FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

The Firelands Local School District

Help us continue down the path to success!

In May of 2011, the residents of the Firelands Local School District generously approved a five-year 5 mill Emergency Property Tax Levy that raises \$1.5 million dollars per year to support the continued operation of the District. The successful passage of this levy was the first approval for new money since 1996 and it allowed The Firelands Schools to continue to provide

one of the best educations available in Lorain County. We are very proud of our teachers and employees who work each day to ensure student growth and learning by adapting to the ever-changing educational mandates by the state of Ohio. Since 2012 and through solid financial decisions and reduced costs in key areas, the District has maintained and built a positive cash balance. The current 5-year financial forecast places the District in the black through 2018; however, it is dependent on renewing the expired levy.

Important Facts

1. On December 8, 2014, in a unanimous vote, the Board approved a resolution "declaring it necessary" to renew the emergency levy for a five-year period that would begin in January 2016.
2. On May 5, 2015, the Board will ask the residents of the Firelands Local School District to approve a **RENEWAL** of the original five-year emergency levy passed in May 2011, which will continue to generate \$1.5 million per year to support operations of the district and **WILL NOT RAISE TAXES.**
3. The \$1.5 million emergency levy is due to expire in December 2015. The revenue generated by this levy represents more than 8% of the Firelands Local Schools' General Operating Budget.
4. Providing a quality education is essential to the local economy and attracting jobs and businesses to the Firelands community.
5. This levy is important because it means we will be able to continue progress in our schools, provide financial stability, and help maintain the current level of teachers and instructional support in our classrooms.

We are proud of the Firelands Schools, our programming, and our high levels of achievement, which are noteworthy. It is my honor to highlight the following Firelands facts:

Frequently Asked Questions—FAQ

Why is it necessary for the Firelands Local Schools to renew the current emergency levy?

Background:

- Our public funding structure in Ohio means that virtually every school district throughout the state must return to voters for support an average of every three to five years.
- The district has stretched its resources by cutting its budget, reducing expenses, and making difficult decisions to save money. The district has reduced staff by more than 20 (approximately 10% of our total workforce) employees over the past decade to provide for more efficient operations.
- FLS provides services, such as state mandated transportation, to students attending private and parochial charter schools in our local communities. The levy renewal is important to continue to provide educational choices to students and parents.

How do the Firelands Local Schools perform when compared to other Lorain County Schools and what are some examples of what the renewal levy provides for the District?

Progress:

- Since 2012, the Firelands schools performance index ranks in the top five of 14 schools and the top 6 of 14 schools for value-added measures in Lorain County.

- Since 2012, Firelands High School has worked to increase course offerings:
 - ⇒ Will add three new honors courses for the 2015-2016 school year, in addition to the six current honors course offerings
 - ⇒ Will add one new Advanced Placement (AP) course for the 2016-2017 school year, in addition to the one current AP course offering
 - ⇒ Will add four new College Credit Plus (formerly called Post-Secondary Enrollment) courses through the Lorain County Community College offered on the Firelands Campus for the 2015-2016 school year, in addition to the five current PSEO course offerings
- Since 2012, the Firelands Schools continues to increase student participation in extra-curricular activities:
 - FHS
 - ⇒ 14 sports and three activities (30 teams)
 - ⇒ 386 participants (63% of the student population)
 - SAMS
 - ⇒ 7 sports and two activities (16 teams)
 - ⇒ 247 participants (58% of the student population)

How do the Firelands Local Schools maintain solid financial progress and what happens if the renewal levy does not pass?

FLS has a solid financial plan and an independent team of state auditors to hold district leaders accountable.

- FLS has established strong financial controls, including independent financial professionals who are working to ensure responsible financial management throughout every aspect of district finances.
- FLS received the Ohio Auditor of State Award for exemplary financial reporting in 2012 and 2013.

- If the Emergency Renewal Levy does not pass, transportation, textbooks, computers, updated technology, after-school learning programs, music and art appreciation programs, athletics and other services that support learning will be put at risk. Passage of the Emergency Renewal Levy will ensure the district is able to continue the progress being made in our classrooms.

How are the Firelands Local Schools different from other school districts?

- Rightsizing staff and buildings to align with enrollment demands

BIG WIN FOR ART STUDENT

A third year Firelands art student earned an award in the Cleveland Clinic eXpressions art competition. Junior **Victoria Krejci** earned a red ribbon (2nd place) for her mixed media sculpture "What Makes the Difference" illustrating the differences nurses navigate between technology and hand-written recording of patient data. To put this win in perspective, of 25 winning high schools, dominated by AAA schools, Krejci's work is one of 5 works that is *not* from a Division I school. In fact, her work is the only winner from Lorain County.

The Cleveland Clinic Office of Civic Education hosts the annual *eXpressions: An Intersection of Art and science*. Art students from high schools from Ohio and Florida interpreted research conducted by Cleveland Clinic high school summer interns. Over 1,200 works were submitted this year. The process includes research and writing to gain understanding of the topic. The Art 2 and Art 3 students selected their own studies to illustrate from a list of over 125 summer projects. The art students conceptually illustrated the research and composed brief artist statements for their entries.



A panel of art educators, medical researchers, medical illustrators, photographers, media and public health professionals evaluate each submission on interpretation, creativity, presentation, and initiative. The judges awarded four levels of special recognition. In descending order they are: Blue Ribbon, Red Ribbon, White Ribbon, and Honorable Mention. Blue Ribbon winners receive \$100. Red Ribbon winners receive \$75; White Ribbon winners, \$50; and Honorable Mention winners, \$25. The Firelands Art Department will also receive a \$100 educational grant for producing a winning entry in art.

Exhibition and Catalog

All of the award-winning submissions, including Victoria's work, will be featured in a full-color *eXpressions* catalog of the exhibition, which will open with a reception and dedication on January, 29, 2015, from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. at the Global Center for Health Innovation (Medical Mart), Cleveland. The exhibition continues into early March. The exhibit is open to the public during regular business hours, Monday through Friday, 8:30-5pm.

Freshman Class: Project Lead the Way

This class is offered to Sophomores. Project Lead the Way (PLTW) offers a dynamic high school program that provides students with real-world learning and hands-on experience. The PLTW curriculum allows students to see how the lessons they learn in the classroom are valuable tools to be applied in their everyday lives. We will be scheduling for the sophomore year at the end of February.

Sophomore Class: On Thursday, January 29th, all interested sophomores who have turned in a permission slip will be touring the JVS. This trip will allow them to observe the various career programs available to them. The JVS Open House will be Sunday, February 8th, from 1:30 to 3:30p.m. Students interested in attending the JVS for the 2015-2016 academic school year must apply online at lcjvs.com/high-school/how-to-apply.shtml.

The Ohio Graduation Test will be March 16th – 20th. All sophomores are required to take and pass all 5 portions (Reading, Math, Writing, Science, and Social Studies) in order to graduate. This will be their first opportunity to meet this graduation requirement. Juniors and Seniors who have not passed all five sections will need to participate.

Junior Class: The scheduling process for your senior year will start Monday, February 17th and end Friday, February 20th. It is time to register to take the ACT this spring. You can register online at www.actstudent.org. Students interested in the Test Item Release can do so in April.

Senior Class: The application for the endowment scholarships will be available online by the end of January. Visit the Firelands website at www.firelandsschools.org, click the high school>guidance>financial aid and college/scholarship resources and view the Scholarship information. Here you can download the local scholarship application.

The College Financial Aid Process has started. Go to www.fafsa.ed.gov to start your application today and apply for your pin. Ms. Spicuzza, a college financial advisor, will be assisting families with the financial aid process. You can sign up in the guidance office to set up an appointment with her for any questions you may have.

SAMS Students Study Ancient Greece

In the Social Studies classroom today we no longer are limited to dates and dead people. We are questioning how ancient civilizations have impacted society today. When studying Ancient Greece we watched a documentary that spoke of the creation of an aqueduct around 500 B.C. on Samos Island just off the coast of Turkey. The aqueduct ran from a spring, through a mountain and into the city. What puzzled us was the explanation as to how the ancient Greeks built the aqueduct through the mountain. The engineer who devised the plan to create the aqueduct decided how he would bore through at two points directly across from each other on opposite sides of the mountain. We didn't understand his plan to start digging the tunnel simultaneously from both sides of the mountain meeting up in the middle. In the explanation from the documentary they described how the engineer Eupalinos used a right triangle to calculate a spot on each side of the mountain that was equal in elevation. We then discussed why math is important in the real world.

- ◆ In an effort to solve this history mystery, I consulted an engineer from the FAA, Stan Callahan. He researched Samos Island and the building of it's aqueduct. Upon his research, he and I created a lesson including 4 engaging experiments that the students conducted in groups. They recorded their findings in a google classroom document. Students then wrote their explanation of how Eupalinos knew where to start digging on each side of the mountain so they could meet in the middle.
- ◆ Students thoroughly enjoyed the experiments and working with Mr. Callahan. Some were so excited to be able to explore the ancient and modern versions of the instruments that were used to construct this aqueduct, and more importantly how valuable researching with peers can be. I can predict several future engineers were birthed through this process. Students learned the essential question of how ancient civilizations contributed to our society today.
