Monthly Message

Often, I am asked the following question: "What is the common core?" In short, the Common Core State Standards are a state-led effort to establish a single set of clear educational standards for kindergarten through grade twelve in English language arts and mathematics. The National Governors Association and the Council of Chief State School Officers with input from teachers, parents, school administrators, and education experts from across the nation led the initiative. I encourage you to visit www.corestandards.org for more information regarding the Common Core State Standards. In addition, please visit www.firelandsschools.org for informational videos surrounding the Common Core initiative.

Many people may ask at this time, "Why did the article begin with a brief synopsis of the Common Core State Standards Initiative?" The simple answer to this question is that there has been a recent flood of media attention surrounding the subject and I believe that it is important to voice our support as a local school district.

The Common Core Standards provide a framework for a common sense approach to education that is reasonable, flexible, and one that allows the needed

local control to provide an excellent education. However, as has been the case countless times before, education stands at a crossroads where the voices of the few may disrupt the path to success that I believe to be associated with the Common Core Standards.

It is my opinion as a professional educator that the Common Core Standards provide a consistent, clear understanding of what students are expected to learn, so that teachers and parents are able to be an integral part of the education process and to ultimately help their students.

Many arguments and much misinformation have permeated the media in recent weeks. The fact remains that the standards do not represent a federal takeover of education, as Ohio will retain complete control over the standards. Further, we overwhelmingly adopted the Common Core two years ago as part of Ohio's new learning standards and as such, we have invested invaluable time and money in acquiring the necessary technology and professional development associated with the assessments. Moreover and most importantly, the Common Core Standards provide us with a level of both rigor and expectations for our students that are unsurpassed by any previous set of state standards.

As I express our support of the Common Core, I am reminded of our unwavering commitment to produce well-rounded citizens. In the words of long time educator and public school advocate William Phillis, "The creation of the public common school system was not just about the 3Rs. It was about the development of citizens who would be able to maintain a democracy. The achievement of the 3Rs was not the end but a means to the end of nurturing the young to appreciate and foster life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness (Ohio E & A, 2013)." To this point, I am compelled to share the following letter from an unidentified principal:

"We are concerned that these tests do not always assess all of what it is that make each of you special and unique. The people who create these tests and score them do not know each of you-- the way your teachers do, the way I hope to, and... certainly not the way your families do. They do not know that many of you speak two languages. They do not know that you can play a musical instrument or that you can dance or paint a picture. They do not know that your friends count on you to be there for them or that your laughter can brighten the dreariest day. They do not know that you write poetry or songs, play or participate in sports, wonder about the future, or that sometimes you take care of your little brother or sister after school. They do not know that you have traveled to a really neat place or that you know how to tell a great story or that you really love spending time with special family members and friends. They do not know that you can be trustworthy, kind or thoughtful, and that you try, every day, to be your very best... the scores you get will tell you something, but they will not tell you everything. There are many ways of being smart."

(Ohio E & A email communication, 2013)

Please know that we are here to support you and your child in the pursuit of knowledge and citizenship. It is always our goal to provide students with the tools necessary to be successful in all future endeavors. We look forward to your continued support and partnership in this process.

SOPHOMORES November 18th to 22nd, we will be focusing on career education with the Sophomore class to assist them in the major decisions they will have to make this year about their educational path. Students will explore college preparation, college options, college Tech Prep, and vocational training programs at the JVS. We will be using the Ohio Career Information System and the PLAN test data to assist with career planning. Listed below are the scheduled dates for information sessions about what is available at the LCJVS.

JVS Presentation to Sophomores – November 22, 2013
 JVS Sophomore Tour – Tuesday, January 28, 2014
 JVS Open House – Sunday, February 19, 2014, 1:30p.m. – 3:30p.m.

JUNIORS We will be using the Practice ACT data for college and career planning. Students will receive their results in December, and we will use the data for Senior scheduling. Students should check out the www.actstudent.org website. We recommend for students to take the ACT or SAT once during their Junior year, usually in the spring or early summer.

ALL SENIORS

The process of selecting a college to attend after high school can be daunting, from scheduling visits to completing the applications and securing the necessary financial aid.

There will be a lot of things to cover in the coming months, including applications, financial aid, and scholarships. While we are making every effort to help seniors with their college plans, we also encourage juniors and sophomores to develop a college plan by going on college visits, taking postsecondary exams such as the PSAT, PLAN, or Practice ACT and the ACT or SAT prior to the beginning of their senior year.

Golf

All students are required to wear their red concert polo, black bottoms, and dark color shoes. More wanted!!

At least as far as immunizations are concerned, 7 of the current 128 sixth grade students do not have to worry about being excluded from school next year because their immunizations aren't up-to-date. However, one hundred twenty-one (121) sixth grade students received notices with their first quarter report cards that they will need to get a Tdap (tetanus-diphtheria-pertussis) booster. This is a requirement by Ohio state law because of outbreaks of whooping cough (pertussis) in middle school populations across the state. If your child is currently in 6th grade and received a Tdap or DTP in October 2009 or later, he/she does not need to get an additional shot, but the school needs to receive the updated record. If there has NOT been one since October 2009, your child will need to get it. You can go to your regular healthcare provider, a retail walk-in clinic, or to one of the health department walk-in child immunization clinics ([see www.loraincountyhealth.com](http://www.loraincountyhealth.com) for dates, times, locations, or call 440-322-6367. No one is turned away from a health department clinic because of inability to pay). If students who are currently in 4th and 5th grades get a Tdap booster, it will count for 7th grade.

If your child has had a recent Tdap or DTP, please send a copy of the updated immunization record to the school nurse, Mrs. Matus, being sure your child's name is on it. Don't forget to keep a copy for yourself!


Eyes for Andy and Kick-It

Once your child is 4 years or older, he/she can complete the immunizations required for school entry in autumn 2014. You can go to your regular healthcare provider, or to one of the health department walk-in child immunization clinics; check www.loraincountyhealth.com for dates, times, locations, or call 440-322-6367. There is a charge for each immunization, but no one is turned away from a health department clinic because of inability to pay. Be sure to have your child's immunization record with you when you go.

If possible, please have them completed before kindergarten registration in March, and

remember your child must be 5 years old by August 1 to register for Kindergarten.

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



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
