PBIS (Positive Behavioral Interventions & Supports) is a framework that is utilized to create a school environment at FES that is positive, predictable, safe and equitable. At the end of the 2020-2021 school year, the FES PBIS team (pictured

below) submitted an application to the state of Ohio to receive the first level of recognition from the state for our efforts. Each year, the Ohio Department of Education and the PBIS Network recognize schools and districts for their quality and fidelity of PBIS implementation.

In mid-August the FES administration was notified that we had earned the first-level Bronze Award by the state. The team will continue to further refine and develop our practices in order to improve our implementation of PBIS.

Class Dojo


FES Open House & First Day South Amherst Middle School **Leads the Way**

South Amherst Middle School has been recognized as a 2020-21 Project Lead The Way (PLTW) Distinguished School. It is one of just 158 middle schools across the U.S. to receive this honor for providing broad access to transformative learning opportunities for students through PLTW Gateway. PLTW is a nonprofit organization that serves millions of PreK-12 students and teachers in schools across the United States.

The Project Lead the Way Distinguished School recognition honors schools committed to increasing student access, engagement, and achievement in their PLTW programs. To be eligible for the designation, South Amherst Middle School had to meet the following criteria:

- · Have more than 50 percent of the student body participating during the 2019-20 school
- Have 25 percent of students advancing to high school participate in two or more units:
- Offer at least one PLTW Gateway unit at each grade
- Have strategies and supports in place that support reasonably proportional representation with regard to race, ethnicity, poverty, gender and can support such claims with relevant data.

"It is a great honor to recognize South Amherst Middle School for their unwavering commitment to provide students with an excellent educational experience despite the unusual circumstances and unique



challenges that the COVID-19 pandemic presented to the educational landscape this past year," said Dr. Vince Bertram, President and CEO of PLTW. "They should be very proud of their achievements in unlocking their students' potential and equipping them with the knowledge and skills necessary to thrive in life beyond the classroom no matter what career path they choose."

All school forms will be completed through Final Forms: https://firelands-oh.finalforms.com/. Any changes in contact information, including phone numbers or email addresses must be updated in this platform throughout the school year.

Delays in important email communications from principals or the district can happen if ALL the forms, including student forms, are not completed. Alerts have been sent to students and parents/guardians to complete forms. Please do not ignore these notifications. PowerSchool will not be updated until all documentation in Final Forms is 100% finished.

It is extremely important for forms to be completed today. Contact information is critical in case of an emergency.

Food Service News

Free meals for all students for 2021-2022. The USDA has extended the free meals for all students regardless of need. All students may get a free breakfast and lunch every day.

Our number of meals have more than doubled since last year. This is great for our students to be able to have access to nutritious meals. Students must take the required components to qualify for a reimbursable meal.

Ala cart items are not free. Items may be purchased using money that has been put on your child's account or they can bring money to school in the form of check or cash. Students cannot charge ala cart items. Students must have money on account or cash to purchase.

Meal/Fee Application. The meal application is being used to determine if your child/children qualify to have instructional fees waived. If you have completed this application but receive a letter stating your child is reduced or denied, they can still get FREE meals. However, the instructional school fees will not be waived. When completing the application, be sure to check mark the box for fee waiver. Fees will not be waived if this is not marked.

Food Supply Shortages.
Nationwide food supply chain shortages due to issues with labor, transportation, and raw materials continue to affect breakfast and lunch menus. For example, there are long term shortages for bread, bottles for drinks (like Gatorade), eggs, condiment packets, and much

more. These shortages may force us to make substitutions at short notice.



One Team, One Dream: Firelands Athletics Capital Campaign



The ONE TEAM, ONE

DREAM campaign is one in which Firelands Local Schools will generate privately raised funds to turf the existing high school football field through selling naming rights to our current and future athletic facilities. By placing artificial turf on the existing football field we will be able to move both boys and girls soccer from the SAMS campus to the Firelands campus. We will be able to have a state of the art practice and playing facility for the marching band, football, baseball, softball, and soccer teams as well as all of the youth sports.

WHY TURF AT FHS?

During my research in regards to the athletic needs of Firelands Local Schools, the one big recurring issue that I found for a district our size is unusable athletic fields. Natural grass simply cannot remain lush and resilient if used more than three to four days a week, in snow or drought, or during months when grass doesn't grow. When the fields are wet, the opportunity for our teams and our community to have a place to call home is only possible 3-4 months a year. This issue, along with an escalating need for durable fields that accommodate multiple teams and activities, the high cost of maintaining a grass sports field or landscape, and the need to conserve water, have prompted

a rising number of schools, parks and municipalities to turn to synthetic turf to meet their needs.

With the new building coming in 2022, moving our athletes to one campus is going to be critical for not only financial reasons, but a logistical reasons as well. We would no longer have to travel for home soccer games, and there would be no need to maintain the SAMS field with fertilization, cutting, electricity, and restrooms.

I believe that a synthetic turf field could be used 12 months a year and benefit the entire community in these ways:

- Baseball and Softball throwing, catching/skill development.
 Can hold practices after school rather than waiting for gym time. Can hold scrimmages on a turf field per OHSAA bylaws.
- Track and off season field sports would use it for speed development/ skill development.
- Band can use the field for practices and performances, spring tune-up, and summer camp.
- Soccer can have practices and games for all levels, open fields for camps and clinics. Host OHSAA playoff soccer.

- Football can have year-round practices for all levels, plus camps and clinics, throwing and games. Host OHSAA playoff football.

SYNTHETIC TURF BENEFITS

Synthetic turf has a measurable, positive impact on the environment.

A typical natural grass sports field requires between 500,000 and 1 million gallons water per year. Every square meter of natural grass replaced with synthetic saves 2,200 gallons per year. Synthetic turf conserves 4 to 8 billion gallons water annually.

Synthetic turf eliminates the need for harmful pesticides and fertilizers, a principal cause of water pollution, which can lead to algal bloom, depleted oxygen and damage to wildlife.

Helps reduce noxious emissions from maintenance equipment and mowers. A push mower emits as much pollution in one hour as 11 cars. A riding mower emits as much as 34 cars.

Synthetic turf has been

proven to be a highly costeffective investment. A synthetic turf field pays for itself over 3-4 years. The cost of installing and maintaining a synthetic turf field over a 20-year period (including one replacement field) is over 3x less expensive per event than the cost of a grass field.

Maximize land use with the same surface space. Synthetic turf promotes greater utilization of land than natural grass, as vou can achieve more with the same surface space. This is especially useful for highly urbanized environments with limited access to recreational areas, maximizing event spaces, or areas in drought.

Ideal for inclement weather climates. Preparing and

maintaining natural turf can be particularly challenging in cold or very hot climates. Natural turf is generally in poor condition after long winter months, requiring extensive maintenance and re-leveling. Hot climates experiencing drought face significant water shortages. Synthetic turf playing fields remain uniform and consistent. season after season, and can be used within hours of installationwithout worry of damage.

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
