FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

As we enter the second quarter of the 2015-2016 school year, I am happy to share with you some of the many accomplishments and service projects our students took part in during the first quarter. The accolades listed below are a true testament of the work ethic and character of the students in our district.

Academics:

- * The 5th grade academic challenge team finished second at their competition through the North Point Educational Service Center.
- * 24 students were recognized in September and October as "Finest Falcons" at the elementary school
- * 69 students at the middle school were recognized as "Fabulous Falcons" at a breakfast held on November 10th
- * The middle school's academic challenge teams took third place in 7th grade and second place in 8th grade
- * 60 students were recognized with a luncheon at the high school for their achievements and growth during the first quarter
- * College entrance exam scores surpassed the prior year and are well above the state average

Co-curricular:

- * Our FFA Chapter is ranked as one of the Top 10 Chapters in the nation and was recognized as the National Champion for Models of Innovation. In addition, the FFA Food for America Committee has collaborated with students from Wellington and the JVS to develop an agricultural literacy program connected to Ohio's 3rd Grade Science Standards
- * The Mighty Falcon Marching Band was named as a Grammy Signature Finalist (one of only three in the State of Ohio)
- * 10 middle school students currently have their art work on display at the Educational Service Center in Elyria and 10 high school students had their art work displayed at the Lorain County High School Art Exhibition

Athletics:

- * The high school cross country teams advanced runners to the OHSAA Regional Meet
- * Volleyball and boys' soccer teams qualified to the district semi-finals

- * Our football team qualified to the Division IV playoffs (only the second time in school history)
- * The middle school girls cross country team finished 2^{nd} and the boys finishing 4^{th} in the conference

Service:

- * 4th grade students welcomed 54 veterans for an appreciation program held on November 11th
- * On November 9th, 6th grade student hosted "Setting the White Table" in honor of our veterans
- * Over 20 students at SAMS are volunteering to make blankets for The Blessing House
- * High school students held fundraisers in October for juvenile cancer and hunger
- * 6th grade students collected donations to provide Thanksgiving baskets to over 20 families in our area
- * FFA organized a food drive and is participating in Crocheting for a Cause, a service project to make blankets for families who recently gave birth to twins born with twin-to-twin transfusion syndrome

JUNIORS

The **Signs of Suicide and Depression program** was designed to open up a discussion on mental health concerns and how to address the topic. The students were provided with the opportunity on how to identify symptoms, brainstorm coping skills and know whom to turn to for help. COLLEGE PREP INFORMATION

COLLEGE VISIT FORMS

Seniors are allowed 3 college visits to view colleges of their choice and ask questions of the college admission staff. A form is available in the guidance office. This form must be given to the main office **before the student can visit the college**. It counts as a day of attendance, but missed school work must be made up. Juniors are allowed 2 college visits.

Collaboratively created by 68 Firelands High School first through fourth year studio students, this book aims to depict images unique and exclusive to the Firelands district. Students brainstormed subjects that are distinctive to our beautiful school and district. Each artist selected one image to develop into a visually rich page using a variety of rich patterns and line weights.

The act of coloring has been re-discovered by older students and adults as both focusing and meditative and also satisfying and rewarding. In 1922 Winston Churchill expounded on the value of "painting as a pastime" to rest over-worked areas of the brain through art-making. More recently Johanna Basford, a Scottish textile artist single-handedly re-invented the coloring book with her 2013 publication "The Secret Garden". Today highly detailed coloring books that require fine motor skills and an adult's patience have created a social movement and taken the market by storm. Coloring books are great gifts and a great way to de-stress from a busy holiday season. Use this coloring book to rest and reward your brain and to celebrate all things Firelands!

Coloring books are available from Mrs. Tawil, FHS Art Teacher and at the K-12 winter music events as follows; SAMS winter choir concert Dec. 2 at 7pm and Thur. Dec. 17 at both the 6pm FES winter music program and 7pm FHS winter music extravaganza. The books are \$10 each, 2 for \$15 or 3 for \$20. "America's White Table"

Firelands Local Schools is known for a lot of positive community actions including numerous graduates who go on to serve our country through one of the armed forces. Several years ago one of our former students stopped by for lunch with his sixth grade teachers at South Amherst Middle School. As our lunch came to an end we, the sixth grade team, promised that young man that we would never forget his faithful service nor our students who had given all. Thus our "Setting of America's White Table" was birthed at South Amherst Middle School.

The history behind "America's White Table" appears to have originated during the Vietnam War as a reminder of those fallen soldiers and the soldiers missing in action. The table is small because the soldiers are alone away from their families and friends. The white table cloth is then used to cover the table because white symbolizes purity, anyone who has seen a soldier sworn in knows they are joining the military with a pure heart. A lemon and salt are placed on the plate to symbolize the bitter tears that are shed by their families, friends and teachers who are left behind. Then an empty chair is pushed under the table to symbolize their empty seat at the dinner table. This is followed by a

black napkin and an overturned glass for the soldiers who are being denied a meal due to being held in captivity for our freedom. Finally, a white candle and a red rose are placed on the table for the hope that all of our soldiers will return safely to their home of loved ones.

This year on Monday, November 9, 2015 the sixth grade students of South Amherst Middle School will once again invite local veterans to an assemble where they will set "America's White Table". This is done for two purposes, first to thank the local veterans for their service to our country and secondly to never forget our former and future students who will continue to serve this great country.


others say it is because we as a community want our students to learn to give back, still others agree with Billy Sunday when he said, "But by the grace of God that could be me".

SKIMMER PROJECT

The 7th and 8th grade STEM class at SAMS learned about measuring with precision and accuracy during the completion of their Skimmer project. Students used blueprints to measure, draw, and cut out parts for their skimmers. Skimmers are vehicles made out of heavyweight, cardstock paper that is launched across the floor through a motion similar to throwing a bowling ball. The bottom of the skimmer is designed to make it ride on top of a cushion of air reducing frictional forces and allowing it to travel over 40 feet. Performance is based on accuracy of measurement, cutting, assembly, and workmanship. After building their stock skimmers, students use the engineering design process to create their own skimmer with the goal of improving performance.

As we enter the winter season and routines have settled, our teachers continue working hard to prepare students for college and career success related to Ohio's Academic Content Standards while still holding true to the local curriculum decisions that makes Firelands, Firelands! I appreciate everything they do to help support our students as they meet grade level expectations.

Preliminary state achievement

data from the 2014-2015 testing administration has been released. The majority of our students did meet state achievement goals in many of our reported areas, but we did not meet proficiency in many cases on the Annual Measureable Objectives (AMO) due to the large number of students who did not test last year. AMOs measure the academic performance of specific groups of students in comparison to the collective performance of all students in Ohio; this score is what determines school funding and participation in the Ohio Improvement Process (OIP) a process that determines what local control staffs have in determining direction for their students and the district as a whole.

As the ODE website reports, 'If a subgroup's participation rate drops below 95 percent, the school's or district's AMO letter grade is reduced by one level (e.g. if a school would have earned an "A" based on the students' test scores and the percentage of students who graduated, that grade and February, a science mapping

would drop to a "B")." In addition, as "ODE does not assign an artificial score of zero to nonparticipants, but no points are earned for tests not taken, a large number of untested students will reduce a school's or district's performance index score, resulting in a letter grade reduction." Parent reports will be available

shortly and will be mailed to the address on file in PowerSchool. Each report contains an analysis of your child's performance in relationship to grade level indicators as well as provides some helpful tips to help support them deepen their knowledge in relationship to topics that they

may be struggling with. From a teaching and learning standpoint in relationship to this data, we are focused on determining what is working well for our students in relationship to the instructional shifts that are part of new standards. This is also tying into our instructional focus that you may read about in previous columns: differentiated instruction (DI). Differentiated instruction is a process whereby teachers make instructional adjustments in terms of the way students learn material or how they demonstrate understanding of material based on personal characteristics of students. Administrators are participating in a book study and we will be working with staff to help support utilizing DI techniques

within their classrooms. In other news, come January

team will also be assembled amongst our staff to update the science curriculum as well as look at the various resources that we can purchase for student and teacher use. Our 3-5 language arts team is also working to update their maps to align instruction to the most recent version of the Ohio Model Curriculum. In addition, the district is also collaborating with several other districts in Lorain County and the ESC for a straight A grant related to a product called STMath. More information, if we are awarded the grant, will follow shortly.

As a reminder, Third Grade Reading testing is scheduled for December 2. More information will be sent to parents and guardians of our third graders. Please ensure that your student is wellrested and has had breakfast before testing. Students are wellprepared for this assessment and we expect great results from our students. If you see one of our third graders during that week, please wish them well on this important test! Please continue to monitor our website for information related to testing, curriculum, and instruction. As information changes, the site is updated to reflect our districts' understanding of state mandates and expecta-

Finally, as we enter the holiday season, I wish you two gifts: the gift of time to spend with love ones during the hustle and bustle and the gift of relaxation. Have a pleasant holiday season.
