#### State Report Card

September is the time of year when we reflect on the 2013-2014 school year and present our data to the community. On Friday, September 12, 2014, the Ohio Department of Education released District report card grades. As many of you are aware, the Ohio Department of Education changed the way that schools are "graded" last year and in an effort to help advance community understanding I am again summarizing each reported area and providing District grades.

Achievement: Performance Indicators & Performance Index

The **Performance Indicators** show how many students have a minimum, or proficient, level of knowledge. These indicators are not new to Ohio students or teachers. They are based on a series of 24 state tests that measure the level of achievement for each student in a grade and subject. For each test, it is required that at least 75 percent of students score "proficient" or better to get credit for the corresponding indicator. Starting in the 2013-14 school year, a

district or school needs to have 80 percent of their students reach "proficient" or better in order to "meet" an indicator. This change signals that more students are expected to reach a proficient level in order for schools to meet the indicator (Ohio Department of Education, 2013).

# 2013-2014 Firelands Local District Indicators Met: 21/24 Grade: 87.5% "B"

The **Performance Index** measures the achievement of every student based on respective levels of achievement. Schools receive points for every student's level of achievement. The higher the student's level, the more points the school applies towards its index. Therefore, schools and districts are rewarded for improving the performance of all students (Ohio Department of Education, 2013).

# 2013-2014 Firelands Local District Performance Index: 102.7/120 Grade: 85.6% "B"

#### **Progress**

The data from state tests over multiple years are examined through a series of calculations to produce a **Value-Added** designation for each school and district. Additionally, the tests are examined to determine progress of three specific groups of students (Gifted, Students in the Lowest 20% of Achievement, and Students with Disabilities).

The five designations – determined in law – are the same ranges of growth that are used to compute teacher Value-Added performance. Also like the teacher Value-Added performance measure, up to three years of growth computations are used to assure the accuracy and precision of the measure. Schools are not penalized because of one year of poor growth.

It is important to understand that a school with a low achievement level in a given year does not indicate that students are not learning. In fact, there may be a great deal of academic growth taking place. Conversely, there is a misconception that high achievers have met their potential and can no longer advance their learning. This measure highlights the importance of providing the curriculum and instruction that will help *all* students to grow academically every year (Ohio Department of Education 2013).

### Graduation Rate

The Four-Year Graduation Rate includes as graduates only those students who earn a diploma within four years of entering the ninth grade for the first time. The Five-Year Graduation Rate includes those students who graduate within five years of entering ninth grade for the first time.

According to the U.S. Department of Education, the median earnings in 2010 for young adults without a high school diploma or its equivalent was \$21,000, for those with a high school diploma or its equivalent was \$29,900, for those with an associate's degree was \$39,000, and for those with a bachelor's degree was \$45,000. Analysis shows that young adults with a bachelor's degree earned more than twice as much as those without a high school diploma or its equivalent in 2010 (Ohio Department of Education 2013).

#### Gap Closing

Annual Measurable Objectives (AMOs) measure the academic performance of specific groups of students, such as racial and demographic groups. Each of these groups is compared against the collective performance of all students in Ohio, allowing us to determine if there are gaps in academic achievement between groups of students. Much work is still needed to *eliminate* achievement gaps and bring all students up to the same high level of achievement (Ohio Department of Education 2013).

#### 2013-2014 Firelands Local District Gap Closing Annual Measureable Objectives Grade: 83.2% "B"

I encourage you to visit <u>reportcard.education.ohio.gov</u> for a more in-depth analysis of our scores. As one can determine from analyzing the scores of the District, there are many areas for celebration and we are extremely proud of our students, teachers, and parents! Each of the aforementioned cogs of the wheel must work together to ensure success for our students. I assure our community that we will continue to grow and move forward, striving for a report card containing "straight A's!"

In our efforts to educate all children to the highest level possible, Building Leadership Teams are meeting with administrators to develop strategies to better examine our test data, review classroom instruction and assessment, and to look at how better we can provide intervention for our students that are below proficient. I am confident that our team will construct plans for improvement and we will continue to meet the growing and ever-changing needs of our students.

In closing, I feel obligated to restate my final words from September of 2012:

I encourage you to involve yourself with your child's education. The invaluable time that you spend with your children may become less and less as they age. However, every moment counts, and your parental wisdom helps ensure the future successes of our children. In the words of Aristotle, **"We are what we repeatedly do. Excellence, therefore, is not an act but a habit."**

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# **Firelands Elementary School Annual Report - 2013-2014**

PTG continues to expand on the "Build a Day" playground fund and will be installing an Outside Pavilion for hands-on activities and outdoor learning experiences in October.

PTG also provided thousands of dollars to teachers and students to provide materials to support the implementation of the Ohio's New Learning Standards, as well as field trips to enhance the core standards and the unified arts.

The implementation of the Ohio Third Grade Guarantee included further training of reading tutors, special education teachers and classroom teachers in a multi-sensory structured language approach to teaching reading. FES partnered with Tolson Dyslexia for specialized training for our staff. Starting in January, Firelands Elementary School held a before and after school book club to promote reading engagement among third grade students.

PTG held a successful book drive to enhance our classroom libraries at FES. Students will read silently each day, at their independent reading level, and the additional books allow for more variety in text selection.

With the adoption of the My Math Program last year, grades K-5 continue to align their instruction to meet the needs of all learners. Plans are under way for students to be involved in Math Competitions like Math Olympiad and Math Mania for enrichment.

FES did toy drive in December, collecting over 400 toys to help local families.

FES families and area organizations sponsored 30 FES students, buying them clothing and toys for Christmas.

# News from the ART Department:

Firelands was chosen to lead off a year-long rotating exhibition at the Lorain County ESC. I believe it was both elementary and middle school students who participated. It was a great honor to start that exhibition.

We had 2 students make it to State level through the Ohio Art Education Association's two art exhibitions in March: Lydia Dougan and Connor Pleban. Three other students had work exhibited in the OAEA show mounted in University Circle at Case Western Reserve. Both 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> graders enjoyed Art Club in March after school with me. 4<sup>th</sup> graders made batiks and 5<sup>th</sup> graders made a variety of projects using "unexpected materials" 8 FES students represented our school at the annual ESC Elementary and Middle School art

exhibition at Midway Mall. One came away with a Best in Show award: Gwyneth Conibear. Four other students received Excellence Awards: Nazsiryah Byrd, Joe Formholtz, Shawny Hess and Peyton Linn.

We had 2 visiting artists from the Center for Arts-Inspired Learning: Bonnie Dolin and Wendy Mahon, two very well respected Cleveland artists. Ms. Dolin worked with Second Grade on cultural symbolism (Native American) and printmaking. Ms. Mahon worked with First Grade for 2 consecutive days on a workshop that investigated the celebratory customs of Sub-Saharan African cultures and involved collaborative mask-making. Endowment Fund grants paid for those residencies.

Endowment Fund grants also paid for one of the art club's supplies (5<sup>th</sup> grade) as well as the Fine Arts Festival Make-it and Take-it activity (Japanese koi windsocks).



Math Counts received a gold medal for a fourth year in a row.

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Some of our **sixth graders** had the opportunity to participate in four days of drama instruction from the Great Lakes Theater Group. Thanks to a grant provided by various donors, students were able to explore some serious issues of Civil Rights through the exploration of theatrical performance.

Multiple endowment grants were received and used to benefit SAMS students directly. The endowment board has proven, yet again, that they truly support the teachers at S. Amherst Middle school and our students.

The **8<sup>th</sup> grade football team** was undefeated with an 8-0 record. As a group the football team compiled a 16-0 record for the middle school football career.

**SAMS Wrestling Team**: The team started off the year with a first place finish at the Seneca East Invitational, a fourth place finish at the Clyde Invitational, a third place finish at the Vermilion Holiday Dual Team Tournament, a runner-up finish at the New London "Randy Harner" Invitational, and a third place finish at the Patriot Athletic Conference Individual Tournament. At the Conference Tournament we had three champions: Jacob Campbell, Tyler Bennett, and Sean Lipscomb. Other place winners on the day were Owen Cogar and Jordon Phillips earning third place, and Ryan Hoffman and Tyler Miller recording a runner-up finish. We had two wrestlers finish undfeated this year in the regular season, Jacob Campbell (35-0) and Sean Lipscomb (34-0), as well as four other wrestlers who have accumulated twenty or more wins this season: Dylan Decker, Joey Tipple, Ryan Hoffman, Owen Cogar, Jordon Phillips and Tyler Bennett. In the post season four wrestlers earned a bid to the OAC State Tournament: Campbell won a district championship, Bennett finished fifth place, Lipscomb seventh place, and Phillips eight each respectively in their weights.

The **boys track team** finished up another exciting season. # FIRELANDS HIGH SCHOOL 2013-2014 ANNUAL REPORT

### **ACADEMICS**

The OGT Results for 2013-14 were released on Friday, September 12, 2014. The results showed that Firelands High School met 10 out of 10 indicators, which received an A for indicators met. Also, Firelands High School scored a 94.1% on 4-year Graduation Rate, which is an A on the Ohio Schools Report Card. FHS scored 103.6 on performance index, which is an 86.4%, which resulted in a B for Performance Index on the new Ohio Schools Report Card.

Firelands also was selected to field test the Geometry PARCC assessment in the spring. While we were not able to receive the results of the assessment, the students, teachers, and administrators were able to learn a great deal of information regarding the set-up of the testing module, and how easy or difficult it will be to complete these assessments on the computers.

Last year, FHS hired 3 new teachers: Brett Bartlett, Kim Bennett, and Rachel Sparks.

As a member of High Schools that Work (HSTW), Firelands was asked to participate at two events hosted at FHS. The Site Review Process (SRP) and the HSTW Assessment. For the SRP, we had teachers visiting from Wellington, Brookside, and Washington Park in Cleveland to observe and interview teachers, parents, and students. Firelands HS came out looking strong, with great reviews of the amount of time we dedicate to extra help, as well as the increasing of rigor by offering more PSEO courses on campus. They wanted us to keep increasing rigor in all of our classes in preparation for the Next Generation Assessments that Ohio will begin administering the 2014-2015 school year. In February, we tested 60 seniors in Reading, Math, and Science, as well as take a survey of their opinions, and norm-reference the results across the nation. In addition to those events being held at our school, the HSTW team of Andy Gulish, Wendy Johnson, Chris Jones, and Rick Reighley went to various workshops covering the new assessments, potential changes ODE was rolling out, as well as strategies to help reach all learners in our classrooms. Mr. Northeim, Mr. Wortmann (College Now), and Mrs. Zimmer conducted senior interviews in October in regards to post-secondary transitions. The information obtained was used to fill out college and scholarship applications. The seniors were given ACT and SAT test dates. On October 16th the seniors participated in a college visit or job shadowing experience to better prepare them for future career decisions. The Guidance Department also held a financial aid night for students and parents so they could be well informed as students continued their college search.

The National Honor Society inducted 52 new members on April 10. NHS Members are listed in the May, 2014 Firelands Express

### **LEADERSHIP**

The Firelands FFA Chapter qualified in December for the state Parliamentary Procedure Career Development Event by winning the district Parliamentary Procedure contest for the first time in chapter history.

On February 4<sup>th</sup>, the Firelands FFA, Firelands Student Council and the principal's fund sponsored nationally renowned speaker and best seller Sam Glenn. Emma Ranney, Firelands FFA President welcomed the Firelands students in grades 9-12 to the assembly. Students were then wowed by Sam Glenn's stunning chalk art drawing of a lighthouse on the water. After finishing the drawing he spent time talking to the students about being courageous and making good decisions.

The FHS Choral Department had 11 ensembles and 18 soloists participate in the Lorain County Solo and Ensemble Competition at Midview High School. Many ensembles and soloists received a superior rating from the judges for their performances.

### COMMUNITY SERVICE

The Teen Leadership Corps (TLC) undertook several community service projects. Kick-It, which raised money for cancer research. They also set up a fundraiser for "Eyes for Andy", to help support a Firelands Schools student. They were also busy during the holiday season. With festive activities and fundraisers, there had been non-stop action coming from the students who work hard to make it all happen. In December, they hosted many events including the Cavs Toy Drive, Holiday Week, and the Christmas play for kindergarteners at FES. In January, TLC started an Anti-Texting and Driving campaign, working with Vermilion High School's Teen Leadership Corps class to inform peers of the dangers of texting while driving. TLC also held a Dance Marathon for Children's Miracle Network and participated in the Pasta for Pennies event. Also, TLC collected pennies and all other change as well as donations to benefit The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society.

Firelands FFA participated in a food drive at Thanksgiving called Harvest for America, which helped less fortunate families during the holiday season. The FFA collected over 2,200 pounds of non-perishable food items, helping feed several families in the Firelands School District area. For 38 years, the Firelands FFA has sponsored several children in need in our community during the annual FFA Christmas Family community service project. 

# ew for 2014-2015 School

Firelands Local Schools is proud to announce a new technology initiative for students starting next fall. Beginning the 2014 - 2015 school year, students at South Amherst Middle School and Firelands High School will be allowed to bring their electronic devices to school and use them as part of the District's BYOD program. BYOD (Bring Your Own Device) is centered on students using devices not owned by the district such as smartphones, tablets, eReaders, and laptops for educational use

Firelands Local Schools worked with MCPc, Inc to upgrade the core network infrastructure and establish wall-to-wall wireless coverage in the buildings in the summer of 2013 in preparation to support the BYOD initiative. The belief is that with students bringing their own devices to school that it will promote an exciting shift in how they use them. Typically, student-owned devices are used for social or entertainment purposes, but with BYOD their use expands to also become collaboration and learning tools that can be used to engage the student with the content in hopes of promoting lifelong learning habits.

# KEY FACTS & GUIDELINES ABOUT THE FIRELANDS LOCAL SCHOOLS BYOD PROGRAM

- Do I need to purchase a device for my student? This initiative does not require the purchase of any device by our students or families. District devices will be available for students to meet curriculum and instructional expectations.
- Who is responsible for damage, loss, or theft of devices that students bring to school? Any device a student brings to school is their sole responsibility. Firelands Local Schools takes no responsibility to search for lost or stolen devices nor is there any assumption of financial responsibility by Firelands Schools for damaged, lost, or stolen personal devices.
- How will you monitor what my student is viewing on the Internet? Devices brought to school will only access the filtered, BYOD Wi-Fi network to prevent excess data fees to their personal accounts (no 3G, 4G, or mobile hotspot access will be permitted).
- When can my student use their device at school? Your student's teacher will determine when and how personal electronic devices may be used in his/her classroom. The student's electronic device must be turned off when not in use.
- Will my student need to have a signed form on file to use their device?

Yes. In order for Firelands Local Schools to supervise student use of the district network and the Internet, the Acceptable Use Policy (AUP) must be read and the BYOD form must be signed by the student and guardians for all students who want to bring and use their own technology.
