FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT



The Ohio Department of Education finally released official school report cards in late February. As predicted, the Firelands Local School District received the designation of "Excellent with Distinction!"

It is my honor and pleasure to congratulate our students, parents, faculty, and

members of the community on this great accomplishment! Our efforts to ensure student learning and growth are paying off. Firelands is one of 138 schools in the state to receive the aforementioned designation. We met annual yearly progress (AYP), scored "Above Growth" in the Value-Added Metric, and achieved a district performance index of 103. The performance index ranks us 4 of 14 public schools in Lorain County and 147 of 610 public schools in the state of Ohio.

Merriam-Webster's Dictionary defines quality as "a: degree of excellence, b: superiority in kind."

The Firelands Local Schools produces a quality education for our students year after year. This quality education is a testament to the hard work of our teachers, parents, and students. At FLS, quality and excellence in education are a marathon, not a sprint. Like the long distance runner, we train our students for the marathon of their lives with consistent shorter runs, the activities of their 13 years here. We ensure a quality education and we achieve excellence when we prepare *all* of our students academically, when they pursue a sense of responsibility for the world in which they live, and when we provide a safe environment for them to try new experiences—sometimes *not* succeeding—but always learning the skills needed to pick themselves up, re-evaluate, regroup, and try again. ACRE OF DIAMONDS

Many years ago, a young American was traveling down the Tigris and Euphrates rivers in the Middle East and was accompanied by an old Arab guide he had hired in Bagdad.

During the trip, the old guide told him a story about an ancient Persian named Ali Hafed. Hafed owned a very large farm, orchards, grain fields, gardens, and money coming in from loans made. He was a wealthy and contented man.

But one day Hafed was visited by an ancient Buddhist priest who told him how the earth was created and, particularly, the most valuable thing in the world—diamonds!

Said the priest, "A diamond is a congealed drop of sunlight." The priest told Hafed that, if he had one diamond the size of his thumb, he could purchase the entire county, and if he had a mine of diamonds, he could place his children upon thrones through the influence of his great wealth.

This set Hafed's mind ablaze with a lust for such great wealth. So he sold his farm, left his family in charge of a neighbor, and began a search for diamonds in places the priest had said might contain them. Hafed spent all his money on his lifelong, unsuccessful search and died, far from home, a penniless, suffering, afflicted old man.

The man who purchased Hafed's farm one day led his camel into the garden to drink, and as that camel put its nose into the shallow water of the garden brook,

Hafed's successor noticed a curious flash of light emanating from a black stone in the stream. He pulled out the black stone and placed it on the mantel of his home, and forgot all about it.

A few days later, the same Buddhist priest who had taught Hafed about diamonds came to meet the new owner and saw the black stone. "That is a diamond!" he shouted. When his host said it was just a pebble he had picked up in the garden, the priest replied, "I tell you I know a diamond when I see it. I know positively that is a diamond."

It turns out that the farm became the famed diamond mine of Golconda, the richest diamond mine in all history. The Kohinoor diamond and the crown jewels of England and Russia, the largest on earth, came from that mine.

The moral, of course, is that, if Hafed had spent the time and energy to explore his own farm, he would have discovered riches beyond his wildest dreams.

This story should teach us all that, if you wish to be great, you must first begin where you are—NOW. If you serve your city well, if you are an honest person, if you are a good provider for your family, whether you work in a shop or in a factory, whatever be your life, you will find true happiness. To be great anywhere, you must first be great in your own town.

I challenge our educational community to continue our greatness, to continue the quality product that we produce in our students. How do we achieve these goals? By continuing to teach our students the joy of working harder than they ever thought possible, by helping them learn to manage their time, by enabling them to recognize their own strengths and weaknesses, and by actively involving others in helping turn those weaknesses into strengths. This is the recipe for success, quality, and excellence in education—and every day we recommit ourselves to new levels of achievement and success.

If possible, please have them completed before kindergarten registration.



Attention: Parent/Guardian of current 6th grade students:

Because of outbreaks of pertussis (whooping cough), the State of Ohio is now requiring students to have a diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis booster (DTP or Tdap) by the end of 6th grade. If one was done in October 2008 or later, your child does not need to get an additional shot but you need to send the record in. If there has NOT been one since October 2008, your child will need to get it. Winter Season Sport Summaries**Athletics**

Now that the winter seasons have wrapped up here are the season summaries as submitted by the coaches.

High School Girls Basketball

The Lady Falcons Basketball teams found great success this season. Finishing with a 17-6 record at the end of the year was the most wins since 1997. The Varsity team won the PAC championship with an amazing mark of 15-1 and look to be strong contenders for next year. Leading the way all season long in scoring was Rachel Holowecky (13.6) points per game. Casey Morrisette was also a major contributor averaging 11.7 points per game. Freshman standout Keely Hall led the team in rebounding with 178 on the season, while Destiny Samples followed with 128 rebounds. The season was a success because of the hard work and dedication the girls put in during the offseason. The Varsity team was not the only team to see success this season, the Junior Varsity team had an amazing season of 18-2 and 14-2 in the PAC. They also won first place and had a win streak of 15 games. They were led by Sophomores Heather Smyth and Taylor Young. Freshman players Kate Michener and Alex Willis also contributed in the awesome season. The ninth grade girls' basketball team finished the season with a 7-9 overall record and a 5-3 record within the conference. The team's strengths were their hustle, intensity and defensive effort. Through hard work in practice, the girls were able to improve in every single game. Leading the team in scoring were Dalaney Rogala and Kayla Unger, each with 65 points. Also contributing were Julia Ohle (58 points) and Brylee Jones (51 points).

High School Boys Basketball

The varsity boys basketball team enjoyed a successful 2012-2013 season. The Falcons finished with an overall record of 14-9 and 11-5 in conference play. Their 11-5 conference mark was good enough to claim the outright conference championship in the PAC Stars Division. After starting off 2-3 in

conference play, the Falcons went on a roll, winning 9 of their next 11 conference games. The regular season was capped off with an exciting comeback win over Brookside, 48-46, in the final regular season game. After trailing 28-15 at the half, the Falcons were able to fight their way back into the game in the third quarter. Senior Forward Joe Hyster scored the game winning basket with 3.1 seconds to seal the victory and conference championship for the Falcons. Statistical leaders in scoring for the Falcons were Seniors Joe Hyster and Nick Bauer at 12.5 and 10.5 points per game. Hyster also led the Falcons in rebounding with 7.0 rebounds per game and Sophomore Cole Sklarek was the assist leader with 3.6 assists per game. The 2012-2013 boys J.V. basketball season was a successful one with wins over solid opponents. Even though the record was 11-11, the team and individuals improved in their basketball skills and knowledge of the game. The team started off 2 - 6, but after understanding what it took to win games, the boys came back with a 5 game winning streak and stayed around .500 for the rest of the season. A big part of the turnaround was Dakotah Klingshirn. His leadership was a big boost to his fellow teammates. On the statistical side of the season, Johnny Sigsworth, a Sophomore post, was the team's leading scorer with an average of 8.5 points per game. The team's second leading scorer was Freshmen point guard, Jack O'Keefe, who came on strong at the end of the year with an average of 5.7 points per game. The freshmen basketball team had a winning record for the 2012/13 campaign as they finished 11-7 overall and 9-4 in conference play. The season was full of close finishes with the Falcons on the up side in most them, scraping and playing hard from the opening tip to the final buzzer. Solid work, team effort and the Firelands family all contributed to a winning season.

Bowling
