

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## **GUIDANCE CORNER**

<u>SOPHOMORES -</u> In late November, we will be focusing on career education with the Sophomore class to assist them in the major decisions they will have to make this year about their educational path. Students will explore college preparation, college options, college Tech Prep, and vocational training programs at the JVS. We will be using the PLAN test data to assist with career planning and scheduling for their Junior year. Listed below are the scheduled dates for information sessions about what is available at the LCJVS.

- ◆ JVS Presentation to Sophomores November 30, 2012
- ◆ JVS Sophomore Tour Thursday, January 24, 2013
- ◆ JVS Open House Sunday, February 10, 2013 1:30p.m. 3:30p.m.

**JUNIORS** - We will be using the Practice ACT data for college and career planning. Students will receive their results in December, and we will use the data for Senior scheduling. Students should check out the www.actstudent.org website. We recommend for students to take the ACT or SAT once during their Junior year, usually in the spring or early summer.

<u>ALL SENIORS</u> - We will start putting together a Career portfolio. This portfolio will include transcripts, recommendations, and resumes. This will be done in Government Classes in January.

A list of scholarships have already been posted on the Firelands website. You can subscribe to receive notifications when new scholarships/contests have been posted by going to the Firelands website under Firelands High School>Departments>Guidance>Financial Aid and College/Scholarship Resources. The list of local scholarships will be posted once they become available. The process for the local scholarships begins in January and runs until mid March. The information put together in the Career Portfolios can be used to fill out the scholarships.

Parents, have you had discussions about college with your high school student? Students, have you talked with your parents about your plans for after high school? If so, have these conversations raised more questions than they have answered?

The process of selecting a college to attend after high school can be daunting, from scheduling visits to completing the applications and securing the necessary financial aid.

There will be a lot of things to cover in the coming months, including applications, financial aid, and scholarships. While we are making every effort to help seniors with their college plans, we also encourage juniors and sophomores to develop a college plan by going on college visits, taking postsecondary exams such as the PSAT, PLAN, or Practice ACT and the ACT or SAT prior to the beginning of senior year.

The OVI simulated crash pulled on the emotional chords of every observing student, even provoking tears at times. The Florence and S.A. Fire Departments, Mercy Allen Hospital E.M.S., Ohio State Highway Patrol, Sugar Ridge Auto & Truck, Lorain County Coroner's and Sheriff's Department, Metro and St. Vincent Life Flight, FCCLA Students, M.A.D.D., and Mrs. Szunyogh all donated their time into making the OVI simulated crash a tremendous success. In relation to the mock crash, a casket was placed at one of Firelands' home football games (generously provided by Dovin and Reber Jones Funeral & Cremation Center), displaying teenage OVI statistics to all crowd members at the game. As an addition to both events, an Aggravated Vehicular Homicide Mock Trial was held in the FHS gym on October 31<sup>st</sup>, with doors open to any student or staff member whom wished to watch the trial. This provided an opportunity for all bystanders to experience first-hand the legal ramifications of operating a vehicle under the influence. The presiding judge, Judge Brian Hagan, was very constructive during the trial, providing explanations on what was happening during court procedures and answering all questions students or staff members had. For the trial, twelve students of Mr. Miller's college government class played the jury, Maison Mastellone was the defendant. Maison was defended by attorney Ken Ortner and the prosecutor was played by magistrate Chris Stallkamp. Bailiff Rob Bennet and Court Reporter Mary Hammond completed the court room setting, giving the procedure a realistic effect. A tremendous thank you goes out to all companies, groups, and individuals who donated their time and effort into making these events extremely successful! 
