the building design continues. The architects have been meeting with various teachers and other district staff to finalize many of the details of each learning space.

One exciting feature is the "Extended Learning Areas" or ELAs. These are specialized, open and flexible learning areas spaced throughout the building. The ELAs are designed to accommodate a wide variety of teacher instructional practices. These spaces will

provide students with an exciting new alternative place to collaborate with their peers in all subject areas. The ELAs will help to ensure that our new high school supports whatever the future holds for our students!

Kindergarteners & Bus Safety

Mr. Sayler spoke to the Kindergarten classes about the importance of bus safety. He reviewed how to sit in the seats, how to get on and off the bus, and how to cross the road safely. The students should wait for the bus driver to give the signal to cross (the driver's raised hand will lower). He stressed the importance of getting to your bus stop on time and being careful while waiting for the bus. He showed the students how to take 10 giant steps to be clear and safely out of the "danger zone." Freshmen Contribute to Art Installation in Los Angeles

This pandemic is reshaping all of us. It is certainly redefining education and defining this generation of students. Folding a flat square of paper into a bird form is an apt metaphor for this transformation. The Firelands High School art department and freshman class of 2024 participated in the collaborative installation "Honoring Matter" organized by artist Karla Funderburk in Los Angeles. Funderburk, a ceramic artist and gallery owner has been

working since May to fold one *orizuru* (paper crane) for every American victim of COVID-19.

The cranes are strung and hanging from the ceiling of her gallery. She quickly learned that she couldn't keep up the pace and needed help. Her story made the national news in August where Mrs. Tawil caught the project and brought it to FHS.

Freshman orientation day included a session of learning about the purpose and place for memorials, symbolism of the *orizuru* and the "Honoring Matter" project followed by folding the

birds. All of the art classes also learned about the project, decorated their squares and folded birds on the first day of school. 202 orizuru were packed and shipped in September to be installed in the gallery (pictured above). Funderburk was so moved by our contribution that she sent a hand-written thank you note and left a grateful voice-mail message.



Nothing Says Fall Like a Pie in the Face!

Levy Committee Stops at Nothing to Raise \$3,000 for Issue 16









On October 6th, three lucky winners were drawn from a pool of supporters who pledged \$16 for each entry and a chance to "pie" FES teacher Philip Goldberg, SAMS teacher Ty Grude, and Superintendent Mike Von Gunten.

The event was streamed live on the Future of Firelands Facebook page. Other fundraisers included t-shirt and facemask sales. The final amount raised for all three fundraisers was \$3,000. Thank you to everyone who participated!

Issue 16 Substitute Levy FAQ

What is Issue 16 on the November ballot for Firelands Schools? The Firelands Board of Education voted unanimously to place a 5.98 mil, 10-year substitute levy that does not increase taxes on the November ballot. Issue 16 consolidates and replaces two existing emergency levies that expire in 2021 into one substitute levy that will not increase taxes. A substitute levy allows Firelands School to combine existing levies, generate additional revenue from new homes that are built, and keep your taxes the same.

Why does the school district need Issue 16? This substitute levy – Issue 16 - represents \$2.32 million in existing funding, or 12% of the District's local funding, and is necessary to continue providing the high quality programs in our academic offerings, athletics, and the arts that students needs to be successful in today's society.

How much more in taxes will residents pay with this levy? Residents' taxes will not increase with passage of Issue 16. It is a substitute levy which replaces the school district's two existing emergency levies (set to expire in 2021) and keeps taxes as they are today for current property owners.

What is a "substitute" levy? A school district can substitute or replace an existing emergency levy – without increasing taxes – with a substitute levy. A substitute levy is identical to the existing emergency levy it replaces with one exception – as new homes are built in the district, they will be taxed at the same rate as current property owners – and the school district will be able to realize some additional revenue from the new growth only.

How much will Issue 16 generate for our schools? The substitute levy will generate the same amount as the emergency levies it is replacing – \$2.32 million – its first year, and a minimum of \$2.32 million annually each year after that. As new homes or businesses are built in the district, they will be taxed at the same rate as the current owners – and the school district will be able to realize some additional revenue from the new growth only.

How long will the levy last? The substitute levy will expire after 10 years. Will the amount voters pay increase? No, the amount voters pay will not increase over time.

What if Issue 16 does not pass? The loss of \$2.32 million in funding would have a direct impact on educational programs and student services. By law, school districts cannot operate with a deficit, and therefore the Board of Education would have to identify millions in cuts to balance its budget.

Didn't we just pass a bond issue? Why is this needed? Firelands Local School District voters passed a bond issue in November 2018. Thank you for your support. There is a difference though between a bond issue, which is for capital and building expenses, and a substitute levy, which is for day-to-day operating expenses for academics, programs, and educators. The substitute levy on the ballot this November will not increase taxes. The funds the substitute levy generates, which are set to expire next year, must be completely separate from expenses for the new and renovated building.

When is Election Day? Election Day is November 3. Polls are open on Election Day from 6:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. Early voting begins October 6.

How do I check my voter registration or request a vote-by-mail ballot? The Boards of Elections are already accepting Vote-by-Mail/Absentee ballot requests. 
General Membership Meetings




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
